John Gavin, former mayor of
Wichita Falls and past president
of Wichita Falls Chamber of
Commerce, was principal speak-
er at a meeting to acquaint citi-
zens with purposes of chambers
of commerce and other civic or-
ganizations here Monday even-
ing.

He described the organization
as the agency which correlate
activities between the city gov-
ernment, schools and all phases
of city life. "There can be no
difference between the ultimate
goals of a chamber of commerce,
city government and city
schools," he said.

Gavin said citizens of Iowa
Park are responsible for creat-
ing a community climate and
they should cooperate with and
have an appreciation for lead-
ers.

"Conflict between leaders leads
to deterioration," he said. "Peo-
ple need to be enthusiastic about
civic affairs. This meeting should
have drawn 100 per cent repre-
sentation of the population."

He stressed importance of co-
operation between Iowa Park and
Wichita Falls, saying that as
Wichita Falls is successful in at-
tracting new industry Iowa Park
will benefit.

Arch Hughes, Iowa Park
Chamber of Commerce president,
introduced John Maples, master
of ceremonies. Others on the plat-
form were Bill Robinson, mayor
pro tem; Faris Nowell, superin-
tendent of schools and Hoyt Wat-
son, a member of the school
board.

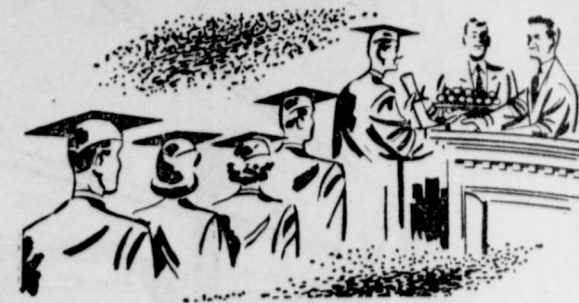
Section 1. It shall be unlawful for both the owner and the tenant of any property in the City abutting upon a public alley or way to permit any weeds, grasses, or other vegetation whatsoever to grow therein to the center line to a height of greater than five inches.

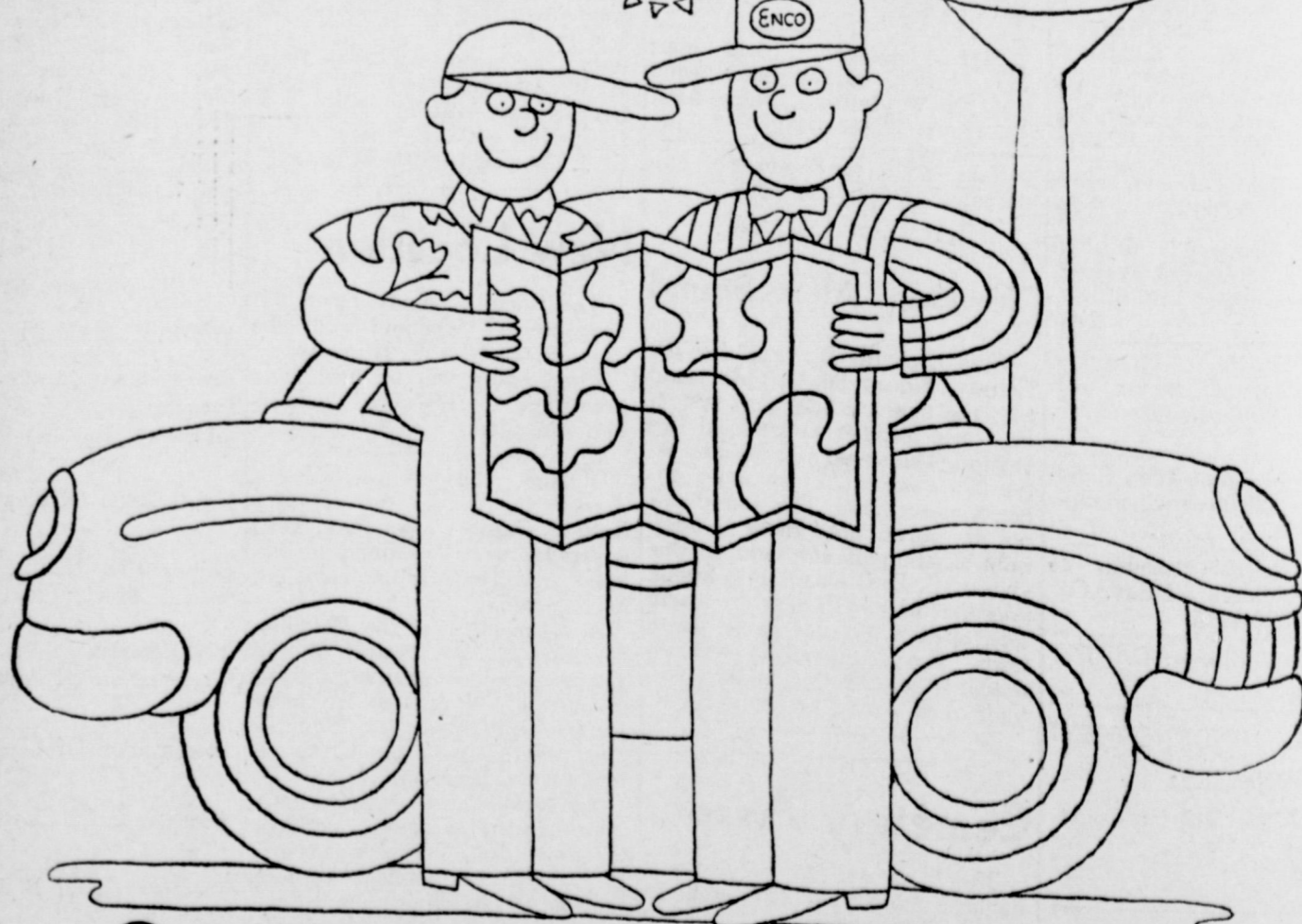

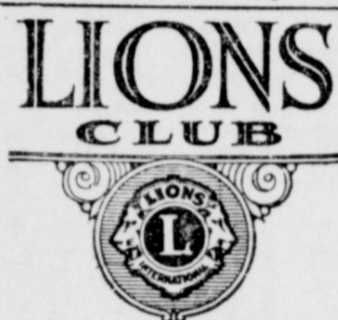


Mrs. Evelyn Ward Wins E.S.A. Scholarship
