## Mud and Wind Cut Scoring of Regional Win

In rain drenched Lowrey field at Lubbock last Friday, the Tommy Watkins Hawks advanced to semi-finals of AA Schoolboy football with 14-7 victory over the Reagan County Owls from Big Lake. The game was played under the most adverse conditions with the 25 to 35 mile winds being main difficulties.

A heavy rain just before kickoff made footing for all players quite loose. Wind, mud, and an 11-man Owl defense held Iowa Park to its lowest point total of the year.

Hawk fans who braved the wet and cold were treated to a touchdown on the fifth play of the game. Lee Dawson had recovered an Owl fumble on their 12. Jeff McDonald on his third running try got the marker on an 11-yard scamper around right end.

Dependable Jerry Pittman split the uprights for the conversion. Hawk boosters had hopes of many more points to come. Reagan County had other ideas, and their big line and strong linebackers stopped the Hawk running attack time and again when it looked like our boys might break away.

The football changed hands rapidly, with each team having 5 possessions in the first quarter and 4 in the second stanza.

The Hawks kept the Owls deep in their end of the field in the first 12 minutes. Just before the half Reagan County forced the ball down to the Hawk 18 and had first down. A 15-yard penalty and a fine play by Garv Frazier who trapped Jo Jo Barnes for 10 yards preceded Ansell's pass interception that killed the threat.

After a wind swept band show, the mud splattered warriors returned to the bog, each trying to penetrate the other's defense. In Quarter 3 each team had 4 possessions with the Hawks holding an edge in field position.

When the teams traded directions in the last chapter, the Owls took the wind advantage and the Hawks were 7 points in the lead.

On the first play in the 4th quarter, Barnes passed and Steve Watson intercepted, returning to the Owl 18. McDonald made a yard but Williams and Catlin were thrown for losses. Frazier punted to the Big Lake 3. Both teams were guilty of fouls and the Owls had 1st down on their 3.

On first play Barnes quick kicked the length of the field. Ansell finally got the ball and returned to the 20. A penalty put it on the 10.

We were 90 yards from a score and had that terrible wind blowing in our faces, and only 7 points separated us from disaster. Jeff

hit the line and was downed on the 12. He hit it again and something gave! He stumbled as he reached open ground, got his balance and raced 83 yards past the entire Owl team for his and our second TD.

That run was one of the most startling and thrilling plays of current IPHS football history. A 14-point lead with 7 minutes and some seconds left, Hawk fans began to breathe again.

The kick and runback left the Owls needing 63 to score. Jo Jo began leading his team downfield passing time and again to Watson. In 14 plays they moved in for their TD. Nunnally kicked the conversion.

The kickoff was an outside del which Ansell covered on the Hawk 43. Time left was 4:22. Steve Catlin was quarterback replacing Jim Clapp, who had been injured. His pass to Ansell for 7 yards was a big play. With 4th and 2, Coach Watkins sent McDonald in to plunge the line. His 2-yard gain kept the Hawks in possession. McDonald carried three more times and chucked up another first down. Clapp, Watson and McDonald gained 6 more and held onto the fourth play until a penalty was called. Frazier then proceeded to kick the ball out of bounds on the Owl 16, with 31 seconds left. Steve Watson intercepted Barnes' second pass to wind up the game.

All of our boys played excellent football for the entire 43 minutes. They gave 100 per cent effort in bringing home victory No. 13.

For truly outstanding effort, McDonald was named Back of the Week; Ansell was Lineman of the week. Biggest plays were made by McDonald, offensive; and Watson, defensive.

## Iowa Park Suffers Great Loss in Death of Mrs. C. W. Coppock

Funeral service was conducted Wednesday in Iowa Park United Methodist church for Mrs. Harriett Wood Coppock. She died in Wichita Falls on Monday after several years of failing health.

Other affiliations included membership in Modern Music Study club, Iowa Park Organ club, 23 Study club, the Athletic club, a social group. She also was a sponsor of Epsilon Eta chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority.

She is survived by a niece, who suggests that memorial be sent to Iowa Park United Methodist church.

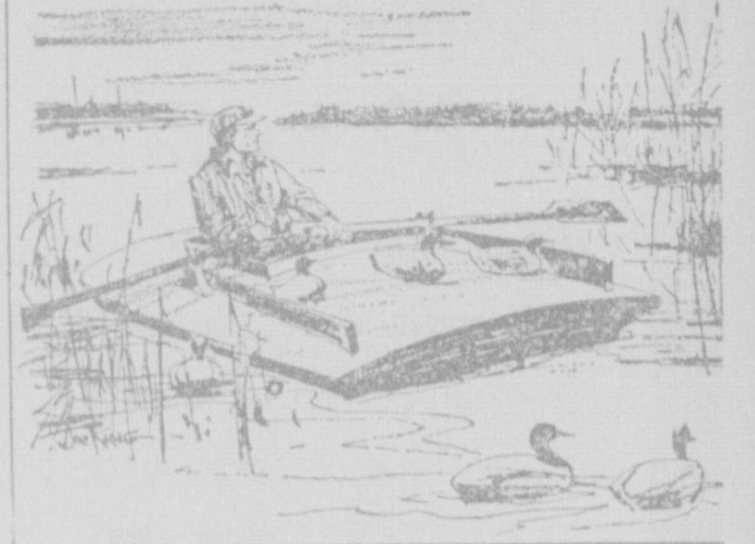
## Duck Hunters, Arise... It's a Great Year!

