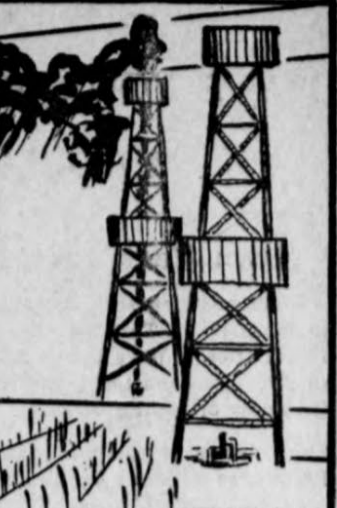

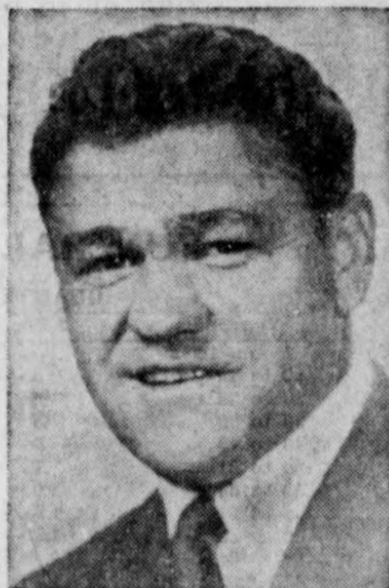

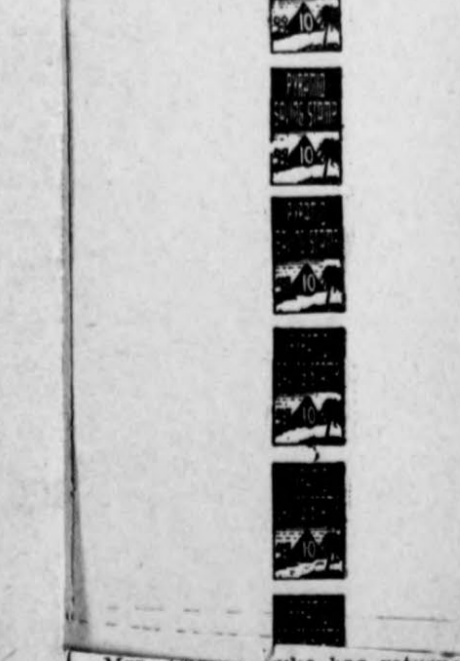

### THE STATE OF TEXAS

To Joe R. Murray, Defendant,

Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 78th District Court of Wichita County at the Court House thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 19th day of September A.D. 1955, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 2nd day of August A.D. 1955, in this cause, numbered 56,157-B on the docket of said court and styled Opal Juanita Murray, Plaintiff, vs. Joe R. Murray, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: After alleging jurisdiction plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant were married on or about September 20, 1952, and continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about May 10, 1954, when by reason of cruel, harsh and tyrannical treatment on the part

of the defendant toward this plaintiff without cause or provocation, was of such nature as to render their further living together insupportable; that there were no children born of this marriage; that her former name was Opal Juanita McManus.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer herein, and that upon trial hereof, she have judgment for divorce and for restoration of her former name, Opal Juanita McManus, and for such other and further relief to which she may show herself justly entitled.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

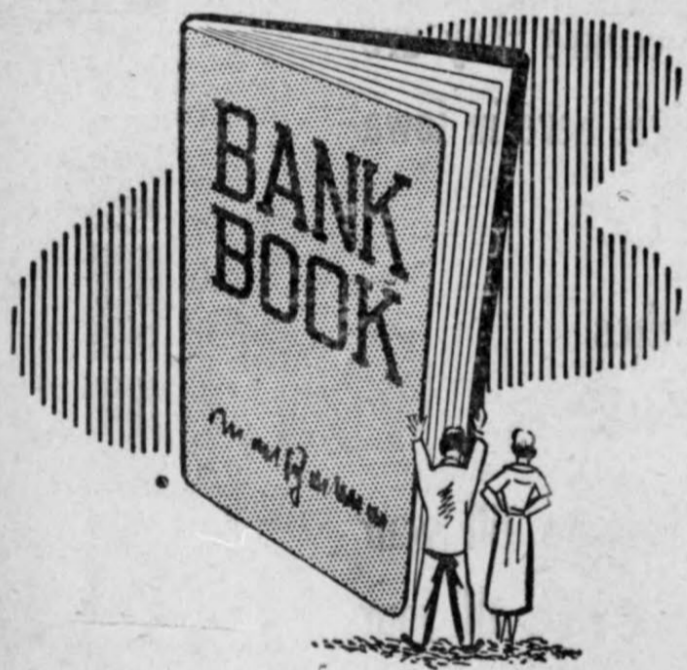

## Band Director Lists Seven Advantages Of School Music

by C. L. Vaughn

Music is educational as well as entertaining.

