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Hawks Hit Panthers Hard 54-7

Iowa Park maintained its top ranking in Class AA this week by trouncing Seymour on its home field 54-7 last Friday night.

The game was a continuation of the Hawks' pattern of play—ball control with just enough aerial display to keep the defense honest.

Jeff McDonald started the scoring parade with a 2-yard plunge to terminate a 72-yard march. Jerry Pittman's first three conversion kicks were successful.

Second scoring play was an 87-yard run by Gary Williams. McDonald added two more TD's in the first half.

Late in second stanza Seymour mounted a successful scoring series which ended with Jerry Arnold's 23-yard run and Brent Moore's conversion kick.

On the ensuing kickoff, William scampered 72 yards to pay dirt.

Score at halftime was 33-7.

Second half scoring was handled by Steve Berry, Steve Webb and Lee Dawson. Berry and Dawson made short TD runs, while Webb pulled off a 23-yard scamper, followed by McDonald's 2-point conversion.

There was only one fumble lost in the whole game, and the referee stepped only 75 penalty yards 30 against Seymour and 45 at expense of Hawks.

With Jim Clapp not suited up, the Hawks did not throw much, completing 2 of 6 passes for 53 yards. The alert Hawk defense intercepted two Panther aeriels and held the opponents to 36 yards overhead and 130 on the ground.

In piling up 26 first downs, the Mean Green made 456 yards the hard way.

Hawk fans by the hundreds will be in Electra this Thursday night to see their idols continue their long string of District victories.

Two Are Dead in Gun Tragedy

Word has been received here of a tragic shooting in Dallas involving Jasper P. Stevenson of Iowa Park. He and his family have resided here about 2 years.

Dallas police have supplied details as follows:
Stevenson, formerly a tobacco products salesman, appeared at the front door of Mr. and Mrs. Tom F. Fedrick in Preston Hollow, Monday evening. Mrs. Fedrick answered his knock. Her husband, sales manager of a tobacco firm, was out of town on business.

Pat Fedrick, 17 heard her mother call "Tom is not here. I can't let you in, Steve, because you've got that gun."

The man broke a section of glass and fired a pistol. Mrs. Fedrick fell as she and Pat fled screaming. The daughter ran out the back way to a neighbor's home.

A policeman arrived to find the woman on the floor. He heard a shot and went to the bathroom where he found Stevenson wounded.

Mrs. Fedrick and Stevenson died about an hour after reaching a hospital.

Stevenson is survived by his widow and two daughters.

