Hawk Kid Teams Down Longhorns

Tuesday evening American League Hawks won their third game of the season by 34-6 over Wichita Falls Longhorns.

Lane Brock scored for Hawks on first play of game, running 40 yards around end.

Hawks held and got the ball, mounting another scoring drive capped when Alan Forney punched over from the L.

Quarterback Brock scored in 2nd quarter on 65 yard center. Barry Goins tacked on two points.

Hawk reserves held Longhorns, and Hawks scored again as Rusty Price got fine blocking on his 40 yard run.

In 4th period with Hawk reserves playing, Longhorns scored as Rickey Soesbee rambled 40 yards.

Final points were made when Brock raced 35 yards for TD and Goins added the conversion.

Coach Darrel Burrell used all his players and for some it was the first real game they had ever played.

Defensive standouts for Iowa Park were Shane Kimbrow, Larry Goins, Bobby Collins, Mike Elwell. Little Hawks play at 6 p.m. next Wednesday at Central Boys club.

The win put IP in first place in American League consisting of SAFF, Burk, Wichita Falls and Iowa Park.

National League Hawks won their game Tuesday by beating the Longhorns 22-0.

Mike Haley made the first TD and Rickey Vanek added the PAT. After holding the visitors, the Hawks marched to the 35 where Haley ran through Longhorns for another score.

Hawks used reserves and held Longhorn offense completely. Mark Smith made final TD with 1 yard plunge. And James Thompson added the PAT.

National League Hawks are coached by David Brown, Harry Moore, Dennis Mitchell. These players are 100 pounders and most will be 7th and 8th grade players next year.

Fire Prevention

Fire Chief C. E. Thompson and County Farm Bureau President Raymond Schroeder urge citizens to pay special heed to observance of National Fire Prevention Week which ends Oct. 11.

"We ask that everyone develop good fire safety habits including care with matches and smoking, good housekeeping to rid homes of rubbish, and proper use of electrical fuses, appliances and extension cords," Thompson said. He added, "Fires killed more than 12,000 persons and cost more than \$2.2 billion in America last year."

Schroeder said fall and winter months are most vulnerable times of year for rural fires. "When fire occurs on farm or rural property, damage is three to six times greater than in average city fires," he added.

Farm Bureau has two programs designed to curtail fire losses. The county FB, in co-operation with state FB, sponsors attendance of local volunteer firemen at Firemen's Training School each summer at College Station.

More than 700 firemen have attended under FB sponsorship in past seven years. C. E. Thompson and Jack Land, both of Iowa Park attended the past summer.

State and local FB's also pay \$75 to fire departments for fighting rural fires on FB insured property.

County Farm Bureau sponsor a graphic 45-minute fire prevention demonstration. More than 120 were given before schools, civic clubs and other groups in the past school year.

Almost 20,000 fire extinguishers have been bought by FB members as a continuing program of rural fire protection.

TESCO Adding Three Plants

New electric power generating unit to cost more than \$30,000,000 is to be installed at Texas Electric Service Co. power plant near Monahans, says Wayne House, local manager.

The new unit will have capability in excess of 500,000 kilowatts and will be larger than any unit now operating in the company's system.

"Addition of this unit is part of the long-range plan to assure plenty of dependable electric power for increasing use of electricity and for growth of area we serve," House said.

Bids will be invited in late 1970 and contract will be let early in 1971. Completion of project is scheduled for late 1973.

TESCO has two other plant construction projects underway. A 375,000 kilowatt unit being added to Eagle Mountain plant near Ft. Worth is scheduled for completion in 1971.

Texas Electric is building a power plant jointly with Dallas Power & Light and Texas Power & Light near Fairfield. It will have two 575,000 kilowatt generating units.

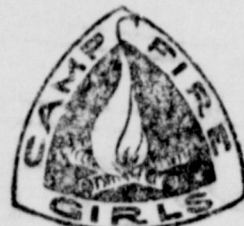

Mrs. Chapman said there will be a workshop in Seymour on Oct. 24. Anyone who would like to go should contact her for a reservation.

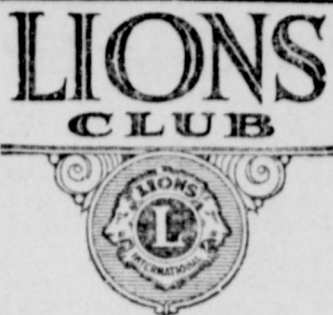
Mrs. Earl Watson, McDonald and Chapman were elected to go to State PTA convention in San Antonio, Nov. 12-14.

