Miss Dosia Smith Resigns Secretary Position after 28 Years, 9 Mayors

After a year of serious consideration, Miss Dosia Smith has decided to resign as city secretary, a position she has held since April 1940. She has submitted her resignation effective Oct. 1.

However, she will continue as full time employee until Jan. 1 with Karl G. Wilks, purchasing agent for City of Wichita Falls, who will replace her as city secretary. After Jan. 1, Miss Smith will work part time.
"The past 28 1/2 years have been very happy and rewarding," she said. "I have served with nine mayors and I have had their full co-operation, and the same kind of co-operation from city aldermen and employees.

"I have nothing except highest praise and appreciation for everyone with whom I have worked and the public I have served. I hope my work as 'just another employee' will be as pleasant as the years spent as city secretary."
Miss Smith has seen many changes and phenomenal growth in Iowa Park since she began her work in April 1940. She was trained for her job two weeks, and after that she worked in the office by herself until 1950. She has three regular employees and a substitute worker during the summer. Regulars are Mmes. V. I. Woodfin, Orange Lester and M. L. Towns, summer worker is Miss Glenda Bea Smith.

Population of Iowa Park was 2009 in 1939, and it now exceeds 5000.
Miss Dosia is daughter of the late Daniel Boone Smith and Nanine Kildow Smith, pioneer residents. Her father came here in 1839 from Prairie Home, Mo. Her mother came in 1835 from Turley Town, Va. The couple married in 1896 and homesteaded land on what is now Hammon Ranch southwest of Iowa Park.

Graduate of IPHS, Miss Smith attended National Business college in Ft. Worth. She worked as bookkeeper for Overbey-Troutman Co. and for First National and State National banks for 11 1/2 years, and for John B. Barbour Trucking Co. before running for office of city secretary.

She is a long-time member of First Baptist church and has had various offices and positions in church and Sunday school during the years. Member of Order of Eastern Star Lodge No. 42, she received a 50-year membership pin and special recognition in 1967.

Even though Miss Dosia has filed for re-election every two years, she did not have an opponent until 1966, at which time she had two, and she received a majority in the election. The city council voted that year to make the office of city secretary an appointive position rather than an elective office.

Mayors with whom Miss Smith has served have been:
Dr. Gordon G. Clark, 1940-42. The late John B. Barbour, who was elected in 1942 but resigned after three months to enter army service during World War II.
N. E. McKinney was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Barbour and was elected in 1944. During his term, McKinney resigned to go into

business in Abilene. The late C. W. Coppock served out the term.
Curtis Sewell, 1946-50.
Fenton Dale, 1950-52.
R. E. Van Horn, 1952-60.
C. L. Metz, 1960-68.
Erwin F. Soell became mayor in April of this year.

As Miss Smith reflected on the changes and improvements made during the past 29 years, she recalled some of the accomplishments of each administration. In Sept. 1939, before Miss Dosia became city secretary, the first city lake was built under Clark's administration. In 1940, Highway 287 was built through town, traffic control lights were installed and the ordinance was passed to net 2% utility gross revenue for the city.

Earl Virgin Killed in Fire Truck, Horse Collision

Earl Virgin jr., an Iowa Park volunteer fireman, was killed Monday night when the fire truck he was riding struck a horse and rolled over. The men were en route to a grassfire on Kight's farm south of town.

Three other firemen were injured: T. C. Scott, Eldon Dowell and Bud Thompson. Dowell was taken to Wichita General hospital with head and chest lacerations and broken hip. Scott and Thompson were treated at Park Clinic.

Virgin, who resided at 1125 Louisa, was dead at the scene, about 100 yards outside the city limits on Kamay road. The wreck occurred about 8:50 p.m.

Virgin was an iron worker and most recently has been employed at Sippard AFB.

Funeral service was conducted Wednesday afternoon at Tanner Funeral Home chapel by the Rev. Floyd Heard of Kamay Baptist church. Burial was in Highland cemetery here.

Members of the fire department were honorary pallbearers. Local business houses were closed during the funeral service.

Virgin was born April 29, 1923, in Kellyville, Okla. He and Helen Porter were married in Vernon on Dec. 22, 1958.

Survivors include the widow; a daughter Margaret Jeanette of the home; two sons: James Earl and John Michael of the home; his parents Mr. and Mrs. Earl Virgin of Kamay; a sister Mrs. Wilma Jean Deel of Borger.

Funeral service for Roy Lee Cole, 52, was conducted Tuesday morning at Tanner Funeral Home. He died Saturday morning in a Wichita Falls hospital.

Cole was born April 22, 1916, in Oklahoma. He has resided in Iowa Park for 40 years. He was a World War II veteran.

Vacationing in the Lush Matanuska Valley of Central Alaska

 "A great adventure," the aggregate of 14 daily adventures, best describes my two weeks spent in the lush Matanuska Valley of Alaska with my son Keith and his wife Marjorie and their children Ronald, Kelly, Judy and Kim.
 From the moment I boarded a plane in Wichita Falls on Aug. 5, my spirits soared high in anticipation of reunion with my family and my first trip to Alaska in summertime. I went from Wichita Falls to Dallas and from there to Seattle by Braniff. At Seattle I boarded the Alaska Airlines traveling on the "Golden Nugget Fan Jet" flight, and that within itself was a thrill long to be remembered.