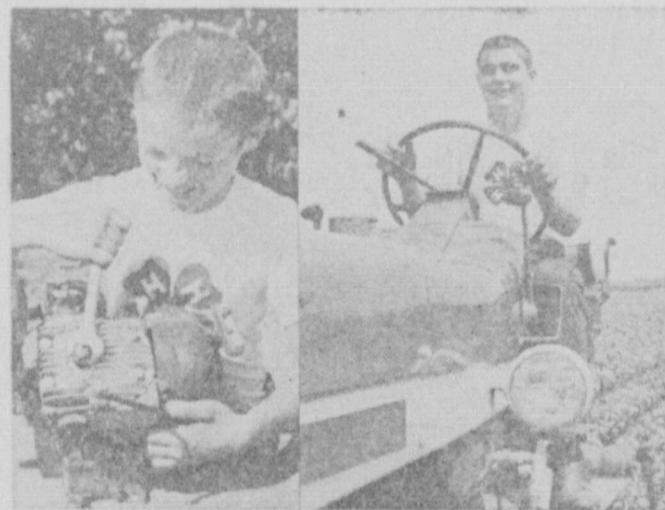

### Youths Seek Action In 4-H Petroleum Power Program

America today moves on a sea of oil. Petroleum powers industry, government and the home.

And for many 4-H'ers, petroleum makes the tractor go, pushes a boat through the water, drives the lawn mower and lets him race across the snow in a snowmobile.

The national 4-H Petroleum Power program conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service, encourages 4-H'ers to do all of these things.

The program's goal is to help youth acquire knowledge of the science and research pertaining to fuels, lubricants, engines and equipment. It gives them opportunities to learn about the care and operation of engines and equipment and to skillfully, safely and economically handle these machines.

There are over 70,000 members enrolled in the program in the 48 continental United States. Formerly known as the 4-H Tractor program, it has been sponsored by the American Oil Foundation for

25 years. The present program offers expanded opportunities to all youth regardless of residence—tractor projects for rural youth, small engines projects for youth in urban, suburban and rural areas.

Recently two national tractor operators' contests were held to determine the competence of 4-H youth in operating and maintaining equipment. And at the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 30-Dec. 4, six national winners of \$600 educational scholarships will be announced.

Selection will be made by the Extension Service from state winners who receive an expense-paid trip to the 4-H Congress. Medal awards also will be given at the county level. All awards are offered through the National 4-H Service Committee by American Oil Foundation.

Additional information about youths' opportunities in the 4-H Petroleum Power program may be gotten from the local county extension agent.

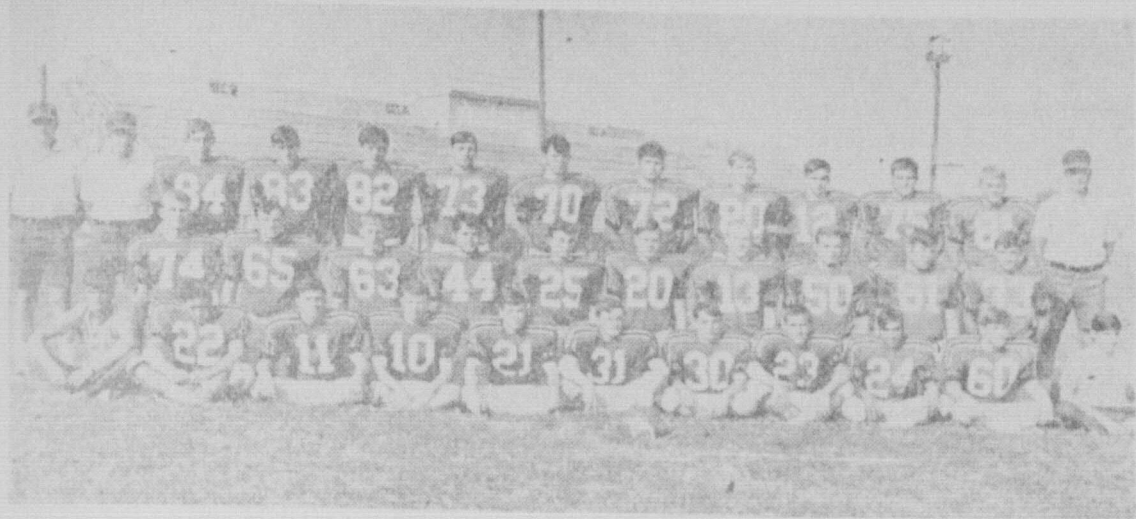
