Council Adds Penalty to Law

ORDINANCE NO. 120A
An amendment to the ordinance providing for the adoption of regulations relating to the installation, maintenance and operation of unfired pressure vessels, and all appurtenances and devices relating thereto within the City Limits of the City of Iowa Park of Wichita County, Texas, to provide for a penalty clause in the event of the violation of the provision thereof.

It was introduced by the Council of the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, in regular session assembled on this the 14th day of April, A.D. 1969, that the provisions of Ordinance No. 120 be hereby ratified and confirmed to the extent therein provided, and that in the event that the provisions of such Ordinance be violated a penalty be affixed for such violation, and that each such violation shall be constituted a separate offense, and any person, persons, corporation or other entity committing such offense of violation of such Ordinance shall be fined not less than Ten and No /100 (\$10.00) Dollars, nor more than Two Hundred and No 100 (\$200.00) Dollars, for each offense of violation of such provisions of said Ordinance.

Introduced and passed to the first reading on April 14, A.D. 1969.

All citizens, friends and friendly enemies are invited to be at the high school at 7:30 p.m. May 1, to hear a report to our citizens on their analysis of our City with the view of providing clean, orderly and healthy development and growth in the near and distant future.

Recently the City Council approved the mayor's appointment of a City Planning Commission to study the City's need in connection with reports made to our citizens by Planning Associates, Inc.

Membership of the planning commission is made up of six citizens who have demonstrated their civic interest and ability and who have agreed to serve free. They are Donald Hill, Jerry Lane, Dean Miller, Fred Parkey, Jack Shults, Milton Taylor.

Mayor and City Secretary are also members ex-officio, but the latter is not a voting member.

The commission has met with Bob Middleton of PAI on several occasions the past two months

and we hope on May 1 to have presented to the entire citizenry the proposals and recommendations regarding base mapping and land usage.

Public meeting have been held in the past two years to obtain ideas from you, and now the Professional Planners and our Planning Commission are ready to present proposals and recommendations for your study, reaction and response before adoption of a final plan for orderly growth and development of Iowa Park.

The adoption of a comprehensive plan and its implementation will be the most important single action affecting all the citizens of Iowa Park over the next 5 to 15 years. This is not a Zoning Ordinance.

7. Continuing support of established Beef Heifer Chain now available to local 4-H and FFA members.
8. Work with local agricultural agencies in sponsoring of adult agri-business, farm meetings or tours.
9. Co-operate with Wichita C of C in promotion of a rural recreational booklet.
10. Miscellaneous expense items Total budget expenses amounted to \$600. Directors agreed to accept the program and budget.

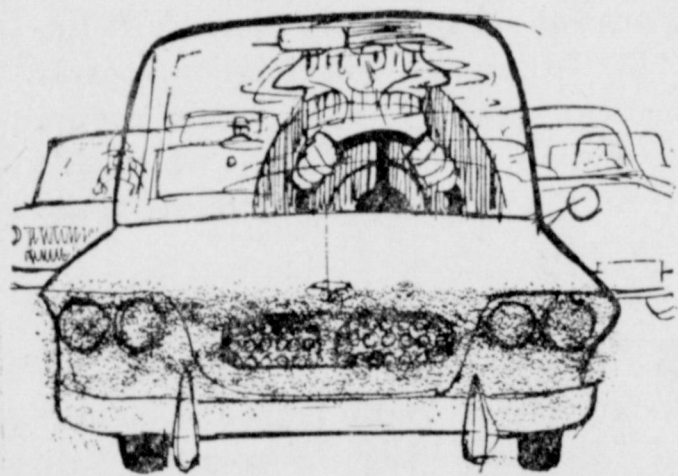

Mrs. M. L. Hines conducted business and urged members to write the presidents of the three broadcasting systems requesting improvement in programs.

