 Mr. Jacobs died Monday night in a Wichita Falls hospital. Born May 8, 1888, in Danbury county, Iowa, he moved to Burkburnett in 1919 and to Kamay in 1921. In Aug. 14, 1926, he and Ruth May Long were married at Seymour.  
 Veteran of World War I, he worked for Wallace Estate for 35 years prior to retirement in 1961.  
 Mr. Jacobs was a Shriner and Mason for 50 years. At time of death he was member of Maskat Temple in Wichita Falls and Iowa Park Lodge AF&M No. 713.  
 He was member and former steward of the United Methodist church at Holliday and former member of Mankins school board.  
 Survivors are Mrs. Jacobs; son George Sanford Jacobs Jr. of Wichita Falls; two sisters: Mrs. W. H. Lewis of Walla Walla, Wash., and Mrs. Minnie Brown of Spokane, Wash.; brother Clyde Jacobs of Port Angeles, Wash.; two grandchildren: George III and Lesli Shanin Jacobs.

Undefeated through nine games, the Mean Green will tangle with once-defeated Irish, winner take all. Of course the Hawks cannot lose a tie for the title, but probably the season will shut off abruptly for the loser of Friday night's game.

Using practically every man on the squad able to play, the Hawks could not restrain themselves, and ran off nine touchdowns and the nine PATs before the game time could run out.

They lost no time putting the Indians into a deep hole by scoring 28 points in the first period.

Jerry Pittman kicked 8 points after touchdown, and Gary Frazier made it a perfect game by kicking the final PAT.

Jim Clapp played his usual fine defensive game, ran the offense beautifully, and contributed two touchdowns passes.

Touchdowns were scored by Mark Thompson, Gary Williams, Steve Watson, Steve Webb, Steve Berry, Gregg Ancell and James Labelle.

Jeff McDonald scampered for several long punt returns, but his touchdowns were called back because of penalties.

Quanah succeeded in making 7 first downs and 109 yards on the ground, but the Indians failed to complete a pass, and reached no farther downfield than the Iowa Park 30-yard line.

## Jack Cowden Suffers Heart Attack While Hunting in Mexico

Funeral services for Jack Jarrett Cowden, 49, were held Wednesday. The funeral service was conducted in Putnam City Baptist church of Oklahoma City, with Harold Mathena of Yukon officiating. He was assisted by Rev. T. T. Crabtree of Putnam City church. Graveside rites were in Iowa Park Highland cemetery at 3:00 p.m.

Tanner Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Cowden died Saturday night near Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico, of a heart attack while on a hunting trip.

Born March 8, 1920, at Fort Worth, Jack was graduated from IPHS. He received a BS degree

in geology from Texas Tech. He served in the navy during World War II.

He was married to Margaret Sewell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Sewell on Aug. 2, 1942, in Iowa Park. At his death Cowden had been associated with Continental Oil Co. for 23 years.

The couple had lived in Oklahoma City for six years, where he was drilling supervisor for the Oklahoma City Continental Oil Co.

Survivors are the widow; three sons: Jarrett, Steven and Jackie; his father Jim Cowden of Iowa Park; a brother Robert of Wichita Falls; two sisters: Mrs. Geof Huffman of Littleton, Colo., and Miss Jo Cowden of Huntsville.

"The Space Program—Is It Worth It?" was the topic discussed Tuesday at Evening Lions club meeting by Don Yeager and David Cobb, high school science students.

They gave the chronology of space programs in USA, discussed satellite launchings and gave reasons to justify exploration into space.

Ellis stressed the opportunities in the field of nursing and explained the diploma, associate degree, degree and LVN programs.

Lion Gordon G. Clark was program leader. Guests were Lions Paul Hagers and Don Rowe of Electra and Lynn Duckworth of Iowa Park.

Rex Wells of Iowa Park was elected to board of directors of Wichita County Farm Bureau at the regular monthly meeting. He was named to fill a vacancy on the board caused by the death

of his father-in-law Lloyd E. Bell.

Mr. Bell served on the county FB board for 16 years. Other directors are T. J. Pace sr., Loys D. Barbour, Robert Wilcox.

Eight delegates were selected to attend the state convention to be held Nov. 16-19 at San Antonio.

## Women's Club Members Enjoy Annual Combined Meeting

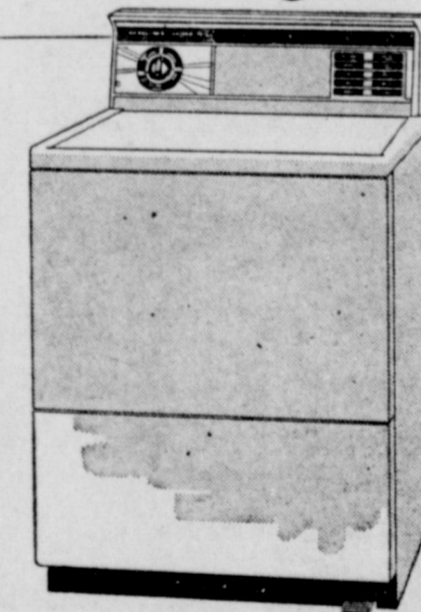

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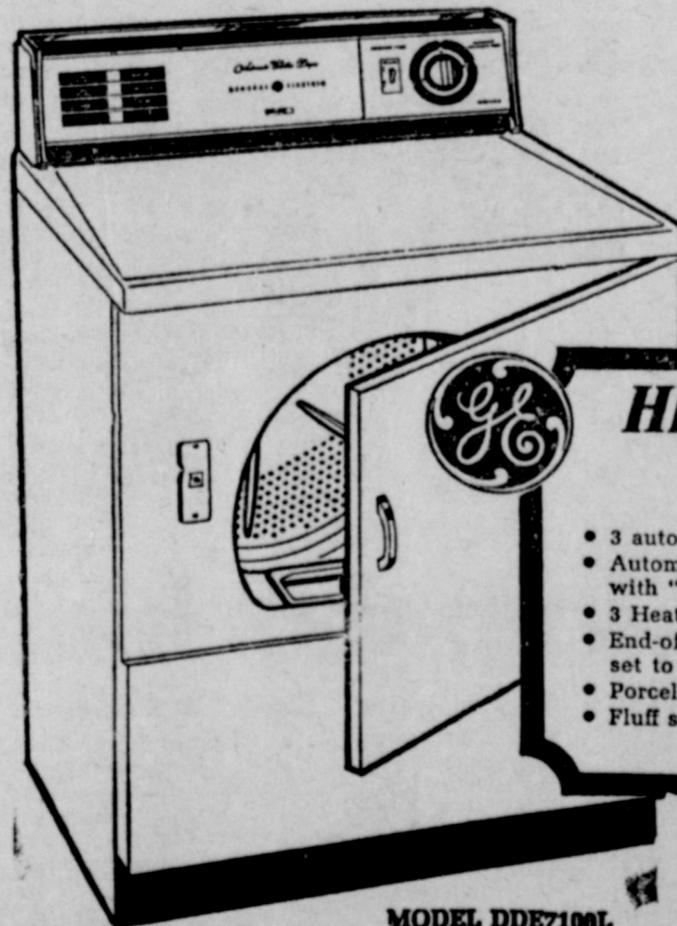
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
