Southwest Oil Exposition, Sept. 22
to 27, is dedicated to creating a
more prosperous livestock and ag-
ricultural industry in North Texas
and Southwestern Oklahoma.

At this Fair, visitors will find
interesting and educational ex-
hibits which can be most helpful
in bringing new ideas to all in
the Fair area.

This year's premium catalog is
dedicated to E. Paul Waggoner, a
living monument to the heritage
of the Texas cattle country, and
to J. B. Thomas, president and
general manager of Texas Electric
Service company, of Fort Worth.
He is interested in many state and
local development activities.

Activities will start at 9:00 a.m.
next Monday, although the official
Opening Day Parade will not be
run until 6:00 p.m. All entries in
the parade are to assemble and
receive position assignments be-
tween 5:00 and 6:00.

There will be floats, riding clubs,
and industrial equipment. These
will be augmented by the children
with their pets and decorated bi-
cycles, and several school bands.

At 6:30 the Light Crust Dough
Boys will present a program in
the Main Auditorium.

At 7:45 the Midwestern univer-
sity Indian band will present a
concert, followed by an address
by Dr. Travis White, MU presi-
dent.

Every afternoon and early eve-
ning there is always a program of
some sort for those who like to
come to the Main Auditorium and
enjoy the entertainment.

Then of course the judging and
the several contests are being run
off at various times.

A top source of entertainment is
just to go from booth to booth,
eat and visit with friends and
make new acquaintances.

Many stockmen and farmers like
to spend hours each day inspecting
the stock and farm products, while
their women folk are seeing the
Home Demonstration club exhibits
and the Women's Department
booths.

But they like to be together as
they examine the varied exhibits
and entries of the school children
from all over the area.

Tuesday will be the annual Pio-
neer Day, which besides includ-
ing a special program also allows
for much visiting all over the
Fair Grounds and much harking
back to the early days. Early day
settlers always enjoy this day.

The free Chuck Wagon Dinner is
the climax of the celebration.

COMBAT ARTILLERY DISPLAY
A combat artillery unit of 44 men
from Fort Sill will be on display
just west of the Automobile build-
ing. This will be interesting and
educational. Sgt. Dunphy, with the
Wichita Falls recruiting station,
is in charge of this attraction.

ARMY MISSILES EXHIBIT
An army missiles exhibit will be
found in the Automobile building.
It tells the story of military rock-
ets and missiles from A.D. 1264
to the present and portrays future
use of missiles.

This display includes models of
army missiles, a full color movie
and associated graphics.

OPEN TWIRLING CONTEST
Certificates will be issued to
each contestant and will be graded
A, B, or C.

The Quannah Gayettes will per-
form at 1:30 Friday and the twir-
ling contest will begin for children
from the second through the sixth
grade.

Saturday at 9:00 a.m. the junior
twirlers from grades seven through
nine will compete.

At 1:30, two groups from Wichi-
ta Falls will perform and the
senior twirling contest, 10th
12th, will compete.

ORGAN AND PIANO MUSIC
Each afternoon at 4:30 and at
7:30, organ and piano numbers will
be presented in the Women's
Building. These have been planned
and arranged by Mrs. O. E. Loch-
ridge of Iowa Park.

Two outstanding performers will
be Jimmie Park and James Green
of Wichita Falls. They are much
in demand in this area and have
been invited to play at the State
Fair of Dallas.



Iowa Park's new dial telephone
system will go into service at 1:01
a.m. Sunday. After that time tele-
phone users here will be able to
dial Wichita Falls without a long
distance charge.

"This means you can call more
than 40,500 telephones without a
toll charge," Gene Brusenhan, man-
ager for Southwestern Bell Tele-
phone company, says.

Calls may be dialed to Wichita
Falls in the same manner as resi-
dents now make a call right here
in Iowa Park.

"Everything is ready for the
change. We will make the conver-
sion to the new dial office while
most people are sleeping in order
not to interrupt any calls," said
Brusenhan.

Iowa Park was converted to dial
December 8, 1939, and that equip-
ment has been in use here since
then. The city had fewer than 200
telephones when it was converted
to dial operation.

Southwestern Bell took over op-
eration of the Iowa Park exchange
in 1909. There were 47 telephones
in service here then. It wasn't until
late 1917 that the city had 100
phones.

