Tuesday Election

Iowa Park voters turned out 437 strong to mark their choices in the Amendments election this Tuesday. Those approved by the local voters were Nos. 1 and 4 and 5 and 7 and 8.

Statewide voting showed the results as — Okayed, Amendments 1 and 5 and 7 and 8.

By this simple comparison, it seems Iowa Park voters were in almost full accord with voters statewide.

Analysis of the amendments which were approved statewide shows that the voters are becoming more and more expense conscious. They voted down the left-over portions of the State Constitution. They voted down the Texas water plan which was to cost many billions of dollars. They refused a pay raise for state legislators. They refused to raise the ceiling on interest rates for bonded indebtedness. They vetoed annual sessions of the state legislature.

Seymour Rejects City Sales Tax, Industrial Levy

Seymour voters Tuesday refused to tack on a city sales tax and did not authorize tax funds for an industrial foundation.

The sales tax proposal would have added one cent to each dollar of purchased items for the consumer.

Iowa Park retail customers have been paying such a tax the past four months.

The proposal authorizing Seymour city council to add five cents tax per \$100 valuation of property in the city for use of the industrial foundation to promote new industry was voted down.

For western adventure "The Wonderful Country" by Tom Lea is the story of a man alone in a life of violence, riding a harsh country, hungry, searching for home in his heart.

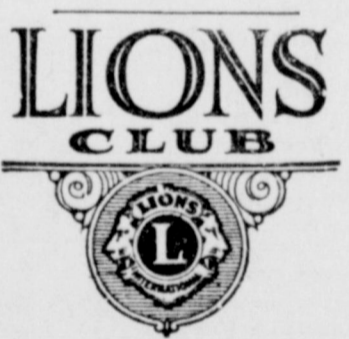

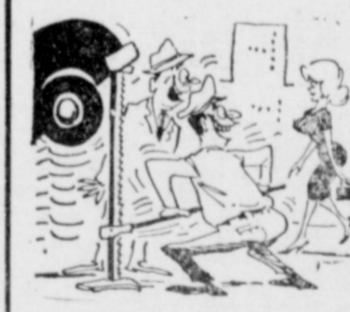

WYNNE CHESTER SAYS:
Surprise Your Friends With Notes On Wildlife



At this time of year a great deal of activity is going on in our forests and fields, very little of it seen by man. A whole new generation of wildlife is arriving, and I thought you might be interested in a few generally unknown facts about them.

Deer fawns rarely make any noise at all after being hidden in thickets by their mothers. Twin fawns, however, often "talk" to each other in tones resembling the soft calls of catbirds.

Hares (such as jackrabbits) are furred at birth, wide-eyed, in the open and ready to travel. Rabbits, however (such as cottontails) are born in nests, and are blind, naked and helpless.

Most American game birds are "precocial". The young are covered with down when hatched, and are able to leave the nest as soon as they are dry. The chicks of pigeons and doves, though, are "altricial", and must stay in the nest until ready to fly.

I must end on a note of warning, however. Tell your children that if they happen to find any young wild creatures alone, in the woods or fields, they must never touch them. Human scent can cause many wild animal mothers to completely abandon their offspring.

