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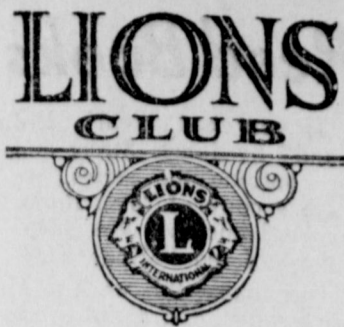

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Water Board Planning Facilities for Recreation, Picnicking

Meeting of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 board members was held Tuesday night at Park Clinic with Dr. Earl F. Watson presiding. They have jurisdiction over Lake Iowa Park and Buffalo Creek Reservoir.

Other board members are Delbert Todd, H. Gaines Maness, O. N. Newman, M. L. Hines.

Lake site facilities, improvements and maintenance were discussed. Todd reported on the joint project with Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce in planting trees and providing picnic tables in the east area of Buffalo Creek Reservoir. He said workmen of Precinct 3 under direction of Commissioner Buck Voyles are mowing grass in picnic area south of dam near pump house.

Water board is encouraging use of recreation facilities at both lakes in areas of boating, fishing, swimming, wading and picnicking. They ask citizens to have a responsible attitude and abide by restrictions imposed by state laws, contracts on original

land purchases, and regulations by board of directors.

Restrictions forbid use of firearms, swimming or wading within 200 feet of water intake. Water skiing is not allowed for safety reasons.

Open two packages of cookies; combine with other instant; and produce this pair of summer desserts.

The first package, Apple Strudel Cookies, forms the bottom crust for vanilla ice cream pie which is served with a fruit sauce.

The second package, Old Fashion Ginger Snaps is layered, parfait style, with instant butterscotch pudding enriched with sour cream.

COOKIE ICE CREAM PIE

Break 18 Apple Strudel Cookies into small pieces and spread evenly on bottom of an 8-inch round cake or quiche pan. Pack 1 quart softened vanilla ice cream on top. Freeze. In a small saucepan, blend 4 teaspoons cornstarch and 1 cup orange juice. Cook until thickened; add 1 (10-ounce) package frozen strawberry halves, thawed. Cool. Stir in 1 medium sliced ripe banana and 1 cup fresh blueberries. Serve over ice cream topped cookies. Makes 8 (3-inch) wedges.

GINGER PARFAIT

Prepare 1 (3 1/2-ounce) package butterscotch instant pudding (according to package directions using 1 1/2 cups milk). Beat in 1/2 cup dairy sour cream; chill. Break 18 Old Fashion Ginger Snaps into small pieces and combine with 6 tablespoons flaked coconut. Layer pudding with crumb mixture in 6 parfait glasses. Garnish each with a whole cookie and coconut. Makes 6 (1 cup) servings.
