## City Council

Members of the City Planning  
Commission and City Council had  
a combined meeting Monday pre-  
ceding the regular meeting of  
the Council.

Providing utilities to the areas  
west of Johnson Road and water  
to residents east of Peterson Road  
highlighted discussion. It was  
agreed to withhold decision on  
pending consideration by engineers.

It was voted to authorize Mayor  
E. F. Soell to inform the Friberg-  
Cooper Water Supply Corp. that  
the City will not supply water to  
the area bounded on the north  
by Cashon Road, on east by Hwy  
240, on south by Hwy 287 and  
on west by Peterson Road in the  
immediate future.

The group favored supplying  
water on an urban rather than  
rural design.

During Council meeting it was  
voted to purchase a rebuilt bill-  
ing machine for the City Hall and  
a new county hook-up radio for  
the police car.

Aldermen voted to send City  
Secretary K. G. Wilks to the Tax  
Assessing conference at San An-  
tonio, Oct. 21-22. Topics to be  
discussed there will be: Search  
for Equity, General Discussion of  
Taxation, New Laws on Taxes and  
Court Decisions, Appraisal of  
Properties Affected by Natural  
Disasters, and Spiraling Building  
Costs and Effects on Tax Assess-  
ments.

Proposed message prepared by  
the Historical Society for the  
City's historical marker was read  
and accepted.

It was agreed to invite D. F.  
Hill of Wichita Falls to meet with  
the group to explain the Mayor  
and Council Consulting Service.

Updating of the city map with  
new additions for reproduction of  
a new supply was discussed. Final  
action was voting to accept the  
insurance policy renewal at  
\$10,000 on the water superinten-  
dent's house to take care of phys-  
ical loss.

## Corner Markers

A city survey to establish block  
corners here has been in progress  
for several weeks on selected  
streets, which are:

Pacific from the railroad to the  
north city limits.

Washington from 2nd street to  
North Atlantic.

Victoria street from Washing-  
ton to Emerald.

Wall street from Emerald to  
Garden Valley.

Emerald street from F-M Road  
368 to Victoria.

At each intersection on these  
streets, four block corner mark-  
ers will be set and permanent  
concrete markers will be poured  
indicating it is a city block corner.  
These are for the convenience of  
citizens nearby who may use the  
monuments as reference to survey  
their property.

The law provides a penalty for  
unofficial removal of a land sur-  
vey marker and anyone remov-  
ing one of these markers is sub-  
ject to punishment for the same  
according to the law.

Purpose of the survey is to  
aid both city government and citi-  
zens by providing convenient  
reference marks so they can deter-  
mine where their own land  
corners are. It is hoped by the  
Mayor and City Council that con-  
fusion of conflicting surveys will  
be eliminated or at least that it  
will better the situation.

# Trips Overseas Make Summer Enjoyable for Miss Denny

Miss Elga Ann Denny returned Sept. 15 from a 22-day trip to Europe in company with Triple A Tour Group, sponsored by the American Automobile Association.

She met with the group at JFK Terminal in New York. They flew to London and met the 65-year-old Swiss guide who stayed with them throughout the tour.

Visiting places of interest included on itinerary tours of the city, they attended a vesper service at Westminster Abbey, witnessed changing of the guards, and took a boat ride up Thames to Greenwich.

On the way back the guide, who has lived in London 62 years, was able to point out sections that had been bombed during World War II.

From London the party flew to Amsterdam where they picked up their bus driver, a German. They were reminded that American tourists were seeing Europe with a Swiss guide and German driver, a condition which wouldn't have been conducive to happiness and a feeling of ease not too many years ago. But in the summer of 1969 it proved to be an ideal arrangement.

In the city they saw the house where Ann Frank lived during Nazi occupation and visited the Museum where they viewed many famous paintings and works of art the people had hidden and preserved during the invasion.

The big dikes in Holland were of fascinating interest to Miss Denny.

Going into Germany the group traveled the Ruhr valley, site of heavy industry. Stopping at the famous cathedral in Cologne, they were told that workmen were busy replacing temporary repairs made after the damaged incurred during bombing raids.

