Rev. Richard T. Perry will preach Sunday morning on "Man's Power and God's Sovereignty" at United Methodist.

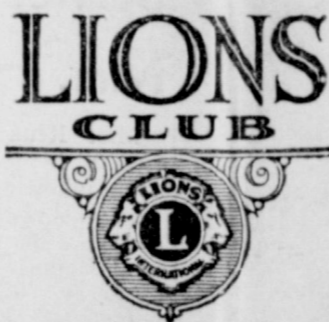

Membership drive is current project of Friends of Iowa Park Library, recently organized to promote the interest and welfare of the Library as a cultural and educational asset to Our Town.

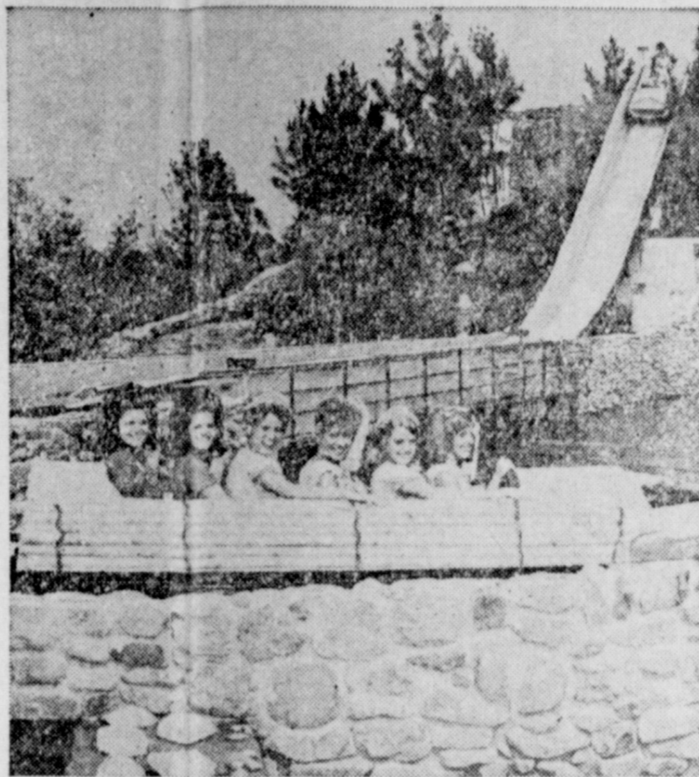
