The police had to rope off this section because Russian women were so eager to have beauty work done. This was almost an entirely new thing introduced to Russian society.
Russia is advancing rapidly toward becoming a modern country. Women are beginning to shorten their dresses and are becoming much more clothes conscious.
There is no tuition for attending a university. However it is difficult for a student to get into college since there are only 40 universities in Russia. If a student is accepted he must be ex-

ceptionally talented and have a high I.Q. University students will be paid from \$50 to \$75 by the government while in school.
Most everything in Russia is "under the thumb" rule of the government. People do not have a lot of privileges that we in America take for granted; such as private telephones, a second car, washer and dryer, etc.
Many women in Russia have to do heavy manual labor. It is not uncommon to see women digging ditches, pouring concrete, laying bricks, and all other things that men normally do.
Mrs. Dyer said the temperature in Russia sometimes reaches as low as 60 degrees below zero. Also that there is a scarcity of paved streets and roads.

Floydada made a fine sustained drive to our 23, when Gary Frazier intercepted and returned the pigskin to 43.

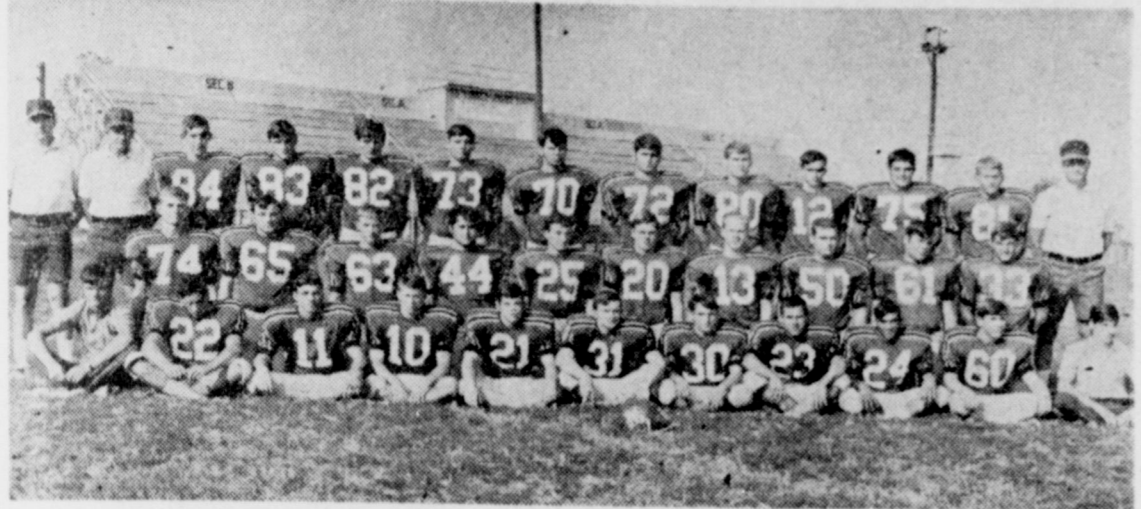

Robert E. Birk, owner of Iowa Park Insurance Agency, attended the first Governor's Support Program on Traffic Safety recently, and reported on its proceedings to Noon Lions club Tuesday.

Comparison of statistics showed that America has suffered fatal casualties totaling 1,161,007 in all the wars from 1775 to 1968. Fatalities in traffic from 1900 to 1968 add up to 1,721,754.

Financial losses from traffic accidents have been unbelievable and involve covering a football field with bills of every denomination from \$1 through \$1000 plus 3,266 tons of silver dollars.

Texas ranks high in compliance with National Highway Safety needs. Beginning with motor vehicle inspection, proper registration of vehicles, motorcycle rules, driver education, driver licensing.

Texas codes and laws are in good compliance with national standards; and so are the traffic courts. However, there is laxity in our license suspension program.

Birk learned that 50 per cent of fatal accidents involve drinking drivers and/or drinking pedestrians. It was also pointed out that the accident rate was lowered during the two years Texas had merit rating for insurance; and the accident rate climbed again when merit rating was abandoned.
