With these demonstrations in the various parts of the county it should give us a check on the value of nitrogen fertilizer.

Two small grain variety test plots have been planted on the Ralph Swinford farm in the Friberg community and on the Sam Barwise farm located in the Punkin Center community. Varieties are Quanah, Comanche, Cordova, New Kortex and Mustang. Farmers in the county are invited to visit these plots and check the varieties of grain.

Seed for these demonstrations was furnished by the A & M college and experiment station.

The DHIA summary for October shows the Wichita Valley DHIA association ranks high in the state. We were second in average pounds of milk with 620, and third with average pounds of fat, 24. We have 16 members in the association at present. Let me urge more dairy farmers to join the association. H. R. Chandler is the technician.

Any dairy farmer in Wichita, Clay and Archer counties may have his cows bred artificially by calling telephone number 7-7324. This organization is known as the Tri-County Artificial Breeders association. Jim Kuehler and H. R. Chandler are the technicians.

I received word from A. L. Darnell, A & M college, that the annual Dairymen's short course will be conducted at College Station on Dec. 3 and 4. They are giving emphasis this year to marketing dairy products, a subject that is uppermost in the minds of dairymen. In addition, they will discuss feeding, management and diseases of cattle. 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

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
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