Mrs. Reuben Knight, chairman of board of trustees of Wichita County Mental Health and Retardation program, was speaker at Noon Lions luncheon Tuesday. She has been active in the work for 11 years.

She discussed growth of North Texas Mental Health Center where a child can be evaluated. Approximately 2100 children have been treated during the past 7 years.

She described the hopes and aspirations and progress during the years for a mental health center, and said the dream will become a reality by Nov. 1.

Impelled by the late President Kennedy's interest in the mental health of the nation, Texas legislators passed HB 3 in 1965 allowing communities to set up boards to look into establishing centers. County commissioners, City of Wichita Falls, and school district of Wichita Falls approved appointment of a board to study the local needs.

Having made provision for five services necessary to qualify for Federal staffing grant, the board applied in April 1963 and their grant was received July 1969.

The State and the three agencies in Wichita Falls agreed to pay their shares, so Wichita county is now assured of a mental health community center.

Mrs. Knight said professional help will staff the Center and its services will be available to anyone who lives in the county.

Lion Claude McDonald, also a board member, introduced Mrs. Knight.

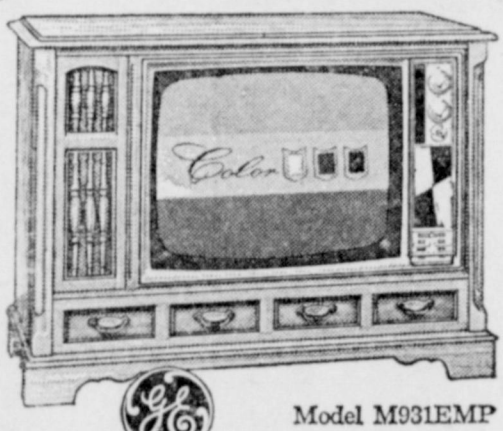

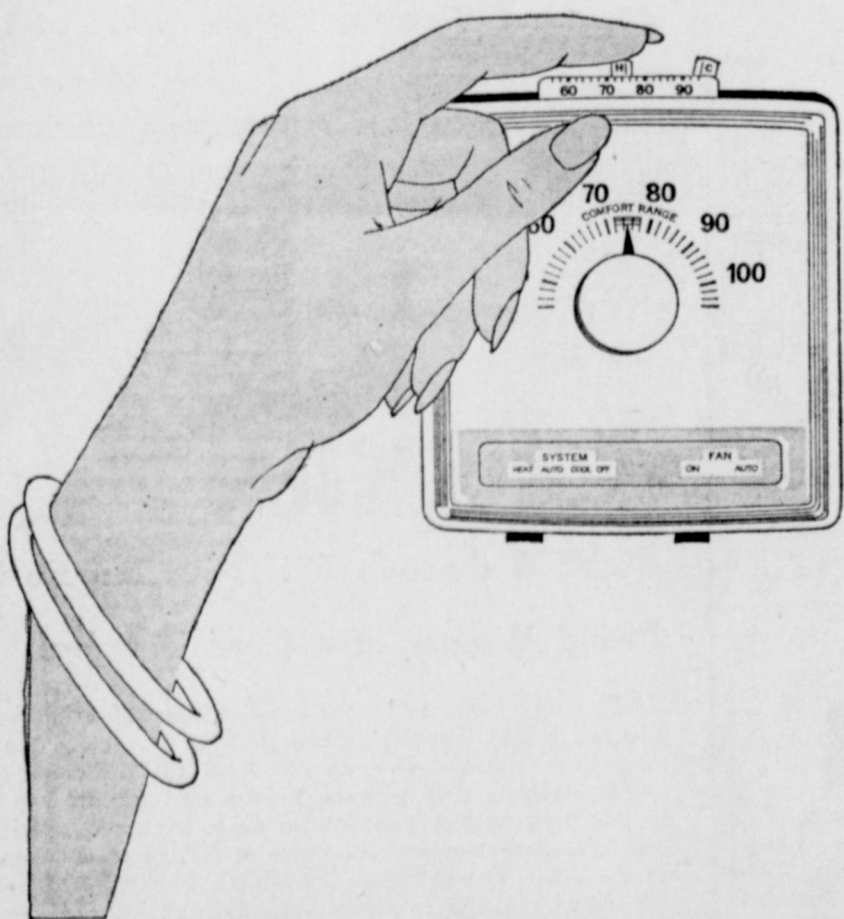

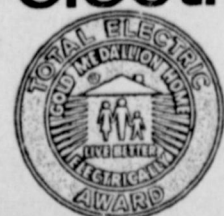
