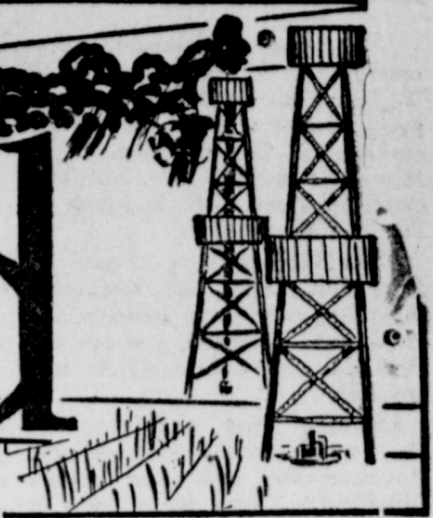

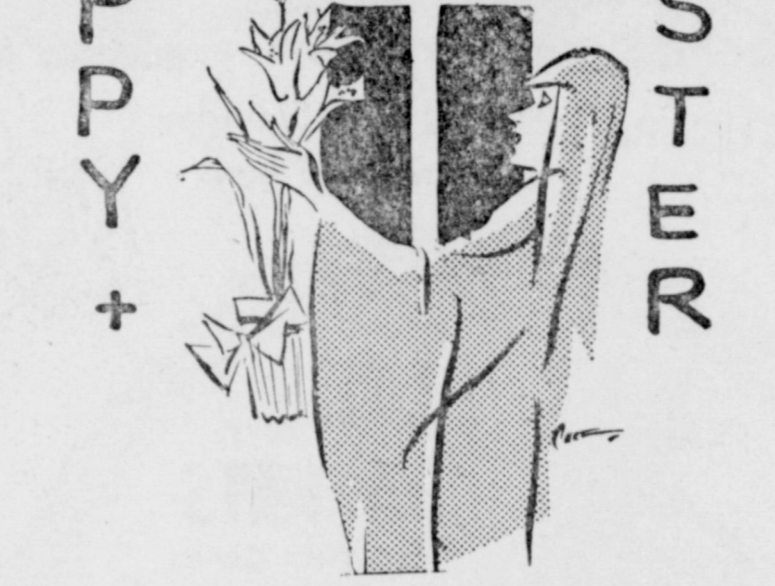

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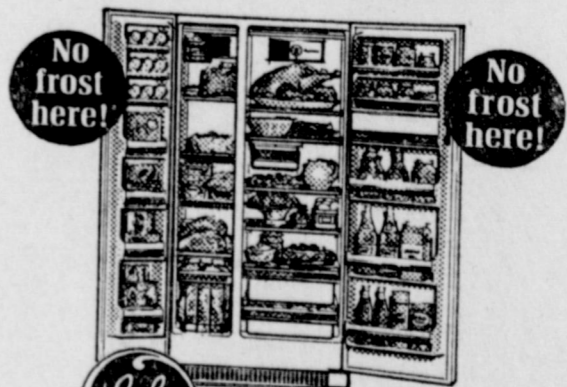

Speakers table was centered

with a white wrought-iron candle-labrum rising from a bouquet of tulips, stock, roses, carnations, lilies, daffodils accented with pink velvet ribbon bow and streamers. 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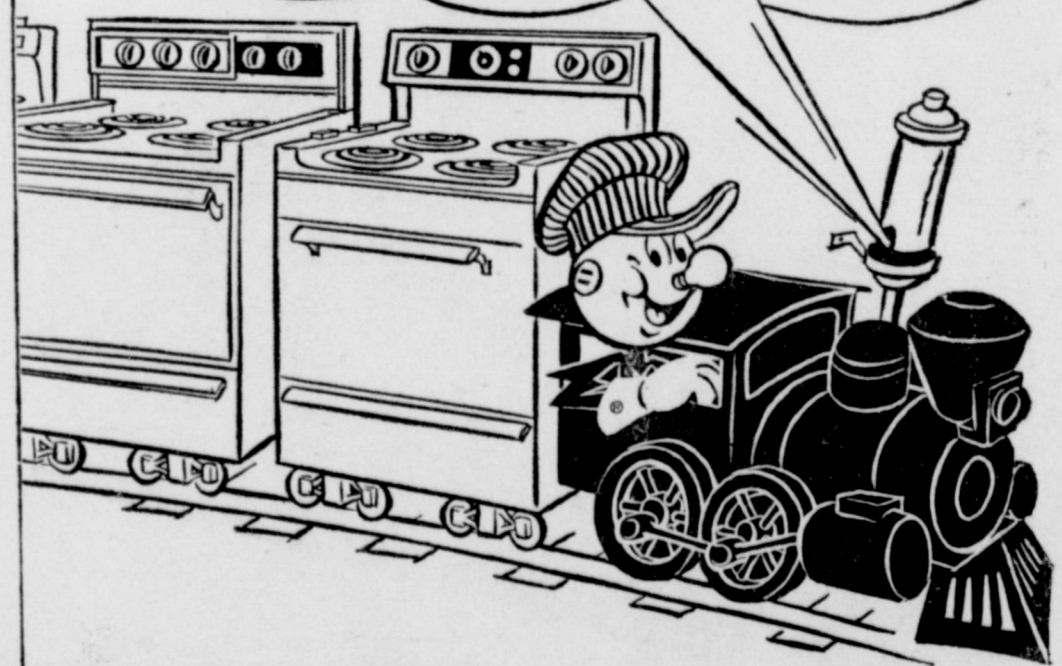
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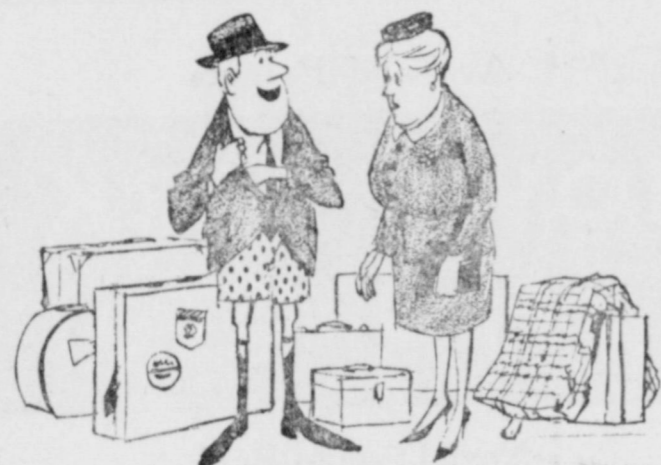
