ORDINANCE NO. 149

An Ordinance fixing and deter mining the general service rate to be charged for sales of natural gas to residential and commercia consumers within the City Limits of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, and providing for the manner in which such rate may be changed, adjusted and amended.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iowa Park, Texas;

Section 1. Effective with the first gas bill rendered after the final approval of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Iowa Park, Texas, by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.944 Gross; \$1.75 Net

All Over 1,000 cu. ft. at \$.9956 per Mcf Gross; \$.896 per Mcf Net

No gas bill will be rendered to any desidential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

Adjustments

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, in the present authorized intracompany city rate charge as fixed by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax. or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net in come) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to November 1, 1969, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. 




