## City Receives Sales Tax Check for \$6,098.79

Iowa Park received last week the first check from Texas State Comptroller as settlement for our portion of the Sales Tax. Size of the check was \$6,098.79 which represented collections in April, May and June of this year.

Voters approved the sales tax Nov. 23, 1968, but it was not put in force until April 1 of this year.

New sales tax authorized by the legislature adds only 1/4 cent to the old tax.

Then there is the \$0.045 rise in cigarette tax and a few minor items.

## A. M. Dorsett New Minister

Rev. Mr. Alfred M. Dorsett will begin work here as pastor of Presbyterian church this Sunday. The worship service is set for 9 a.m.

Sunday will be World Wide Communion Sunday in which local churches will join Christians around the world in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Dorsett will continue as pastor of United Presbyterian church of Electra, where he has been serving a year. He came to Electra from Houston, where for 26 years he worked with two churches: Heights for 15 and Good Shepherd for 11 years.

Dorsett was graduated in 1928 from Waco high and received the BA degree from Trinity university in 1933. In 1935 he earned the B.Th. from Princeton Theological Seminary. He was ordained by Presbytery of Waco in 1934.

Dorsett served as moderator of Synod of Texas of Presbyterian Church, USA, in 1956-57, and has served as moderator of Abilene, Amarillo and Houston presbyteries. He was stated clerk of Gulf Coast presbytery for 22 years and permanent clerk of Synod of Texas for 22 years.

He was chairman of board of Church Extension of Gulf Coast presbytery for 11 years, during which time six new churches were organized. He served three years on the general council of Synod of Texas.

Dorsett has also served pulpits in Snyder-Fluvanna, Dallas, Canyon and Houston.

Mrs. Dorsett, whose home was in Corsicana, is also a graduate of Trinity university. They have two children: William R. of Houston and Mrs. William R. Moore of Austin.

Members of the church and the minister extend a cordial invitation to all who are concerned with building strong spiritual forces in the community, to share in its work and worship.

## Fans Ask for New Stadium

T. B. Quillin, editor of Vernon Times and Vernon Record, spoke to school board members and administrators Tuesday night describing the football stadium at Vernon and it was financed.

Quillin was engaged to speak after a petition was signed by several hundred persons at the Iowa Park-Hirschi game last Friday night requesting school officials to consider possibilities of obtaining a new stadium.

The petition was presented to Bob Dawson, high school principal, Saturday morning. It was based on the probability that Iowa Park will be in Class AAA next year. For a school to be in AAA it must maintain an average of 450 students in high school for two consecutive years. The change is made in even years.

In 1967-68 IPHS enrollment averaged 440.72; in 1968-69 it was 483.60, making the average enrollment for the two years 462.16. Present high school enrollment is 567 and total school enrollment is 2,067.

Last addition to Bobby Gilbreath Memorial Stadium was constructed in 1965. That year the total school enrollment was 1,538. Iowa Park has been in District 2-AA approximately 8 years.

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## I.P. 21 Hirschi 14

More than 6000 fans were at Bobby Gilbreath Field last Friday night to watch Iowa Park defend its rating as one of best schoolboy teams in the state. It took the full 48 minutes to convince Hirschi that they couldn't win.

Hawk defense was badly shot throughout the game and Huskies made yardage the Hawk fans couldn't believe, but when the chips were down and the goal line was threatened, the Hawks managed to create fumbles.

Three lost fumbles spell defeat for Hirschi, and most beautiful of all came with only 31 seconds left in the game. As Brown made a successful dash through the middle of the Hawk line from three yards out, it seemed the Hawks' goose was cooked.

But Brown made his way into paydirt without the ball! Unable to reach the man, Jim Clapp had instinctively grabbed at his arm and dislodged the important part of the run—the pigskin! In the ensuing scramble, Steve Watson made the recovery, and Hirschi had gone down for the fifth time in the seven game series.

In the first quarter, a fumble by Dwight Johnson gave Iowa Park possession on the Husky 29. From there it took 11 plays to cross the goal line, with Gary Williams making the last yard. Jerry Pitman then made his first of three successful PAT kicks.

In the third quarter, the Hirschi drive paid off with 14 points, aided by a 15-yard penalty on the first TD, and by an intercepted Jim Clapp pass.

With the Huskies leading 17-7, the Hawk offense came alive, and scored two TDs in the final stanza. Jeff McDonald made an 11-yard run for the second TD, and Webb passed 5 yards to Mark Thompson for the winning points.

The game was marred by an injury to Billy Hacker, which turned out not to be serious, and by the death immediately after the final gun of a fan in the Hirschi seating area. Despite the efforts of physicians called to his aid, Lynn C. Vaughan, 47, died in the stands a few minutes after a heart attack.
