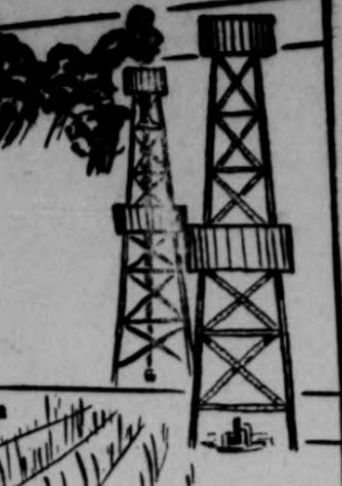

Jackets and Gifts

Plight of farmers is certainly getting attention of every segment of our national economy. Acknowledgment that the situation is serious is indicated in the wide publicity given to statements on the subject made by every congressional leader, labor leader, spokesman for banking interests, manufacturing and merchandising associations.

There is much chaff mixed with the grain in statements issued and articles published on the subject.

Present administration's sliding scale farm program has created such a deplorable situation that it will have top priority in activities of Congress when it convenes in January. That the program is wrong was indicated when its proponents deserted it like rats from a sinking ship.

In most cases, the remedial ideas advanced have long been advocated by Farmers Union. For instance, an article reported by the New York Times and Des Moines Register: "The administration is actively considering a ceiling of farm price support loans. Prime objective of the limit is to take away from big producers of surplus crops the government's price umbrella incentive and thereby to cut production."

This proposal, long advocated by Farmers Union, was part of the Brannan Plan proposed in 1949 by then Secretary of Agriculture, who is now a leading figure in National Farmers Union. At that time it was denounced by most Republican congressional leaders and by Farm Bureau.

This proposal also advocated by L. Judson Morhouse, New York state Republican chairman, in a letter to Secy Benson. He urged high price supports be provided on a basic family-farm size volume of production, and graduated downward on production in excess of that. Doing this, he wrote, would "raise prices to the little farmer and lower prices to the big guy."

Some of the chaff that filters with the grain is indicated in two announcements. International Harvester company sales manager R. W. Dibble told the Kentucky Retail Farm Equipment association last week: Farmers have enough money to buy all the output of implement makers for the next four years.

In addition, Dibble declared, each farmer could buy a Cadillac car, mink coat and other luxuries, and have enough left to buy all the fertilizer he needs.

Meanwhile the Oliver corporation farm machinery plant in Charles City, Iowa, announced it was laying off 20 per cent of its employees within two weeks. The Floyd county relief office announced it will again order surplus food for distribution to needy in the plant area.

Mr. Bishop died at 7:30 a.m. Wednesday in a Wichita Falls hospital following a recent heart attack and complications.

He was born Jan. 26, 1896, in Baldwin county, Miss., and moved to Ennis with his parents George W. and Ellen Bishop in 1898.

He was married to Miss Jerolene Quinley in August 1922. They lived in Greenville and Snyder before coming to Wichita County in 1926.

Mr. Bishop was one of the pioneers of the irrigated valley farms and participated in many activities that encouraged better agriculture. He was a member of the Farm Security Administration board and the Wichita county program building committee for agricultural extension. He was active in soil conservation, irrigation development and progressive agriculture.

Mr. Bishop was a member of the Iowa Park Old Fellows lodge and was active in school and religious activities of Valley View.

Survivors are his widow and two sons George Robert and Carl Ray, all of Valley View; two daughters Mrs. Luther W. Ellis of Fort Worth and Mrs. Loy R. Norris of Montgomery, Ala.; two sisters Mrs. Billie Salyer of Dallas and Mrs. Jettie N. Conner of Wichita Falls; four grandchildren.

From where I sit... by Joe Marsh

Mr. Evans from the Lighting Company gave an interesting talk at the Community Hall last night—on how farmers can cut electric bills. For those who missed it, here's a short recap.
Don't try to light up the eaves in the rafters. Use a reflector and a smaller bulb will probably do the job. Too many farmers use naked bulbs that waste 50% of the light.
Try using moveable projector bulbs that beam light the way a searchlight does. A couple of these "spots" will often give you

better illumination than a gang of juice-wasting overhead lamps.
From where I sit, it's amazing how often we misuse the things we have... like electricity. We also make a mistake if we misuse our right of personal choice—about which candidate to vote for, say, or whether beer or coffee makes the ideal mealtime drink—by trying to force our opinions on others. Respect for the other fellow's point of view should be our "guiding light."

