Reflections from the Bible

Iowa Park Church of Christ There is nothing any lower than a scandal monger. Things work out so that the Scandal Monger puts his own brand upon himself. and then is forced to wear it as long as Eternity. There are certain kinds of benighted souls who are dead sure the scandal they are telling is true. When truth has been vindicated, he alone bears the hurt he sought to inflict upon

others. Friendship should mean more than just pleasant association. If friendship means anything at all we should be willing to defend those of our friends when they are slandered in our presence.

What kind of friendship could it be when a friend is allowed to be slandered? Should not a real friend rise to his defense, and make it unnecessary for him to defend himself: Should not one guilty of such slander be properly silenced and shown the error of his way?

Occasionally I hear someone make some sort of sneering remark about baptism. These remarks often border at least on foul-mouthed blasphemy. I could not be a friend of my Lord if I did not challenge such enemies of his. I could not conscientiously stand by and hear his wisdom questioned, his veracity denied, and his speech slandered.

And the same goes for any other false doctrine. If friends would defend friends from slander, surely the Lord's friends must do the



There was Mr. and Mrs. Jim King operating a boarding house They had bought this boarding house from her parents Mr. and Mrs. Fuller, whom we all loved. Bill and Callie Smith tell of how they always felt as if they were a part of the Fuller family. Bill and the Fuller boys all worked together in the oilfield. Sometime later the Kings disposed of the boarding house and bought out a grocery store which he operated for years.

Dads Corner was a quick lively place but the excitement didn't last many years. In 1925 things began to slow up and people moved out to bigger and better boom towns. About this time the school consolidated with Geraldine district, the school building was torn down and on April 12th, 1925 was the last Sunday School on record.

Our beloved Dr. Parrish made many muddy drives out, in around the Dads Corner community in hot and cold weather, day and night.

Somewhere around the year of 1927 or 1928 tragedy struck. The grocery store of the Senter brothers burned, burning Mr. Rollon Senter with it, leaving only two grocery stores with other business. After this, people began to move away as the oil field was about drilled up. Leaving out with their businesses one by one, until only Jim King's grocery, Roy Eggen's

garage and Perry Boyd's grocery. In a lapse of time Roy Eggen moved his garage away. After some years Mr. King moved his store, leaving Perry Boyd with the only business in Dads Corner. After five years he sold to Roundeville and Spear. They ran the store sevyears, then sold to Jim Mur. phy. Because of ill health, he had to sell the store to Mr. and Mrs. Carl Metcalf, who then sold the store to Wayne Collier.

After his experience with Dads Corner for awhile, he decided to go on his way to a new home, leaving Dads Corner to be a closed history as far as business. But here came another family, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Lyles, who still have faith in Dads Corner and on July 11, 1958, bought the store and plan to reopen in the near future.