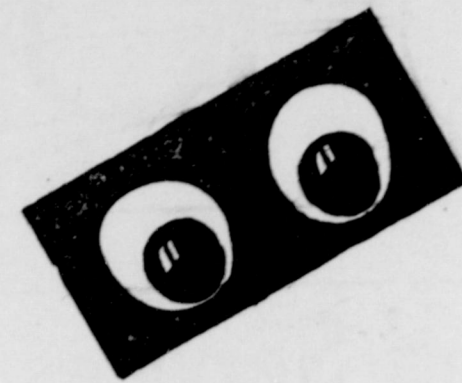

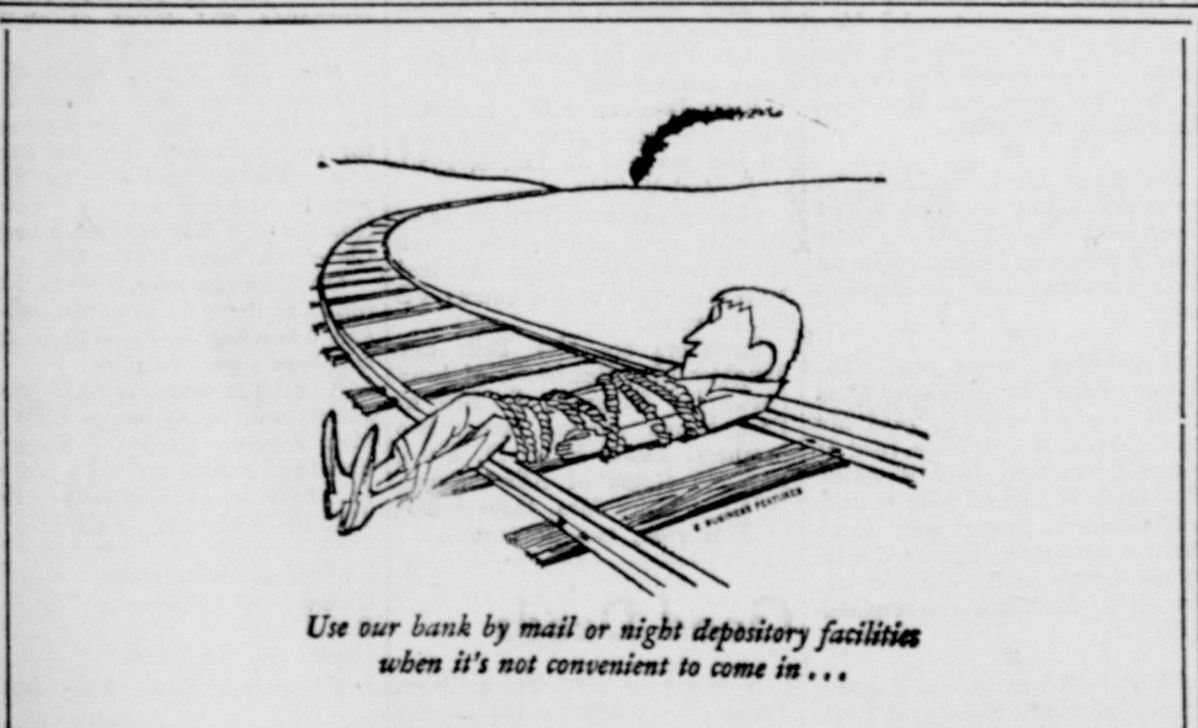

Six policy recommendations were adopted with Foster presid-

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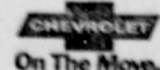

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Mrs. King's Homesite Has Developed Beauty Inside, Out

From every perspective, both outside and inside, the lovely home of Mrs. R. H. King and her son John, a sophomore at West Texas State University, at 510 North Jackson, is one of the most beautiful in the residential section of Iowa Park.

The lawn, a veritable paradise now, was a weed-infested plot of ground in 1959 when Mrs. King who lived at Harrold then, looked at it in considering a site for their home here. She confesses that she has had a yen as long as she can remember to make something attractive out of the unsightly. The high weeds, so offensive to the eye, were a real challenge. Without claiming to be a landscape architect, she has nevertheless laid out the grounds, arranged trees, shrubbery, flowers, fountains and lawn furniture so as to produce a picturesque effect.



Interior of the house is attractive and elegant, and at the same time distinctly different. Complementing beautiful furnishings, rugs and drapes, are many collectors' items, antiques and a varied assortment of articles and accessories of her own handiwork.

Wherever she goes, Mrs. King seeks out antique shops, museums and even junk shops in search of things of value and beauty. She seems to have ability to recognize these upon first sight, which is no doubt responsible for the rare items which she has.

Perhaps most outstanding are two wood carvings of the Holy Family done by a Bavarian wood carver. Both are reproductions of works of Riemenschneider, a German sculptor and woodcarver of 14th century. One is carved in three-fourth relief; other in half relief is Gothic in old style polygraph.

She also has two unusual hand carved brass lamps from India, one heavy ornately carved mantle and two others not quite so massive with beveled mirrors (which she has refinished), a newel post from a historic home in Louisiana which stands in the entry hall, and a page from a 14th century monastery music book of skin which is framed and hanging above the electric organ.

From a sentimental standpoint, the old iron schoolbell which served a vital need at Harrold school for many years, is now a part of the lawn setting off the patio, and is very dear to her.

To get a true picture of Edith King, one must know that she has deep appreciation and respect for pioneers who blazed trails and, through privation and hardships, cleared paths and laid foundations for future generations to build on.

She feels the present generation needs to esteem fully the worth of its heritage and this can be accomplished by making the art, music, culture and traditions of yesteryear more accessible.

Now let's follow Mrs. King to her work rooms, one off the patio and the other a separate building in the rear, where there are literally only "paths" to walk in. Doing things with wood is one of her first loves. Working with iron comes next. When she is creating a wall hanging or ornamental piece where she uses both she is happiest. She needs only to see a piece of wood regardless of kind or shape or condition to spark a flame of her creative ability.

