





Jahovah's throne. To have one's mind so closed by prejudice that it will not investigate the Bible to see what it says is very dangerous.

In order to be wise unto salvation, we must be wise unto what the scriptures say about obedience. We must obey the gospel (1 Pet. 1:22-23). We must hear the blessed gospel (Heb. 11:6; Rom. 10:17). We must believe (John 8:24; John 3:16). We must repent (Luke 13:3; Acts 2:38). We must confess (Matt. 10:32-33) and must submit to the baptism commanded by Jesus Christ. This is a burial (Rom. 6:3-4) and requires much water.
