Iowa Park Wins District Title with Perfect Season

Iowa Park Hawks turned all the power and fury of their unbeaten season on the Irish of Shamrock last Friday night. When the final whistle had blown the Mean Green could boast their sixth straight District 2-AA title with an all-victories season. Score was 31-6.

A large crowd of Irish partisans and hundreds of Hawk fans were treated to a superb game. The Irish fought with might and main but could not stem the tide of fast running back and strong plunging line crashers.

Hampered by three fumbles in the near freezing weather, the

Hawks ground out 316 yards on the ground. Jim Clapp fired 10 passes with 5 completions and 2 interceptions, good for 67 yards and one TD.

As usual, the Watkins coached squad scattered its scoring among the backs with only Steve Webb hitting paydirt twice.

Forcing their way to the 1 in the first quarter, the Hawks then scored on a quarterback sneak by Clapp. Jerry Pittman made the PAT kick.

In the second stanza Webb hit the goal line after a 10-yard run, and Pittman added the point.

His field goal try in the same quarter was good from the 12, and the rest period found Iowa Park nursing a 17 point lead.

Jackie Perkins made a 15-yard pass play in the 3rd quarter and Gary Frazier was elected to add the extra point. It was good.

Webb's 1-yard plunge and Pittman's good kick wound it up for the Mean Green.

Shamrock's points came on a 45 yard run by Donald Rhodes with only four minutes remaining. The pass for extra points was incomplete.

Tangle with Dalhart Friday

Coach Tommy Watkins' undefeated, untied Hawks will tangle Friday night at 8:00 in Vernon with Dalhart Wolves coached by Doc Rowell.

Dalhart comes into the play-off with a perfect record against Class AA teams. Their three losses were to AAA schools. Wolves suffered only one shutout, that to Hereford, 14-0.

Hawks will have to keep their talons poised for No. 37 Stanley Hughes, a 170-pounder with good speed and determination.

FB Selso Ramirez, 150 lb., is a hard running line smasher who

likes to hit the middle on trap plays.

Most times the Wolves run from Wing-T formation with an occasional flanker. Sometimes they put 3 offensive men wide to right, and have been known to use the Dallas pro T offense with split end and a flanker back wide.

QB Ricky Heiskell, No. 11, at 180 is the biggest Wolf back. He is a fine outside runner and a capable passer.

Ramirez is the bread-and-butter man of the offense with most of his yardage earned right up the middle.

Hawk coach Watkins likens the Wolves to Shamrock in quickness and hitting ability. Their linebackers in the middle pursue well and hit hard. Dowdy No. 44 and Bill Frazier No. 71 are the two middle linebackers.

No. 72 Rex Bush is most outstanding, going both ways, and weighing 190 pounds.

The Hawks have been working hard to get ready for this game. Coach Watkins has brought up two boys, Greg Frazier and Jimmy Green. It is possible that either or both will see action in the play-offs.

Stadium Fund Drive Progressing Steadily

Funds for the proposed stadium to be built on the new high school grand are growing each day. Total proposed cost of the stadium is estimated to be near \$125,000.

Architect for the new facility is Don Reed and his fee for work on the plans will be approximately \$4,780. He has indicated he will make a sizable contribution to the stadium fund out of this figure.

Donations that have been accepted by the fund chairman are estimated to be around \$4000 in cash with several more expected. Sale of tickets on the automobile netted \$916.90, which brings the total to about \$5000.

All excavation expense for the sunken playing field has been arranged for. Dirt chairman Buck Voyles and Fred Parkey have announced they have lined up 10 contractors and equipment to handle the dirt moving. They estimate this as saving of \$25,000.

J & R Shell Service Station has contributed diesel fuel for the machinery.

Donation of a complete scoreboard is in the offing, and a matching contribution has been promised.

Arrangements for concrete for the entire project have been made with concrete suppliers, to be provided at their cost. This \$5,000 saving can be added to the fund.

A steel company has made arrangements with Iowa Park Booster club to let them have steel for the project at cost — another saving of \$5,000.

Light towers and lights have been arranged for by Booster club at saving of about \$6,000. This figure stems from costs of light towers and lights at the new Vernon stadium.

Approximate total of these savings on actual cost, plus cash donations leaves about \$79,000 yet to be raised.