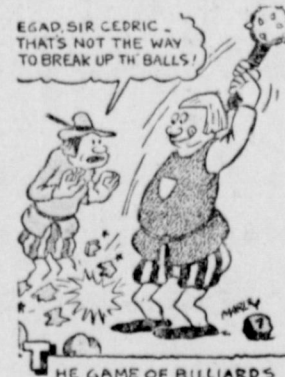

Veal Dinner A Delight

Change familiar veal cutlets to some fancy veal rolls. Topped with a sumptuous mushroom gravy, these rolls will delight your family and guests alike.

| 8 slices Italian-style veal cutlet | 1/4 teaspoon dried basil, crushed |
| 1 teaspoon salt | 3 sprigs parsley |
| 1 cup finely chopped onion | 1 small stalk celery |
| 1/2 cup chopped parsley | 1 small bay leaf |
| 2 tablespoons margarine | Dash pepper |
| 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced | 1/4 cup white wine |
| | 1 cup light cream |
| | 1 tablespoon corn starch |

Sprinkle each slice of veal lightly with salt and 1 tablespoon each of chopped onion and parsley. Roll from smaller end and secure with a wooden pick. Meanwhile, melt margarine in skillet over medium heat or in electric frypan according to manufacturer's directions. Add veal rolls and cook about 10 minutes, turning as needed, or until pale brown on all sides. Add the mushrooms; cover and cook 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in the remaining 1/2 cup chopped onion, basil, pepper, parsley, celery, bay leaf and wine. Reduce heat; cover and simmer about 15 minutes or until veal is tender. Remove picks from rolls; discard parsley sprigs, celery and bay leaf. Place veal rolls on a serving dish; keep warm. Stirring constantly, gradually add cream to corn starch. Stir into mixture in skillet. Simmer over low heat, stirring constantly, until smooth and thickened. Spoon a little sauce over veal. Serve remaining sauce with the veal.

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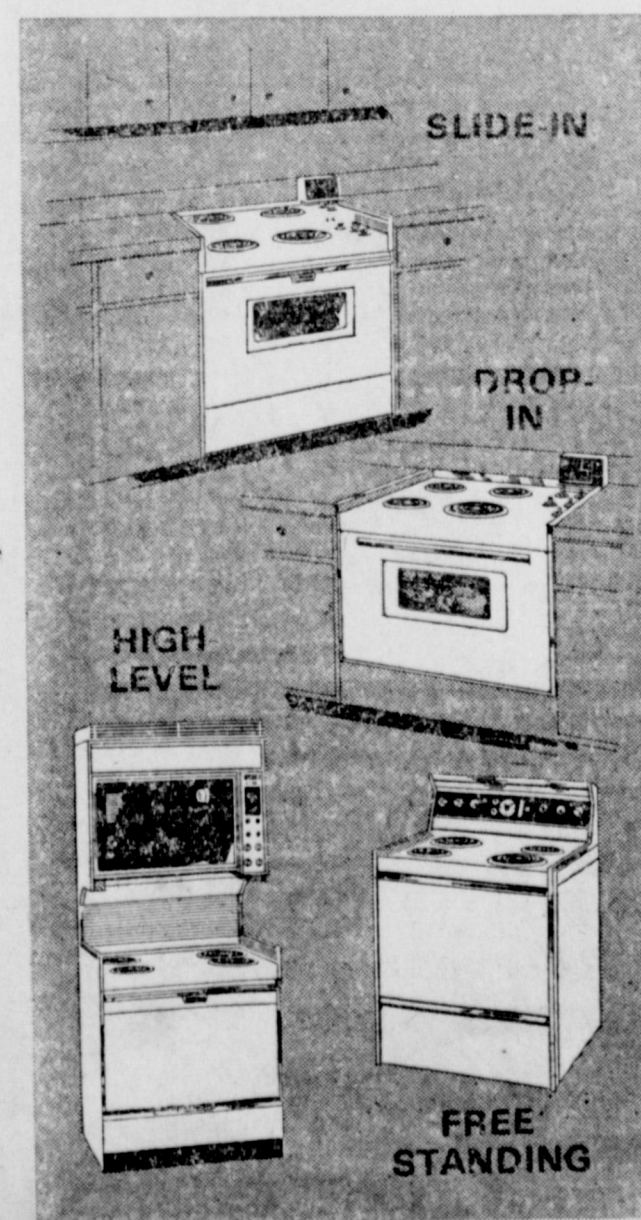