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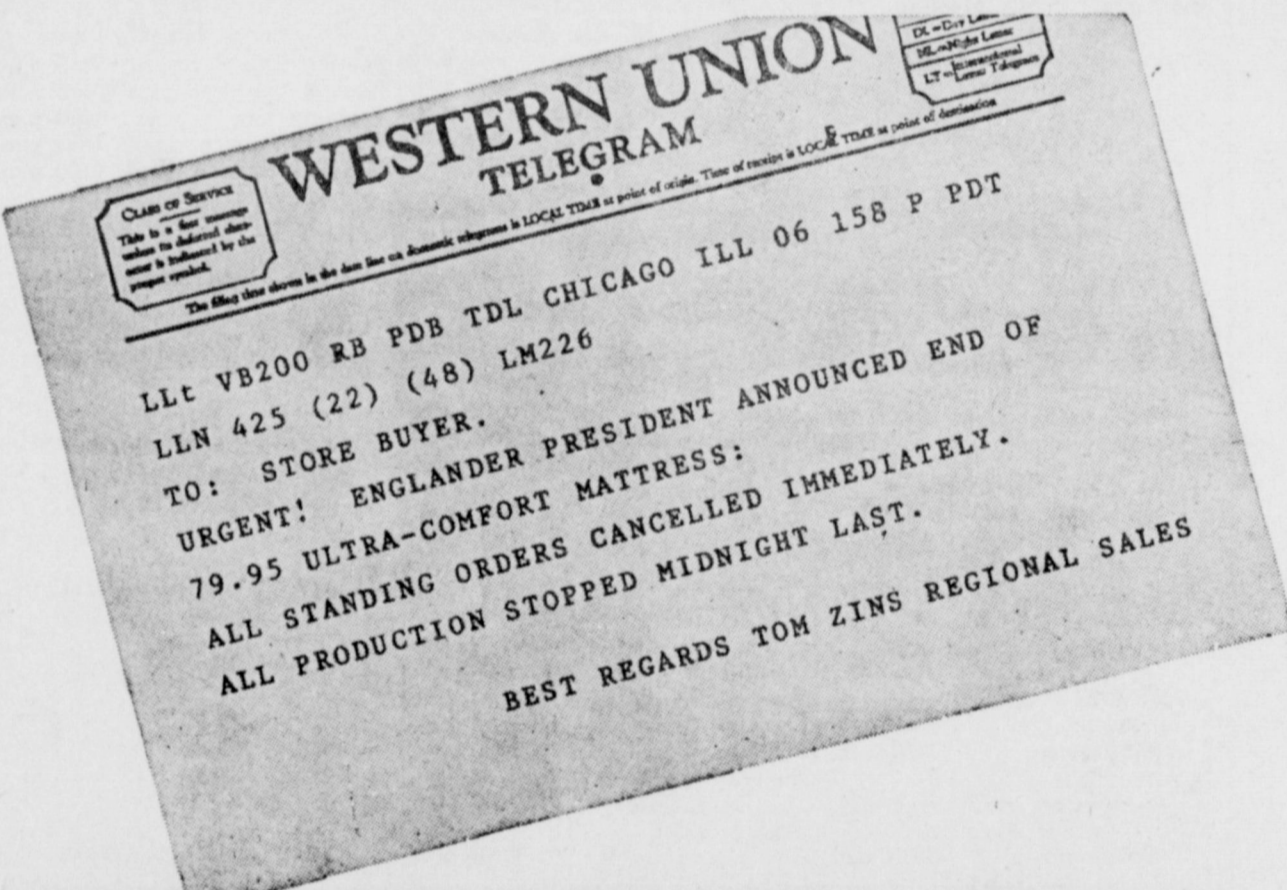

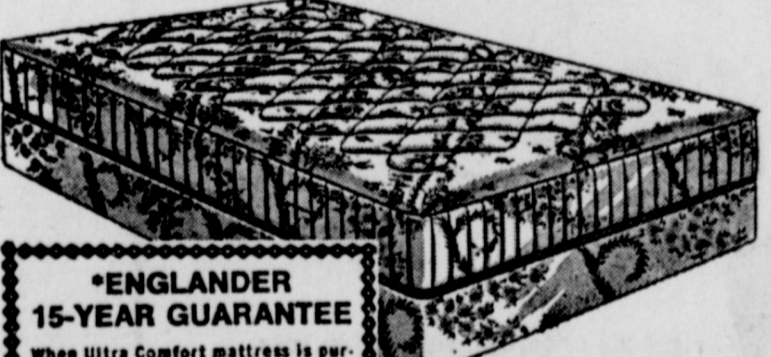