For the purpose of measuring the value of pupil activities, the National Education Association has established basic objectives. Among these are: Health; Command of the fundamental processes; Preparation for a vocation; Worthy home membership; Worthy use of leisure time; Civic education; and Ethical character.

By studying these seven points individually and applying them to music we find the answers.

1. Health. Does participation in school music contribute directly to health of students? The answer may be found by observing the chest development and erect posture of members of any school music organization. Training in posture, breath control and lung development makes the participation extremely worthwhile.

2. Command of the fundamental processes. Does it develop mental activity, nerve and body control? Sight reading and development of senses of tune, tempo and rhythm co-ordinate the eyes, ears, nerves and muscles as no other subject can. In studying great musical compositions, the students gain essential facts regarding history, geography, mathematics and language. Even a simple mechanical knowledge is developed in caring for an instrument.

3. Does music have vocational possibilities? With the arrival of school music came the demand for instructors. This field offers wonderful possibilities for those who will fit themselves. Almost every town has boys and girls who have made outstanding success through music. There is a field in symphony orchestra, bands and civic operas for those who desire to make music their life work.

4. Does music have an influence upon home environment? Music furnishes home entertainment and develops a spirit of co-operation, unselfishness and obedience. Harmony of thought and action come with the development of harmony of sound.

5. Does music make worthy use of leisure hours? Employment of spare time is one of the major problems of our day. The problem is eliminated in most cases for those who play an instrument or sing. It is an ageless hobby. Music breaks down social barriers because "Music is the universal language."

6. Does music make better citizens? Respect for authority and co-operation in action are the bases of music and civic training. Nowhere can good citizenship be taught more effectively than in a musical organization. Nowhere else is the will of a few subordinated to the will of the whole. To attain these ends, every member must co-operate fully and cheerfully with every other member.

7. Does school music develop character? Character and responsibility go hand in hand. Every boy and girl has a definite essential responsibility in a musical organization. Upon the shoulders of each lies the responsibility for successful execution of any composition.

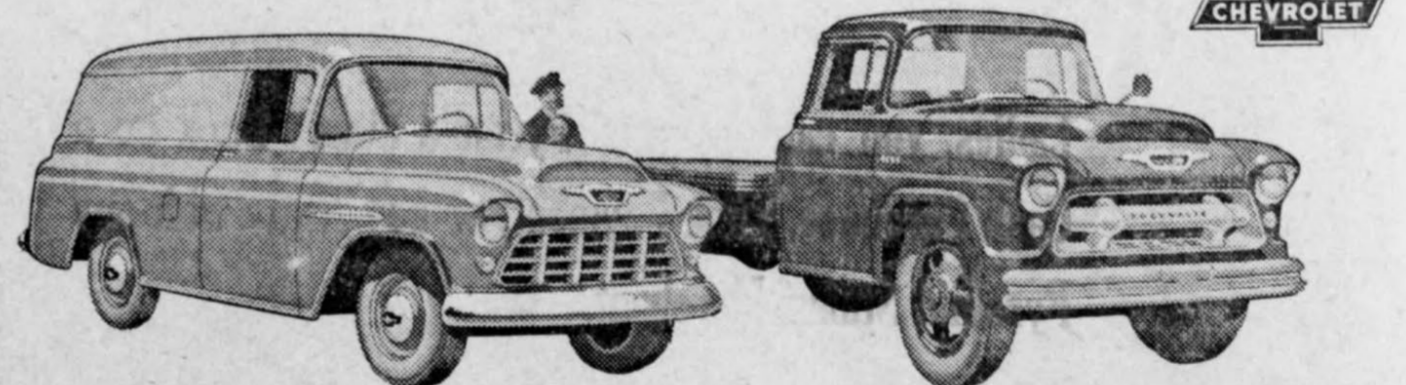

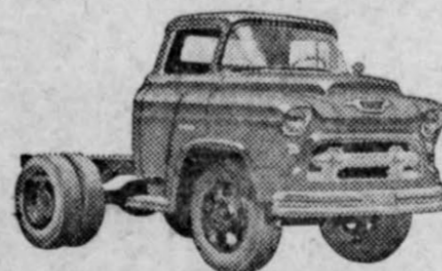