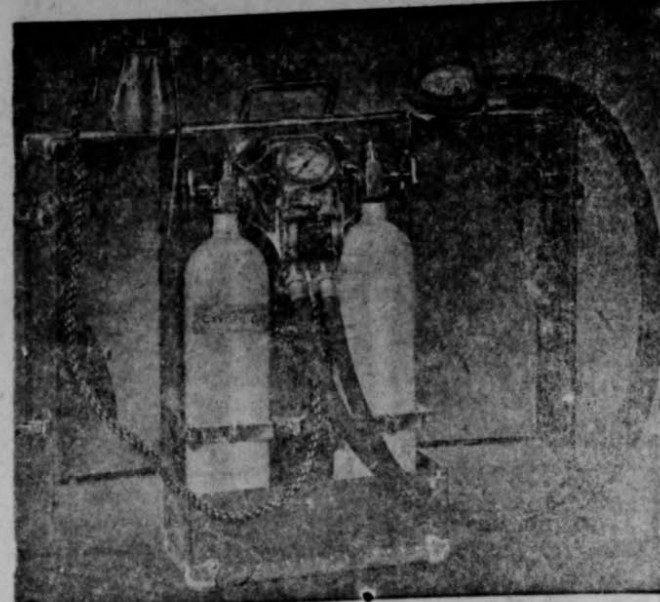

Miracle Life Saving Machine



Iowa Park Volunteer Firemen are trying to add another piece of equipment to the department to help them protect the lives of the folk in this area.

No larger than a suitcase, the resuscitator actually has brought people back to life after they have been declared dead. It is a miracle worker when accidents causing failure occur—accidents such as drowning, electric shock, smoke suffocation, gas poisoning or just plain shock from an automobile accident.

And the resuscitator works just as well if a patient is struggling to breathe after a heart attack or a bad spell of asthma.

Use of the machine is so simple a child could save a life with this portable machine. All it needs to function is oxygen, and that is available at filling stations and welding shops. The two tanks are kept full for emergency use at all times.

"Help the community restore the breath of life to someone" is the slogan of the Firemen as they begin a drive to buy this machine. It can be seen at the Lone Star Gas or Texas Electric Service offices here.

You may give your donation to any member of the Fire department, at the State National Bank, or at the place where the resuscitator is on display.

A complete list will be kept, and if there isn't enough money donated to buy the machine, the money will be returned to its donors.