Alaska Airlines serves Alaska from Seattle with four Golden Nugget Fan Jet flights daily. They have plush "Gay Nineties Gold Rush" decor — red, gold and green velvet tufted seats; deep-pile red carpeting; red velvet curtains with gold braid and tassels; dark walnut-style paneling; plus risky-tink background music and in-flight announcements in Robert Service rhyme.

Stewardesses wear Gibson Girl Hoses and red velvet skirts. Alaska Airlines has carried its Gay Nineties theme system-wide. Ticket offices have plush red carpets, red and gold floored wallpaper, swinging doors, gas lights, and black upholstered counters with brass foot-ails. Ticket agents and passenger service personnel wear red vets and skimmer hat.

The picturesque fertile Matanuska Valley opens southwestward into Cook Inlet and is ringed on three sides by rugged mountains, some rising from sea level at base to 10,000 feet. The Talkeetna Mts. rise on the north; Lazy Mountain and Beyer Peak on the east; Pioneer Peak and 3 Sisters are on the south.

The Keith Blalocks live in the Butte community on Bodenbug Loop four miles south of Palmer, and they are very close to these mountains which they love dearly. Their place is the first on the Bodenbug Loop and the Dr. McKinley farm which is photographed so often is at the other end of the loop.

Also on the south is Butte Hill, 331 feet, a strange formation of rock humping from a flat plain, surrounded by some of the Valley's finest farms. The hill seems only a stone's throw from the Blalocks' upstairs living room window, and it is fairly easy to climb (so they say).

Youth groups often make it an outing and eat a picnic lunch on top. For the more adventurous, a climb up Lazy Mt., 3720 feet, affords a breath-taking view of the valley. Unbelievable as it seems, Marathon runners during Alaska State Fair (Labor Day weekend) run all the way from the fairgrounds to the mountain, then on up only to turn around and run all the way back.

Spectacular grandeur of landscape around the Blalock home is enhanced by tall birch, spruce

and cottonwood trees, and colorful fireweed which has an orchid pink hue. In most areas the wild moschberries add sparkling contrast to the fireweed.

One of the greatest thrills of the vacation was going into the woods with the family to pick wild raspberries and currants for jellies. Fireweed and wild clover are used for making fireweed honey, and the rose hips are used for jelly and in many other ways.

The lingonberry or low bush cranberry and high bush cranberry are plentiful in Matanuska Valley and blueberries are found in some areas.

A log cabin has long fascinated me, and an abandoned log cabin has intrigued me to the same degree. When I see one I have a ven to go through it, and that desire was satisfied somewhat when I went through several abandoned log cabins in Alaska. One of these was not conducive to thought of happy days spent in the structure because the owner had decided to go "outside" and had walked off and left most of the things that he had accumulated through the years, for people to take if they could use them or for vandals to destroy. Another nearby had a different atmosphere, and I wished that the old logs could speak and tell some of the experiences of the pioneers who occupied the house. It was here that my younger grandson and I retrieved some antique fruit jars from a junk pile.

Palmer is the largest town in Matanuska Valley and serves as a trade center for an area of approximately 7000 persons although the city's population is about 1200. It has a picturesque Tourist Center which is an Alaskan log building with a natural rock fireplace made of rocks collected from creeks in the area. Arts, crafts and artifacts are displayed in the Center and a museum is being planned for the basement. The town has a free camp park for tourists.

Places to visit are University of Alaska station and farm, farms on Bodenbug Loop, Road and Springer System, Mary King's Rock Shop, Whittle Shop for hand-carved gifts, and the Lloyd Hill arm for raw and carved soapstone, serpentine, agate and quartz.
 Growing season ranges from 100 to 120 days in the valley. Cool moist weather and long daylight hours during growing sea-

son, along with adequate care and fertilization produce amazing growth in vegetables. Moderately sized vegetables are grown for commercial markets, but 60-lb. cabbages and 30-lb. turnips have been produced for fairs. The record cabbage weighed 72 lbs. I saw the large variety of cabbage growing at the experiment station. Heads were so large I was sure that I was looking at 50-lb. heads, but I was told they were only about 25 lbs., but would weigh 50 or more within three weeks.

Dairying is the most important farm enterprise, with potatoes 2nd and eggs 3rd. Hot houses where tomatoes and cucumbers are grown are quite common.

It was my privilege to help Marjorie prepare vegetables from their garden for the freezer. In the garden were English peas, cauliflower, broccoli, rutabagas, turnips, chard, carrots, beets, radishes, onions, rhubarb, strawberries, lettuce.

