T-O Fair

Thirtieth annual Texas-Oklahoma Fair will be held in Iowa Park Sept. 22-27, with the annual Pioneer Day on Tuesday.

Monday at 9:00 a.m. the gates will be opened and judging will start at 10:00 for Countywide and Girls 4-H exhibits. Other judging will be conducted throughout the day.

Open day parade will begin at 5:00 at the high school, travel to the business section and on to the Fair grounds.

According to T. Leo Moore, executive vice-president, this year will find more exhibits and more competition than ever before.

He has worked all year to have everything in readiness. He and Dr. Gordon G. Clark, president of the board, along with other officers and directors and committee chairmen, have met at various times to make this Fair everyone's—from the youngest to the oldest.

There will be free shows in the Auditorium each afternoon from 4:30 to 6:00 p.m. and each night except Wednesday.

Free rate tickets have been sent to all schools in the Fair area. Each child will receive one free pass.

Approximately 150 persons attended the Get Acquainted party given by the PTA, Monday evening in the school cafeteria.

Mrs. Ray Watson, president, extended a word of welcome.

"Education, Not by Chance," was presented by a large group of parents and teachers. This play put before the people an overall picture of what is expected of us as teachers and parents toward education in America.

Each teacher wore a red hat inscribed with name and grade.

Supt. Keith Swim introduced each teacher. During the fellowship hour the parents had opportunity of getting better acquainted with their children's teachers.

The membership committee reported 126 had paid dues. October is Membership Month. Dues are 50 cents for the year.

Next regular PTA meeting will be Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 8, in the school auditorium.

A leadership training course will be conducted in Electra, Wednesday, Oct. 1. It is hoped Iowa Park will have a large group at this important study course.

Park Folk Visit Telephone Plant

The Southwestern Bell Telephone company and officials were hosts to a group of representatives from the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, Jaycees and Lions club and their wives Tuesday evening.

Dinner was served at the YMCA in Wichita Falls with Gene Brunsenhan, Wichita Falls and Iowa Park manager, as master of ceremonies.

Curtis Sewell offered the invocation.

Brunsenhan thanked the guests for coming and said the telephone company has a good product and the aim is to improve it each day. The company has tried to give good service to Iowa Park and all area towns. He gave a short history of the telephone business in Iowa Park, which began in 1908 with 29 telephones, and pointed out that the 1000th telephone was recently installed here.

Other officials at the dinner were Ralph Templin, district manager; Miss Estelle Halstead, chief operator; C. C. Morgan, installation and maintenance manager; Paul Carter, head of the service department.

Carter said Iowa Park was the first area town to have the dial system (1948) and it will be the first to have local service with Wichita Falls, which begins at 1:01 a.m. Sept. 21.

He explained why the company gave Iowa Park seven digits in its dialing system. It is only a short time until all cities over the nation will be able to dial directly to any telephone in our country.

Immediately following the meal, the group was taken on a tour of the main telephone building by charming and gracious guides.

Those who attended feel they came back home better informed on one of the utilities used most every day—the telephone.

The group met at the school building and went by bus to the dinner and tour. They all expressed appreciation to Watkins Walker for driving the bus and Supt. of Schools Keith Swim for securing it for the trip.

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REASON AND REVELATION

"God's Gifts"

What God holds in his hands, and offers to give men, is what they need. It is often not what they want. The Israelites did not want it, and were ready to kill Moses because he insisted on their taking it. Christ was God's greatest gift to the world, but the Jews had him crucified. Men trust their own wisdom instead of God's. They are sure that they know what they want, but confess that they never find it. Men trust their own wisdom in vain.

When we get sick we take the wrong medicine. But God never gives the wrong medicine. God gives us what we need, when we need it. We send gifts to our friends at Christmas, but they get there a week late, and then they are not what they want. God always gives us enough, but we usually want too much. We need one settled conviction—that what God gives is punctually delivered, perfectly adapted to our needs, and sufficient for our satisfaction.

Some men eat too little and are not satisfied because they are still hungry; some eat too much and are dissatisfied because they have distress; but the man who eats just what he needs is satisfied because he feels well. Paul says, "But my God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:19). He says again, "And to know the love of Christ which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fullness of God" (Eph. 3:19). Many who have only a little of God in their lives are miserable, when the fullness of God would bring them perfect peace.

Paul says the gift of God is eternal life (Rom. 6:23). It is a serious mistake to think that no conditions are attached to this gift. The reason eternal life is a gift of God is because no one can do enough to earn it. But that does not mean that we are to do nothing. We must accept God's gift in the way that he offers to give it. God told the Israelites he would give them the land of Canaan, but when they learned they had to fight to get it, they did not want it. It was God's purpose to conquer Canaan through his people. They did not want to be that kind of instruments in God's hands, even though they would win the victory and possess the land. We can be victorious by the help of God and gain heaven. However, we must receive his instructions and obey them. Jesus said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." Will you?