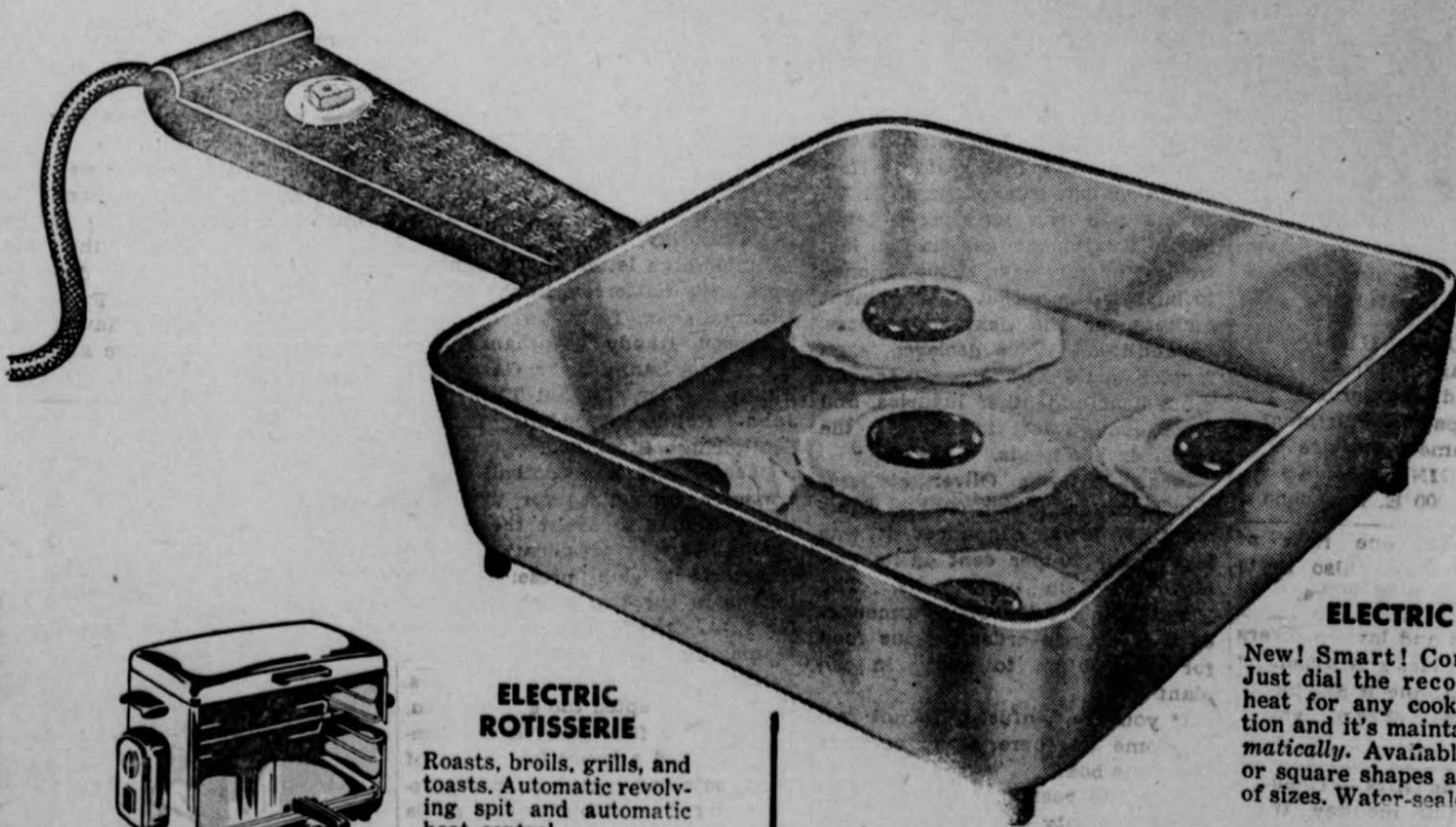

San Jose, Costa Rica
December 4, 1955

Our Beloved Mother,
Here's wishing our precious mother the most wonderful Christmas ever! Just wish we could all

be together—how wonderful that would be.

Enclosed are two pictures of our family—one for you and one for dad.

Some missionaries came through here on their way to the States and I sent your present with them and they will mail it to you in the States. I hope you like it. They are the Hales from Bolivia and are from the Northwest District. They had Thanksgiving with all of us missionaries but David Kensinger and Lewie were out in the country for over two weeks and on Thanksgiving Day were eating beans and rice while we had a lovely dinner.

I had expected Lewie back next Tues, but he surprised me by coming in yesterday and were we glad to see him. He and David K. were so worn out that they came home for they had had the hardest trip they have ever had on the mission field. It will take Lewie to tell you about it but they sure went through a lot.

Lewie went to San Isidro then by mule to Zapotal where the Lord blessing in a wonderful way.

ambler have recently gotten saved and filled with the Holy Spirit. It back in the jungle and nearly everyone there is a believer and I sink most of the believers have received the Holy Spirit. Their new church is almost finished.

From there Lewie went to Volcan where one of our Bible school students from last year is pastoring—has opened up a new work and has four other preaching men. God is blessing there too and souls are being saved. Lewie applied seven in water in that area. They are clearing a lot to build at least temporary quarters for their services.

from there Lewie went to Potrero Grande where he spent so much time before Bible school. The church is so pretty and the pastor is made more beautiful benches. There is a real move on there for Lord and souls are being saved. A drunkard who used to pass over the river and at times had to do it, has gotten saved and he brought another man to Jesus who was hungry to hear the Gospel so after Lewie talked to him about an hour he accepted his faith. He begged them to visit his sister and others three hours from here for he was sure they would accept the Lord also.

In another place two got saved and the people there are so hungry for God.

Lewie went by small plane to Palmar Sur down in the banana belt and on to Golfo where he met David Kensinger and together they visited other works. One of our students of this year just went into a new work on the Panama border and Lewie and David took them there. He is so zealous and as a darling wife and four beautiful children. They had lost everything nearly in a recent earthquake and all their possessions were about our boxes weighing about 100 lbs. imagine! I gave them one of those boxes full of clothes, etc.

Lewie and David went on to the Italian Colony and coming back night overtook them and they had to walk through mud almost to their thighs. They could hardly make it and were so weary that they would walk a hundred yards and have to rest, then trudge on a little farther having to pull their legs out of the mud. David lost his shoe in the mud once. They were hungry and cold and wet and sick. Finally Lewie said he could go no farther. They had an old mule carrying their saddle bags so he just lay over the mule for a ways while David held on to the tail. Then David would lie over the mule and so on.

Lewie said it was like a nightmare, stumbling over rocks, shrubs, etc., for they could not see. They were so completely exhausted that they came home sooner. Lewie had wet shoes on for two weeks.

Farmers are reminded that if farm machinery and equipment are cleaned, serviced and repaired before they are stored, their useful life can be extended and they will be ready to use next spring.

Winter is an excellent time to apply chemical controls on undesirable hardwood trees.

It isn't too early to purchase the seed needed for next year's crops. Early buying means a better selection, and money may be saved.

Give the youngsters a special treat this year—a Christmas tree all their own. Miss Thelma Wirges, HD agent, suggests a small tree set in a bucket of damp sand, with lots of safe decorations to trim the tree.
