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REASON AND REVELATION

"I Thought"

"I verily thought within myself, that I ought to do many things contrary to the name of Jesus of Nazareth" (Acts 26:9). And many other people think just as Paul did. They shut out the light of God's word and think "within themselves." A man of this kind thinks that all that is necessary to be a Christian is to live a moral life, go by his own conscience and join the church of his choice. Paul thought he was doing what God wanted him to do, when he was persecuting Christians and making havoc of the church.

The way a man thinks is often his greatest hindrance. God says, "My thoughts are not your thoughts." Paul says, "The world by wisdom knew not God." No one knows what is right by the way he thinks within himself. Naaman nearly missed the healing power of God by persisting in his own way of thinking. He said, "Behold, I thought, he will surely come out to me, and stand, and call on the name of the Lord his God, and strike his hand over the place, and recover the leper" (2 Kings 5:11). Naaman thought the prophet would come out and per form like a fake healer. Elisha told him what to do to get well, but he did not want to do that. It was contrary to his way of thinking. It seems that Naaman thought that his dignity was slighted by Elisha's refusal to come out to him. But Elisha was not interested in his chariot, horses, and fine har ness. He cared nothing for his pomp. Elisha did not see him as "captain of the host of the Syrians." He saw him as a leper,

and told him what to do to get well. Naaman did not want to do anything. He wanted Elisha to do it all. To wash himself seven times in the river Jordan was repugnant to him. He thought the rivers of the land of Damascus were much better. His way of thinking was a hindrance to him. The story of Naaman is very typical of what some people would like for the gospel to be. Men grumble and over the conditions of the gospel of its power. They think that just because they don't see any reason to obey the gospel, that it nullifies the terms of pardon. Just because they can't see the reason for immersion instead of sprinkling, they say that anything will be all right. And those that know what the gospel really says, sometimes because they think differently, will not hear or preach the truth. If we are sick, it does not do us any good to tell the physician how we want to be cured. If we are sinners it does not modify the procedure if we tell God how we want to be saved. We are not saved according to our will, but the will of the Father. Let us take the Bible as the divine Word of the Father, and handle it with fear; not altering or adding but simply obeying.

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

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
