## Iowa Park's 1,000th Telephone

Fifty-seven years ago, the first telephone was installed in Iowa Park for Dr. J. M. Bell, physician. By 1908 there were 99 telephones in service here.

Tuesday, Mr. and Mrs. Chester Dowell began use of Iowa Park's 1000th telephone. Southwestern Bell Telephone company officials were quite interested in this event, and made it something special for the Dowells.

This 1000th telephone is a beautiful ivory colored job and has a special plate telling its story.

The \$10 charge ordinarily made for a colored telephone was waived in honor of the event, and Mrs. Dowell was given a free long distance conversation with her mother in Canyon.

Mr. Dowell is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Dowell of Iowa Park. He is a graduate of West Texas State college at Canyon. After a tour of service in the army, he is now a teacher and coach at Valley View high school.

While in the army he was stationed for a time at Fort Sill, Ok., and played on the football team that won the world service championship in 1954. The title game was played in the Poinsettia Bowl in California.

In his other bowl game appearance, WTSC was victorious in the Sun Bowl at El Paso.

Mrs. Dowell has taught five years, but has quit to start a family.

The Dowells and their commemorative telephone are located in a beautiful small home at 600 West Washington.

Supt. Keith Swim and the principals James Elms and Miss Ethyle Kidwell are asking co-operation of parents on several school items.

Lunches are the same price as last year, 32 cents and 27 cents. They ask that students bring the exact change or checks to purchase lunch tickets, preferably checks. The tickets are \$1.60 and \$1.35.

All first grade children must have birth certificates and records of immunization from whooping cough, smallpox and diphtheria, or they will not be allowed to enter school the first day, or until these certificates are secured. This is a state law.

## School and Safety Go Together

Iowa Park schools will open for business Tuesday morning, Sept. 2, at 9:00 for approximately 900 children, about 90 of whom will be in the first grades.

When we think of school, we naturally think of safety for our children. This year the Evening Lions club with the co-operation of school officials, is sponsoring an all-out safety program.

Ross Chapman, safety chairman of the club and chief of police, and his committee Earle Denny and Wayne House, has mapped out a safety program which with co-operation from all citizens and parents should make our school zone one of the safest traffic terminals.

City officials and state highway department are co-operating in the program.

On all streets leading to school property, one block away will begin a 15 mile per hour zone—and this will be strictly enforced.

Traffic coming in on Cash and Victoria streets from the west and south will unload on the right side of Victoria next to the elementary building. Traffic going south on Victoria will unload at a safety zone at the corner of Park and Victoria and at an unloading zone near the Little Store. Passengers must unload from the right side and cross to the school grounds on the two crosswalks from the safety zones.

Chapman and a safety patrol, made up of volunteer students, will be on duty before and after school.

Twenty-five new stop signs have been placed in 10 new locations in Our Town, and several of these are near the school. Speed zone signs will be placed at various locations around the school.

Not only do motorists have to be careful near the school, but all over town, for children walking or riding bicycles will be found in all sections.

More signs will be erected as residents report traffic hazards. There are other dangers besides fast driving, such as trees, shrubs and other objects on private property that obstruct the view at intersections.

Careful trimming and pruning of such trees and shrubs will give a better view and save lives.

Realizing that motorists are not always at fault, the committee insists that parents and teachers instruct children in the proper way to walk to and from school in safety.

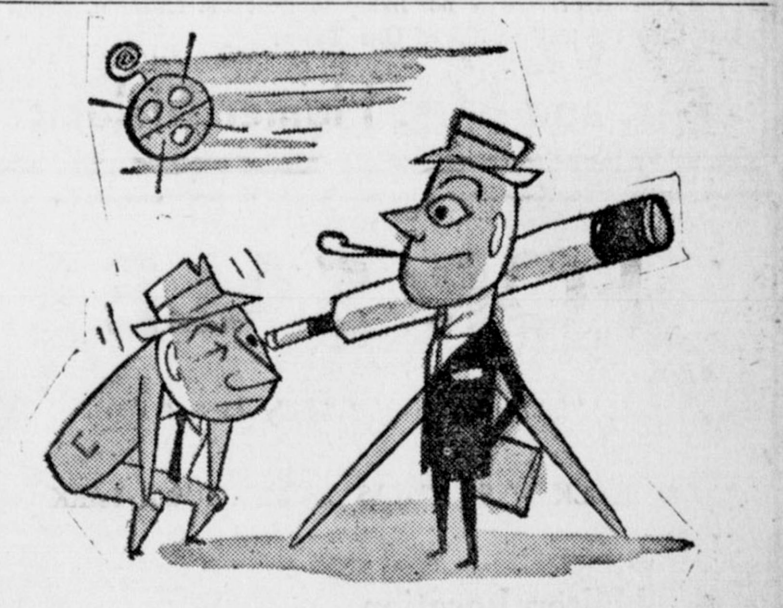