Vacationing in Matanuska Valley was educational in many ways. I learned the value of the Wild Rose Hips, seed pods from Alaska's wild rose, or the Prickly Rose or Nutka Rose. Rose Hips are one of the best native sources of Vitamin C for Alaska. Research shows that 6 to 8 rose hips can provide the daily Vitamin C requirement of the average person. In fact, they are so rich in Vitamin C that the juice, jams and jellies, if made according to directions retain enough Vitamin C to provide the chief source of this vitamin throughout the winter. These products can be used in place of oranges and tomatoes almost impossible to obtain in some parts of Alaska.

Other countries have been aware of this food value for many years. In England during the war, 2000 tons were gathered from the roadsides and put up to take the place of oranges when they were scarce. In Norway rose hips are dried and powdered and sold to be used in fruit soups or with milk or water for hot or cold beverages. They are sold under the name of C-Nok.

From the standpoint of scenic beauty one of the most rewarding trips we took was to Portage Glacier in the Chugach National Forest, the second largest in the state, composed of over 4,700,000 acres. The 43 mile drive from Anchorage between the Chugach Mountains, covered with stately trees in many shades of green, and dotted with waterfalls, fireweed and mooseberries, and Cook Inlet was awe-inspiring. Evidence of destruction of the earthquake in 1964 marred the beauty of the landscape near the Portage Community. Deserted buildings half submerged in earth serve as grim reminder of the railroad station and other buildings which lie buried beneath the earth which was a lake of mud at the time of the great tremor. Highway and railroad which were badly damaged are now in excellent shape. Forty miles from downtown Anchorage via the scenic Seward Highway, I was told to look up toward Alyeska, Alaska's largest ski resort, site of 1963 national championship races and Olympic trials. It is also the site of the International Airlines Ski Races and has been chosen for 1969 Junior Nationals. Keith and Ronald, who is a ski enthusiast, ski here on occasions.

A one-day outing in the 8600-acre Portage Glacier Recreation area was most rewarding. As I looked at Portage Glacier, I was reminded that glaciation has been a dominant land shaping force in Alaska for many years. The glacier ends its flow in Portage Lake and before the lake was formed 50 years ago, the glacier was used as a portage by Tanaina Indians, Chugach Eskimos and Russian fur traders traveling between Cook Inlet and Prince William Sound.

Unformed Forest Naturalists and Rangers serve as hosts at the Portage Glacier Recreation area and explain the glacier and its effect on the area. Large and small blue icebergs float in the glacier-fed lake. Scientists say that in the single icefield behind Portage there are as many glaciers as in all of Switzerland. Visitors Center, observatory, a modern lodge, restaurant facilities and gift shop are alongside the glacier. The Forest Service has constructed 2 campgrounds in the area. Willisaw Campground is also the site of Salmon Spawning Grounds. I am sure I shall never forget the sight of beautiful pink salmon swimming in the clear water of the spawning stream.

Middle Glacier and Explorer Glacier, both hanging glaciers, conspicuous avalanche chutes on the mountain sides, and the forest which graphically shows the effect of wind exposure help to shape the Portage landscape. It would be impossible for me to describe all the thrills, enjoyment and places of interest I enjoyed during my visit to Alaska. But, please go one last place with me to the Chapel by the Sea, a well-known landmark located on Seward Highway 9 miles south of Anchorage. The fabulous begonia displays and landscaped grounds overlooking Cook Inlet are a daily stop for many summer tourists. The sanctuaries of the log structure is upstairs and the setting and recorded music are conducive to worship and meditation.

Other buildings on the grounds are a Fellowship Hall, the outside of which was covered with hanging begonias in a profusion of colors, a youth center and green house. The pansies here, as well as those in other places, are large and grow in a variety of colors. Also blooming in profusion were gorgeous dahlias, Schizanthus, sweetpeas, marigolds, double petunias and many other flowers.

It is said of Alaska that the four regions: Arctic, Interior, South Central, Southeastern, are all so different and so distinct, they make possible a stimulating and varied visit. I spent all my time in South Central Alaska, and I couldn't have asked for a more varied and stimulating vacation.

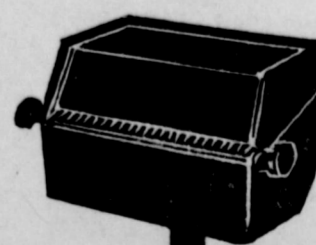

WYNNE CHESTER SAYS:

Don't Choke Up Over "Choke"



A few weeks ago I promised to try to clear up some more of those "mysterious" terms about shotguns. Well, here we go with another one: "choke."

Choke, essentially, is just that: it's a constriction, in this case at or near the muzzle of a shotgun barrel. The choke acts like the nozzle of a hose—it momentarily holds together the mass of pellets a shotgun fires, so that they stay closer to each other in flight.

Shot pellets tend to fan out in a sort of cone-shaped pattern; the farther they fly, the farther they spread apart. A cylinder-bore barrel (no choke) will put only 35-40% of its pellets into

a given-sized circle at a given distance. A full choke (the most constricted) will put in 65-75%. In general, the farther away and/or the harder to penetrate the target is, the more choke is needed. The duck hunter, for instance, wants full choke; a duck has tough feathers and is usually shot at quite a distance. At the other extreme, the skeet shooter wants a wider pattern, since his target is closer and it takes less concentration of power to knock it down.
