#### ≡SOIL CONSERVATION™ DISTRICT NEWS



At preent about 4000 acres of rangeland are being seeded to native grass in Iowa Park work unit area. This seeding is being done in conjuncton with rootplowing and tree-dozing operations to control mesquite which has nyaded these pastures.

Cost of seeding will vary with kind and amount of seed used, degree of seed-bed preparation, and expense of protection until established.
