City tax of one cent on the dollar has been added to all items which heretofore have had the 3c sales and use tax - collected by retail outlets of Our Town.

Various estimates of the total annual take from the City Sales Tax put the amount near the \$20,000 mark.

Schedule of retail tax collecions breaks at 13, 38, 63 and 83 cents.