Trip down the Rhine river to Heidelberg, famous for its university, and through the Black Fore region ended the sojourn in Germany.

They passed into picturesque Switzerland with its chalets of which Elga Ann will always cherish beautiful memories. She observed that farming methods are rather primitive since so much arable land is on steep hillsides. Horse-drawn plow, scythe and

pitchfork, which are almost *passé* in America, are essential there.

The cities are quite modern, making it somewhat a country of contrasts.

Section of Austria visited by the group was like a continuation of Switzerland. Here again peaceful atmosphere made them feel if they had to choose another place in which to live, it would have to be in this area.

They found the small principality of Liechtenstein between Switzerland and Austria on the Rhine quite alluring. Stamp collectors go there from all over the world to get their stamps.

Reaching Italy they stopped first at Venice and enjoyed a ride on the Grand Canal; a visit to St. Mark's cathedral where legend has it that St. Mark's body is in the cathedral; and the Campanile Bell Tower. It was pointed out to them how fast the city is sinking.

At Florence, home of Michael Angelo and where many of his works remain they found the city still recovering from the devastating flood of two years ago. As they expected, the adventures in Italy reached a climactic point in Rome. They went to St. Peter's cathedral; through the Vatican; saw the Sistine chapel, Roman ruins, Forum, Coliseum; and went through the Catacombs outside Rome.

Traveling along the Italian Riviera, they crossed to the French Riviera and went through Monaco, up to the Castle and to the Casino. They spent a few days in Nice and then on to Lyons before going to Paris.

Miss Denny stated: "I found Paris to be as glamorous and exciting as I had always pictured it." And equally as interesting were Eiffel Tower, opera house, Louvre, Mona Lisa, Winged Victory, Venus de Milo, and Tomb of Napoleon. They went down Champs Elysees to the Arch of Triumph and saw the grave of an unknown soldier where the flame burns continuously.

Traveling all the way by TWA the group left Paris on the return trip to the USA.

Elga Ann is daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elgin. Graduate of IPHS she has BS degree from Texas Wesleyan college at Ft. Worth.

She is an instructor in data processing at Sheppard AFB. Member of United Methodist church, she teaches the kindergarten Sunday school class.

In the summer of 1968 Miss Denny toured the British Isles. She is anticipating another educational trip, possibly next summer.

