## Ralph Yarborough Seeks Exemption Increase to \$1200 a Person a Year

Sen. Ralph Yarborough reported to the Herald this week on his activity in behalf of the people, as follows:

On March 27 I introduced into Congress a bill that would raise personal income tax exemption from present \$600 per person per year to \$1200 per person per year. I believe that increasing the personal exemption per person must have first priority in any tax reform package.

Personal exemption has not been increased in 21 years. The present exemption of \$600 was set in 1943. It was supposed to represent the basic cost of living for one person, which was calculated as \$50 a month or \$600 a year.

In the past 21 years the cost of living has gone up over 43 per cent, but the personal exemption has not been raised one cent in that 21 year.

Everybody knows \$50 a month is not enough for basic food and clothing!

If the personal exemption were changed to reflect just this 43 per cent increase it would have to be \$839 a year in place of \$600. But to fit today's standard of living, and to take into full account the increase in costs across the board, the personal exemption should be raised to \$1200 a year, allowing \$100 a month for basic living expenses.

This would be particularly helpful to young families trying to meet the 1969 living cost and expenses with a 1943 personal exemption.

Lower- and middle-income families are carrying too heavy a tax burden. Such folk, living on salaries, wags, fees, and commis-

## Local Youth Refurbish Center

At this time when riots, rebellions, vandalism, loose morals and other objectionable things a few are engaging in are so much in the limelight, it is encouraging to realize the majority of young people are not of that caliber and are not disposed in that direction.

Therefore, it behooves the public to magnify the constructive things the youth are doing and to lend encouragement to them to strive even harder to accomplish enough good to outweigh the bad.

Iowa Park has a host of young persons of whom any town can be proud. A current project is the cleaning, repairing and painting of the Youth Center, which has been in need of repair for a long time.

The Youth Center was originally built by Iowa Park Jaycees, and it was considered an asset to the city for civic, club, social and family meetings.

Jaycees bought the building of Sheppard AFB and, with assistance of Jaycee-Ettes, worked faithfully for months to fashion it into an attractive, convenient structure.

As time passed, volunteer labor and money necessary for upkeep of the building waned, and with vandalism added to deterioration it was fast becoming passe so far as its usefulness was concerned.

In summer of last year Jaycees turned the Youth Center over to the City and the Council named Leroy Threest as director of the Youth Center and its activities.

During the past year private clubs, one for junior high and another for high school age set, have been enjoying supervised dances over weekends. A few weeks ago the older group decided the building is an "eye sore" in the most painful sense, and they set about to give it a new appearance.

They have achieved wonders, considering limited funds and materials they have to work with. The City bought some basic white and green paints for them, and through generosity of parents and friends they have secured more paint in exciting colors and mixed it to satisfy their desire for psychedelic effects applied to furniture, chairs, doors, windows etc.

Speaking of windows, the boys and girls, under direction of Rusty Struifell have shown ingenuity perhaps to greatest advantage through eye-catching abstract drawings on the inside of the frames. Done on masonite, the drawings inspired by Rusty have replaced the old dirty, shattered panes which offered no beauty or cheerfulness.

The City plans to do away with the outside windows, thus eliminating the continuous task of replacing broken panes.

The young people have carefully applied, not slung, the basic paint on the walls and have just as carefully changed the complexion of the drab furniture and chairs to exciting shades of blue, red, purple, green and black.

One of the hardest jobs they have tackled is improving floors. Much of the tile has had to be replaced, and this was followed by hours and hours of scrubbing, waxing and polishing. Rest rooms have been repaired and repainted. The youthful corps of workers plans to rejuvenate the kitchen, hall and small rooms.

During the past year, a major project was to build a bandstand, which is their "pride and joy." Among other things that would increase their joy would be carpet for the stage, more paint, and kitchen-type tables. They are not asking for new things, for they will count it a privilege to repair and repaint anything that is given to them.

Hats off to this group of young people and to those everywhere who are setting such worthy example and are helping disprove the idea that 20th century youth are fickle, irresponsible, unstable and unfit to assume responsibilities of the world of tomorrow.

**Postage Increase**

Postal rate increases are facing Iowa Park residents if present plans of the administration are approved by Congress, Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath said this week. He has been advised that letter mail will be increased to 7 cents. Bulk third-class mail and most magazines and newspapers will be upped 20 per cent above today's rates.