She does nothing perfunctorily and will not give up until she has achieved a professional look. With paint remover, scrubbing, sandpaper, varnish or paint, and a lot of elbow grease, she soon has a piece of wood shaped into a wall hanging or decorator item.

When time comes to choose an accessory, Edith's thoughts turn naturally to iron, so she goes to her collection retrieved from junk heaps for the most part, and with skillfulness of contrivance and design she turns out an object of interest and beauty.

Old porch columns, table legs and picture frames not only present special challenges to Mrs. King but seem to inspire her to create things in an individual manner. She has fashioned some candlesticks out of the first two; and picture frames have been used in unusual ways. In John's bathroom, one serves as a shadow box in which he keeps shaving lotion and cologne.

John has a natural talent for decorating and his mother cher-

ishes his comments and suggestions. The two of them are presently working together on a project. She has a mental image of fashioning a skyline collage of part of the city of Wichita Falls with blocks of wood. He will install the electrical mechanism similar to the one on City National Bank building.

Decoupage is an art in which Edith excels. Here again she is not satisfied with anything short of perfection. She considers a Shakespearean poster which hangs in John's room at Canyon one of her best efforts in the art. However, many pieces in the home attest to her ability. Also in her son's bathroom is a decoupage picture on the wall which has slender chair legs on either side for accessories. She is excited about some ancient streetcar orna-

ments and summer fronts for fireplaces she discovered recently.

Edith does needlepoint and arranges flowers, too. Twenty-five years ago she dried some rose petals and made a potpourri sachet which still retains fragrance.

The former Edith Pearson of Harrold, she attended ACC and received a degree from WTSU. She taught at Harrold, King's High and Medicine Mound with her late husband. She is member of Christian church and Order of Eastern Star.

John is a speech and drama student at WTSU. Last summer he was a member of the cast for "Texas, a Musical Romance of Panhandle History" staged in the Pioneer Amphitheater in Palo Duro Canyon state park.



Mrs. Lochridge Sports Watch of 1903 Vintage as Mod Fashion

The large watch with closed face worn by men at turn of the century is making a comeback.

Replaced during World War I by the handy wrist watch, the finely engraved and handsome watch and fob or chain is now being worn by women as a decorative piece of jewelry. The fact that her watch also keeps good time is only an incidental dividend.

The gold, engraved Elgin being worn these days by Mrs. Oscar E. Lochridge, besides adding to her modern appearance, has an interesting history.

The late Mr. Lochridge became proud owner of the watch in 1913 at age 13. It was a gift from his parents Mr. and Mrs. L. N. Lochridge.

Lottie recently got out the watch and had a jeweler friend inquire of the Elgin company as to its age. The timepiece was made in 1903.

Young Lochridge didn't get to enjoy possession of the watch long at first, because he lost it in the field he was plowing in about 1916. Thorough search of the field netted nothing. In 1918, Oscar was in the army but did not go overseas. In 1919 he and Miss Lottie Denny, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Denny jr. were married.

In 1916 the late Ray Harriman was plowing the field in which Oscar had lost his watch. It came into view and Ray brought it to Oscar. Not greatly damaged by the elements after 10 years, the watch was cleaned and oiled and has kept good time ever since.

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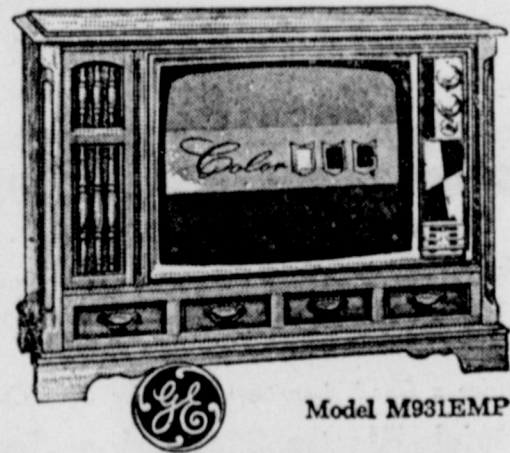
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
