High School Band contest of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair will be held Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of Fair Week.

This contest has grown each year and is one of the outstanding features of the annual exhibition.

John C. Hooper of Archer City will be serving his second year as director of this contest. He has announced beautiful trophies, medals and appropriate gifts will be awarded to outstanding bands and their directors.

The musicians will be judged on concert, marching, twirling and sweepstakes.

Route of march will vary only slightly from last year. Bands form in front of the Park hotel at 4:00 p.m. They will be judged in straight marching for one block through the business area plus a right turn at the end of the block.

Concert events will be conducted in the open behind the Fair Auditorium.

School bands will enter in three classes:  
Sept. 27—Class A (250 to 500 high school enrollment).  
Sept. 28—Class B (150 to 250).  
Sept. 29—Class C (less than 150).

## Hawks Down VV

Iowa Park Hawks played their first home game here Friday night, beating the Valley View Warriors 27 to 0. This was the second game of the year for the Hawks with no losses.

Approximately 800 fans were happy over this victory as it was Iowa Park's first win over Valley View in several seasons.

The Hawks lost no time as they set Delos Whisenhunt through the center for a TD early in the first period and followed shortly with another as Harvey Klinkerman, clunked a pass at J. C. Bridges.

Both conversion attempts were wide and the quarter ended with the score at 12.

In the second period Whisenhunt registered his second touchdown with a plunge from a half yard out. Jerry Morgan hit paydirt in the same quarter to make the score 24. His try for the extra point was good, and the first half ended with that score.

High point of the third canto was David Sewell's 45 yard run into scoring territory.

Coaches Covington and Reese used the second string most of the second half, and they scored once. Scoring finale was Donald Todd's 14 yard scamper.

Strong line play on both the defensive and offensive made the Hawk backfield's chores much easier than teams of the recent past.

Physical equipment for the Fair is valued at about \$250,000.

Each year finds the best in Texas and Oklahoma showing agriculture, community exhibits, 4-H and FFA, women's skills, and many of the arts and sciences.

Noteworthy is the new Aberdeen-Angus show, which will be the official state fair and sale, with premiums amounting to \$4,100.

Junior livestock, grass judging and land judging will attract hundreds of tomorrow's farmers from all parts of the vast Texas-Oklahoma area served by the Fair.

And another new exhibit will be the Auto Show, with latest models of most popular cars on hand to be inspected.

Veterans applying to buy land under the state veterans land program will submit forms to the committee. It will consider such applications and submit a report to the state veterans land board. The committee will report on financial responsibility of the veteran, furnish a statement as to whether in its opinion the deal is bona fide and provide a statement on what it considers to be the reasonable value of the land. The new law requires forms to be submitted to both counties if the applicant lives in one county and seeks to buy land in another county. The screening committee will serve without compensation.