By the first of 1925 there were
218, and three years later the 300th
telephone had been installed.

It was in 1928 that the number
of telephones started dropping.
The trend continued until 1936,
when the city had a low of 181
telephones in use.

Since that time the Iowa Park
city has been one of growth.
"And it's still growing," Brusen-
han added. "We expect it to grow
at an even faster clip now that
long distance charges are being
eliminated between here and Wichi-
ta Falls."

The number of telephones here
climbed back to 250 in 1941 and by
1946 the all-time high of 315 had
been surpassed.

There were 382 telephones here
at the beginning of 1947, and in
less than three years, in 1949, the
500th telephone was installed.

While it took more than 10 years
to attain the first 500, the second
500 telephones were added in less
than 9 years.

The city's 1,000th telephone was
installed here recently.

Wichita Falls currently has more
than 39,500 telephones in use. "This
new system makes telephone serv-

ice in both cities more valuable.
You can call more people and
more people can call you," Brusen-
han pointed out.

When long distance charges are
eliminated between the two cities,
there will be an increase in basic
rates for Iowa Park:

Two party residence \$4.70
Private line residence 5.50
Business 14.00
Rural residence 4.25
Rural business 9.50

The monthly rates quoted above
do not include state and federal
taxes.

All telephone numbers here will
change when the new dial office
goes into service. The prefix for
Iowa Park will be 592-. This will
be followed by four numerals.

New Iowa Park and Wichita
Falls directories have been mailed
to all customers here.

Number plates for the center of
every dial telephone in the city
have been mailed to make it eas-
ier for customers to give their new
numbers to others.

"We hope everyone will refer to
his directories when making local
calls after the conversion," Brusen-
han said.

Dr. Thomas J. Pace, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Pace of Iowa Park, has accepted a position with the University of Denver (Colo.). He will have the graduate school in speech and supervise debating for the university.

Thomas is a native of Our Town, a 1946 honor graduate of high school, and was winner in district in declamation while a student here.

He received the bachelor's and master's degrees at Southwestern university, Georgetown.

Thomas was married to Miss Sue Ann Landrum in Georgetown, May 1951. They moved to Iowa Park for several years, where Thomas was associated in business with his father, who had suffered a heart attack. He later taught in the Wichita Falls high school speech department and Sue Ann taught in the elementary school here.

REASON AND REVELATION
 by GLENN OWEN
"Discipleship"

"Art not thou also one of this man's disciples?" (John 18:17). Under the circumstances, Peter thought it was none of this damsel's business whose disciple he was, so he told her "No." It looked like a lost cause to Peter, and apparently he had decided to back out of it. All of us deplore Peter's behavior on this occasion, but in the eyes of the Lord, many of Christ's disciples do things now that are just as bad. In one way or another, this question comes to all of us, and we must be careful how we answer it.

Let us consider first of all what constitutes discipleship. Webster defines the word "disciple" as one who receives instruction from another. There are many today who claim to be disciples of Christ and yet reject what His word instructs them to do. Jesus said, "If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed." Even though a man might say that he is a disciple of Jesus, if his life is not governed by the word of the Master certainly this is evident proof that he is not one of His.

How does one become a disciple of Jesus? Men are made disciples of Christ by a definite pattern. Jesus told his apostles to go and make disciples by baptizing them (Matt. 28:18-20). Any one who is scripturally baptized is a disciple of Christ, and no one can be a disciple any other way. Men are not only to make a start in discipleship, but they are to keep on in it. In being disciples of Christ, men must reject every other claim. "If any man come to me and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:26).

All who are disciples of Christ must be willing to follow where he leads (Matt. 16:24). It is not easy to deny self, take up our cross and follow the Lord, but that is the only way to be his disciple. We must be like him (Phil. 2:5-9). We must walk as he walked (1 John 2:6). We must bear fruit (John 15:8). Too many have the mistaken idea that a Christian is simply a meek person that is too weak to do anything else. Discipleship is the real test of a man. It takes courage to say no to the lusts of the flesh, and to keep oneself unspotted from the world. And yet discipleship is more than that. It is the complete submission to the will of Christ as it is revealed in the New Testament. Are you a disciple of Christ?