To recapitulate:  
First class mail: Letters, 7 cents an ounce and postal cards 6 cents each, on July 1. Air mail will remain at 10 cents.

Second-class mail: Handling charge of 0.3 cent per piece for circulation outside home counties, effective July 1.

Third-class mail: Single pieces, one cent per piece added. Regular bulk third-class, minimum rate of 4.2 cents effective Jan. 1, 1970.

**Flower Garden Moved Here from Olton**

Cedar Nook Iris Garden at 215 South Park has special meaning to Mr. and Mrs. Dean Miller because about 600 varieties of iris were brought here and set out from her late parents' garden in Olton. Cherie and Dean are using the name of the original garden. Mr. and Mrs. I. V. Fent, pioneer residents of Olton, who had extensive land and cattle holdings, started their garden in the 1930's. At first it was just a hobby for Mrs. Fent, but before long she was adding new varieties, and she kept adding each year until the hobby had turned into the well-known Cedar Nook Iris Garden.

When Mrs. Fent died in 1964, Mr. Fent continued to maintain the garden until ill health forced him to give it up. He died in 1966.

Cherie and Dean decided to move the garden to Iowa Park, and started transplanting in the summer of 1968. That period will long be remembered because they worked under such adverse conditions. There were three major hailstorms which resulted in tremendous damage to plant and property, with plenty of rain in between hailstorms.

With three pre-schoolers and 200 miles from Iowa Park, matters were not simplified.

By October 1968 the last plant was set out after four trips to Olton, and all were labeled and charted. Along with the old, the Millers added several new ones: Christmas Time, Blue Petticoats, Fashion Flirt, Light and Lovely, Orange Chariot, and many others including 23 re-blooming irises. Dean and Cherie plan to encircle the garden with cedars as was the one in Olton, which accounted for its name.

Among the varieties are all of the Dykes Medal winners, and one named "Cherie," which is one of Dean's favorites.

Miller is guidance counselor in Iowa Park. Mrs. Miller is a graduate of WTSU, Canyon, where he majored in physical education. She taught at Brownfield for seven years before their marriage. As dear as her iris garden is to her, it is secondary to being a homemaker, wife and mother.

The three children are Lee Allen, 6; Dee Lynne, 4; and Kenneth 2.

The family are affiliated with St. Paul's Lutheran church in Wichita Falls.

The Millers have mailed 400 catalogs this spring. She had an educational exhibit at the Florarama Show in Wichita Falls last Saturday; and 5th grade science class of Kidwell school will visit the garden this week.

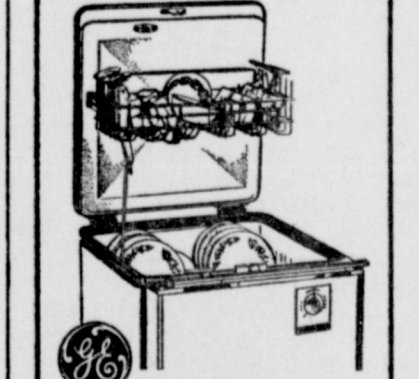

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. (b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. (c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

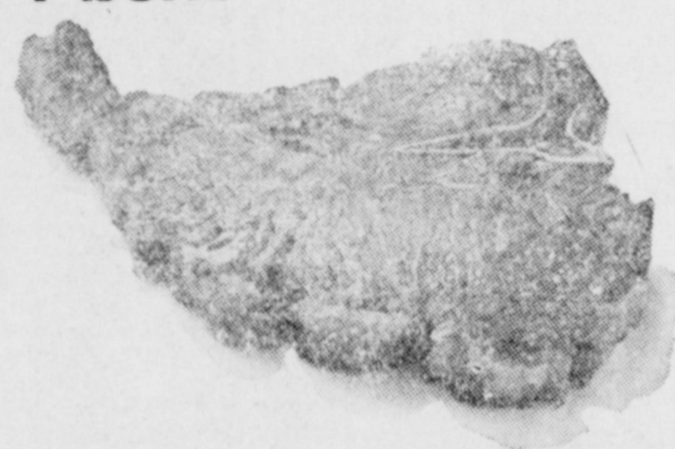
