## Young Canadian Preacher-Student Working with Church of Christ

Viggo Ulrich of Fairlight, Saskatchewan, Canada, is serving this summer as assistant minister of Iowa Park Church of Christ. Student at Oklahoma Christian college in Oklahoma City, he is 12 semester hours away from a BA with major in speech and minor in Bible.

Ulrich was born at Gravelbourg and lived there from 1948 to '62. His parents Mr. and Mrs. S. Ulrich are natives of Denmark. His father went to Canada with a brother to homestead, and his mother came with her parents. The couple married in Canada and have been engaged in farming and cattle raising for many years.

Viggo started preaching at age 15. He "comes by preaching naturally" since his grandfather was a Lutheran minister in Denmark, and his father is a part-time minister of Church of Christ.

Ranking in top half of his class in high school and college, Ulrich attended Fairlight high during freshman and sophomore year, and Western Christian college, a boarding high school and junior college at North Weyburn, when he was a junior and senior.

Education standards are higher in Canada than in U.S.A., and when he entered Columbia Christian college at Portland, Ore., he entered as a sophomore instead of being a freshman.

Before entering OCC in January this year, Viggo worked as an accountant in Maryfield, Can., for 1 1/2 years. He has had experience preaching in Oregon, Washington, Texas and Oklahoma, as well as conducting youth lectureships and religious surveys in those states.

Ulrich attended the Worldwide Mission Forum at Dallas last February and is looking forward to returning to Canada in October as a participant in the Western Christian college lectureship.

Ulrich has found the people of Iowa Park and surrounding area most hospitable, which he has been favorably impressed with because he considers Canada the ultimate in hospitality.

During the summer he has resided with Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Beall and has learned to eat, and rather like, blackeyed peas, which Canadians feed to hogs. He has learned to eat fried okra, but is convinced he can manage to go from now on without including boiled okra in his menu.

Iced tea is not too popular in the house, whether Canada, but Ulrich says it will be in Canada or elsewhere.

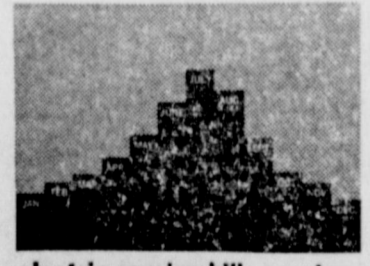
