And indeed it is. Every major game species, from bear and moose to quail and rabbit, will be in good to excellent supply. There'll be loads of elk, antelope, big horns and mountain goats; upland game birds of all kinds will be plentiful. But the really big news concerns deer — white tails will be even more abundant than last year's record numbers, and the mulie population will be good to excellent. This year the national deer herd has risen to an all-time high of about 15 1/2 million. If you'd like more details, by the way, you can get 62 pages of valuable information on game, seasons, regional forecasts, etc., for all 50 states, by sending 25¢ to the Winchester News Bureau, 460 Park Avenue, New York, N.Y. 10022, for a copy of the "1968-69 Hunting Compendium and Regional Report."

One small note of caution, however, for those of you who intend to travel to distant hunting areas. An increasing number of states manage game on a regional basis, with shorter seasons for specific areas within the time limits of their general seasons. Be sure to check ahead with state game departments for exact information.