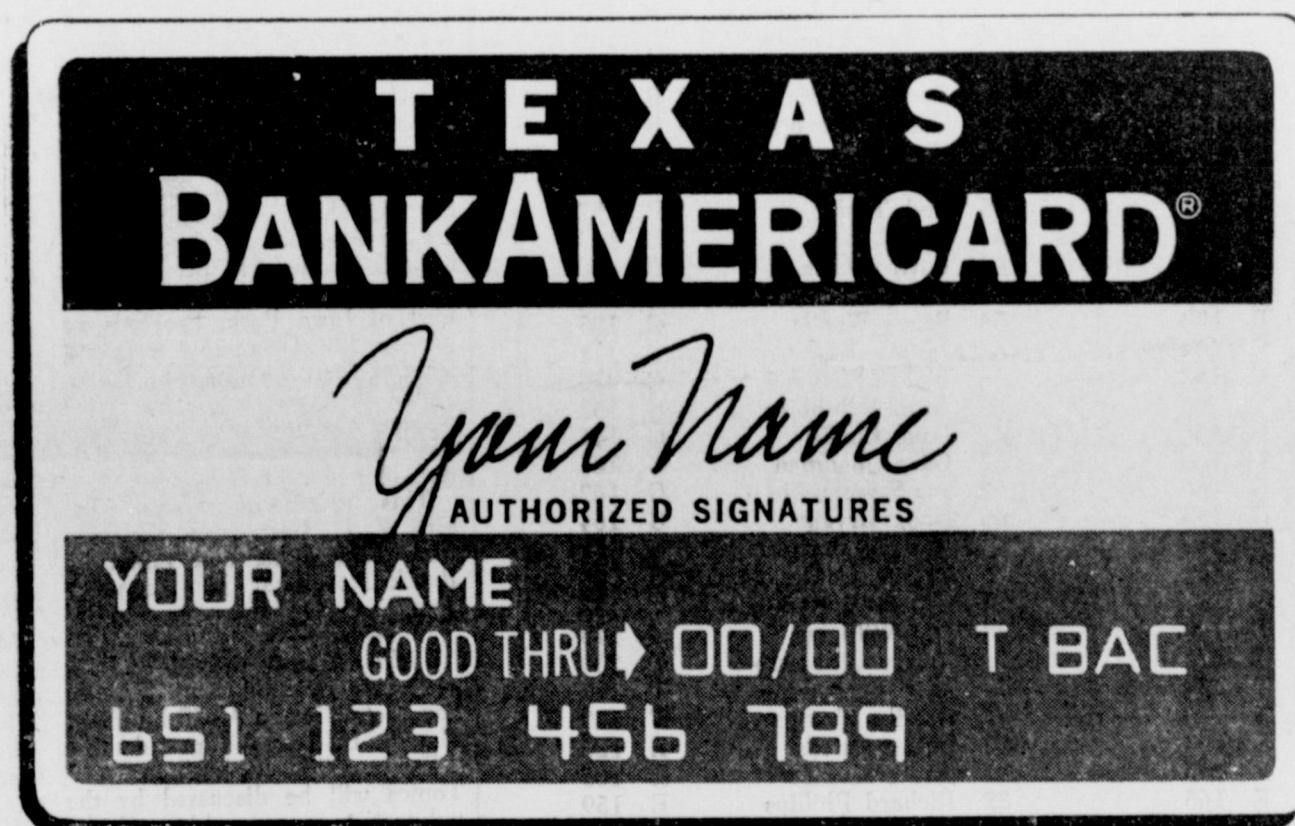

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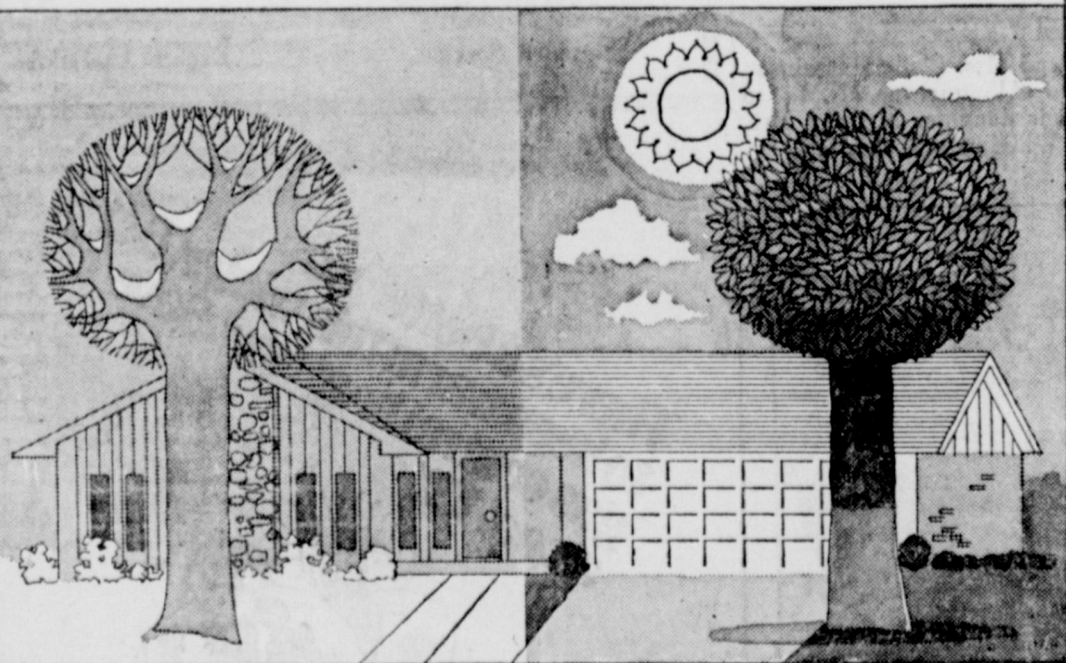