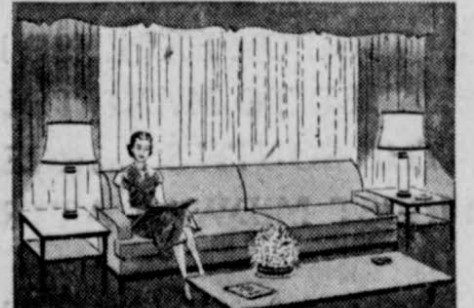

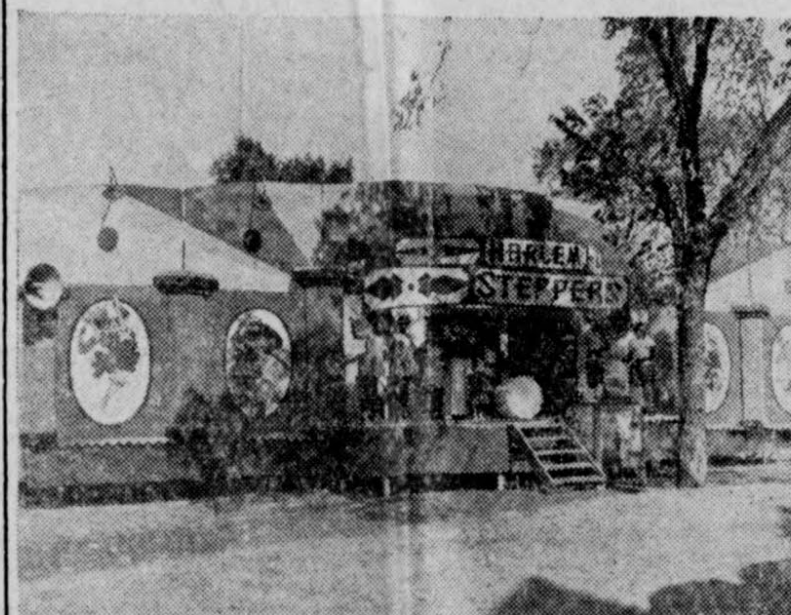

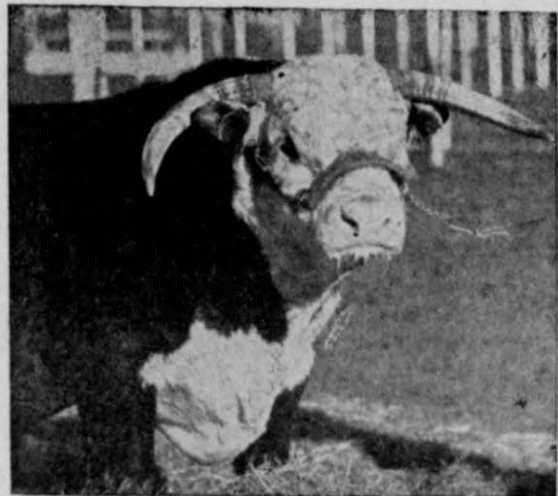

Both these young people are graduates of Iowa Park High and attended Midwestern university. They plan to establish residence here.

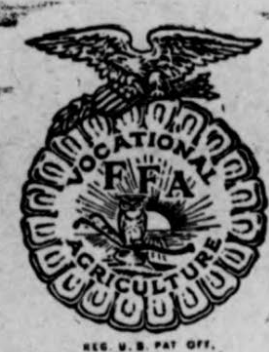
#### BAND PARENTS PLAN BIG YEAR AT FAIR

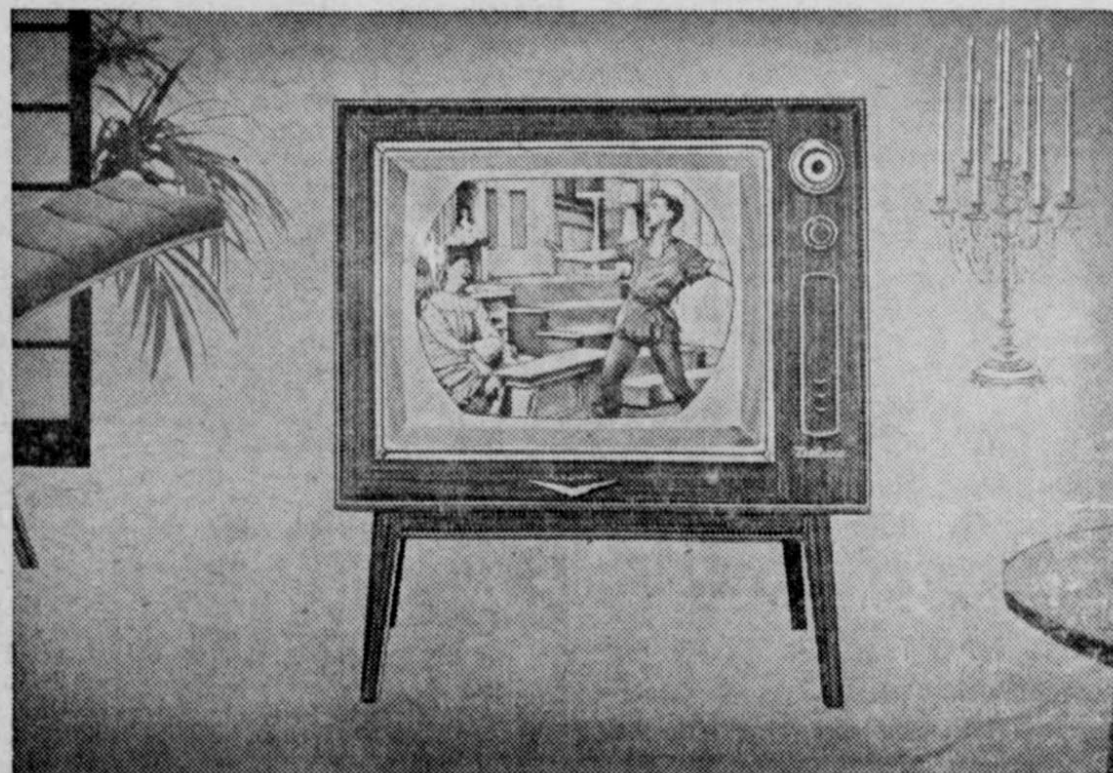

**DEAR EDITOR:**  
Since I've been on my ranch, working at this job of getting completely well, I have been doing a lot of reading and a lot of thinking about the farm situation. I regret to say that nothing I have learned has made me feel good about the outlook for the average farmer.  
In its August survey, the Department of Agriculture reported a drop of 2 per cent in prices received by farmers for the things they raise. This continues the trend that has been underway for three years.  
Farm prices as reported for August are 6 per cent below prices a year ago. They are 12.5 per cent below prices on Jan. 1, 1953.  
It is bad enough that farm income continues to drop. It is even worse that the farmer's relative share of the national income is declining steadily.