Remainder of this money is expected to come from football fans of the Hawks. Booster club has set a goal of \$50,000 to be donated, for which the donors

will receive stadium seat options.

The balance of \$29,000 is expected to be raised by sale of Revenue Bonds.

Misunderstanding on the seat options has caused quite a stir among Hawk fans. Several long-time boosters have been mistaken in the belief they have to make a stadium seat option pledge or donation to get a seat in the new stadium. This is not true.

The stadium will have about 3,250 seats on the Home side. The options, in line with contributions, will be exercised on a fairness basis. When you make a contribution—either cash, labor, materials, or by pledge—you are making a contribution to betterment of Hawk football in Iowa Park.

You are not buying the right to have a seat in the new stadium. As of now, in our present stadium, there are 750 season ticket holders who by right of precedent hold the rights to those tickets. Unless some person who holds an option now turns in that option, no other person may purchase season tickets.

The option system seemed the only way to allocate seats in the new stadium. The option system has definite drawbacks, but it also appears to be the only way the people of Iowa Park can have a new stadium.

It is up to individual Hawk fans and boosters to make contributions and raise the money. Study the option sheet carefully. It may be to your advantage to put your contributions into a group gift for a better option!

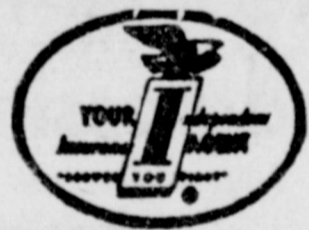

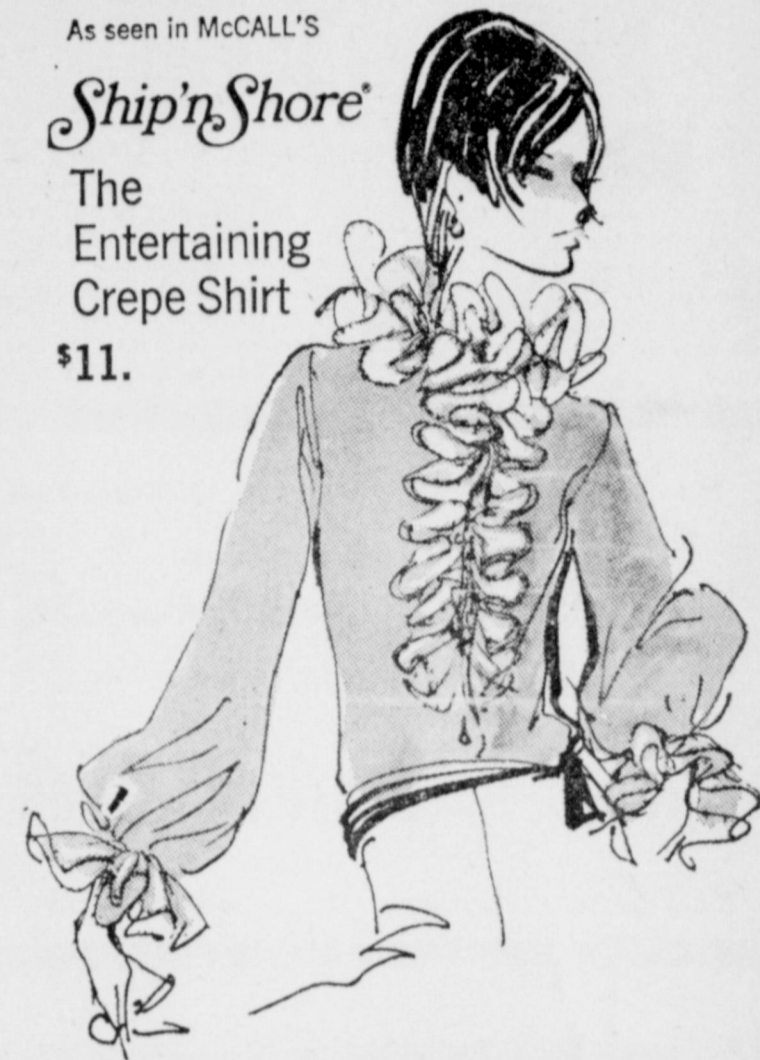
