Kimberlain Takes Job With Pyramid Stamps







There is a field in symphony orchestra, bands and civic operas for those who desire to make music their life work. -

4. Does music have an influence upon home environment? Music furnishes home entertainment and develops a spirit of co-operation, unselfishness and obedience. Harmony of thought and action come with the development of harmony of sound.

5. Does music make worthy use of leisure hours? Employment of spare time is one of the major problems of our day. The problem is eliminated in most cases for those who play an instrument or sing. It is an ageless hobby. Music breaks down social barriers be cause "Music is the universal language."




