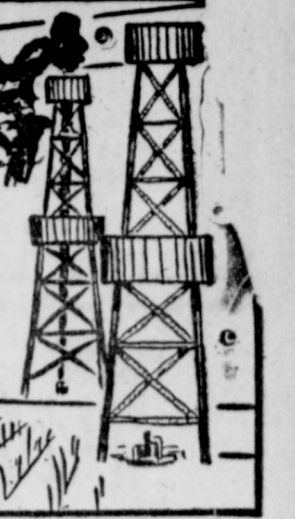

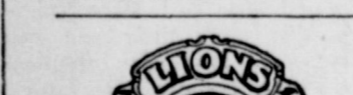
City Council

Budget for the next fiscal year starting July 1 was adopted and salaries for city employees were set effective Aug. 1 at City Council meeting Monday night.
In other action it was voted to do the following:
Accept the offer of Wichita Falls building department to make inspections on building.
Adopt the ordinance authorizing the tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation.
Purchase a new fire hose.
Enter into contract with Biggs and Matthews to survey certain street corners.

Transfer \$3,000 from water and sewer fund and \$3,500 from general fund to social security fund to cover annual payments.
Send Harry Stokus, C. E. Thompson, Jack Land to A & M firemen's school July 20-25.
Resignation of Jerry Lane as member of city Planning Commission was accepted.
Mayor E. F. Soell urged aldermen to study building and housing ordinances in preparation for future action.

John Mixon joined the firm in March 1946 upon returning from ETO, as safety engineer. He is now personnel director. Paul Craft and Rollins Woodall started work in 1932. Craft was employed as foreman and supervisor of handling heavy equipment. Woodall was dispatcher and biller to customers. It was his duty to be informed and keep abreast of all Railroad Commission and FCC regulations.
J. C. Bridges is presently fore-

man of hauling.
J. B. Barbour jr. grew up with the business. When he was nine years old he was shop clean-up boy, tire repair helper, etc. After he returned from duty in Pacific Theater during World War II, he finished his study at University of Oklahoma with BBA degree and came back to join his parents, who began shifting the trucking operations to him.
J. B. assumed full management in 1959 when his father became ill. John died in January 1962.

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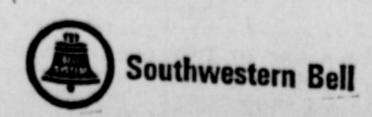

AN ORDINANCE

Dealing with subdivision and platting of land within and without the City of Iowa Park within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City of Iowa Park; to promote the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the community; to lessen the congestion on streets; to promote the orderly layout and use of land; to secure safety from fire and other dangers; to provide adequate light and air; facilitate adequate provisions for transportation, water, sewage, schools, parks, playgrounds, and other public requirements; protect neighborhood areas from the hazard of through traffic; providing for severability; providing for penalties not in excess of \$200.00 for violations of this ordinance.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 137

An Ordinance Regulating the Maintenance of Mobile Home Parks, Providing for Permits and Licenses, and Defining Requirements for Location of Mobile Homes without Mobile Home Parks, and Providing for Severability, Providing for Penalties for Violation.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that an ordinance regulating the maintenance of mobile home parks; providing for permits and licenses, and defining requirements for location of mobile homes without mobile home parks, is hereby adopted by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, in regular session on this the 29th day of May, A.D. 1969.

(Initial permit fee of \$100.00 will be charged. Annual renewal fee will be \$50.00 per year. Transfer fee will be \$25.00. Trailer or mobile home parks will have three years to conform to the ordinance if in existence at the time of adoption of the ordinance; isolated trailers or mobile homes will have six months to conform.

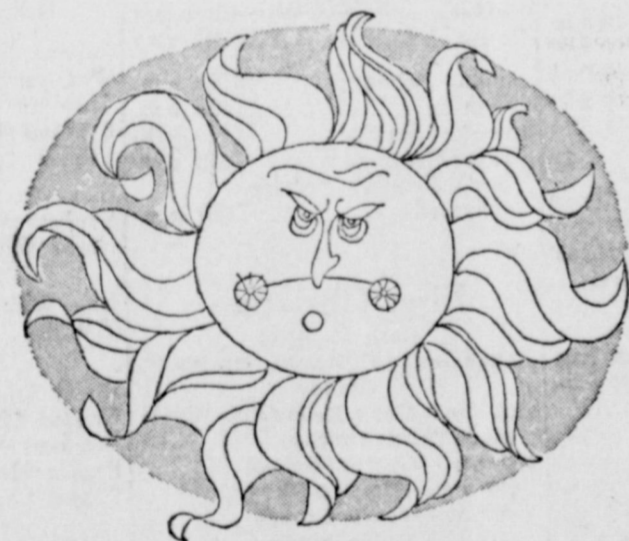

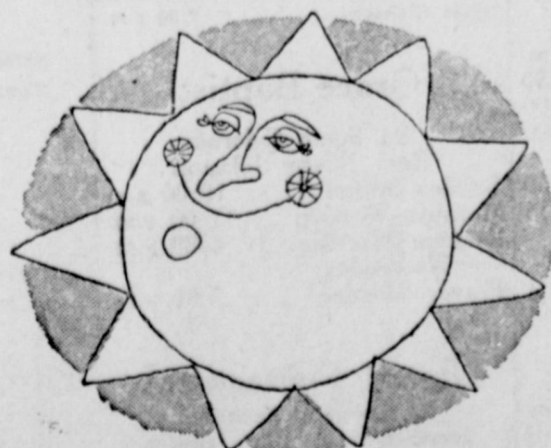
