

ACCURATE DIAGNOSIS OF POLIO PRESENTS UNUSUAL PROBLEMS

Minneapolis, Minn.-Accurate diagnosis of non-paralytic poliomyelitis presents a challenging and important problem, even though the medical staff of the Sister Elizabeth Kenny Foundation has diagnosed and treated thousands of cases of the disease.

The patient with paralytic polio can be accurately diagnosed, but non-paralytic polio resembles very closely a great number of other diseases which are almost impossible to distinguish from polio. One of Sister Kenny's contributions to medical science pertained to early recognition of symptoms and necessity of early treatment.

Perfecting of a diagnostic test for polio is a tremendous problem, because polio viruses are elusive things. They are too small to be seen with the ordinary microscope and require living tissue for growth. The problem is further complicated by the fact that polio is not just a onevirus disease, but a disease

caused by different viruses. As a result of tests carried out on patients referred to Kenny treatment centers with suspected polio, a number of unusual infections of the central nervous system were uncovered. The same complicated laboratory tests would seem to indicate that many of these other diseases are indistinguishable from polio by the ordinary techniques available to

doctors. These diseases have in common the same polio symptoms of fever, headache, stiff neck and an increase in the number of white blood cells in the spinal fluid of patients.




