Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 11 at the Trinity Lutheran church of Clara, for Mr. C. P. VanLoh, 82, a pioneer of this area and father of Mrs. Floyd May of Iowa Park.

Mr. VanLoh died Sunday at his home in Burkburnett.

## VISITORS FROM PORTO RICO INSPIRE REUNION OF WILL DETLEFS FAMILY

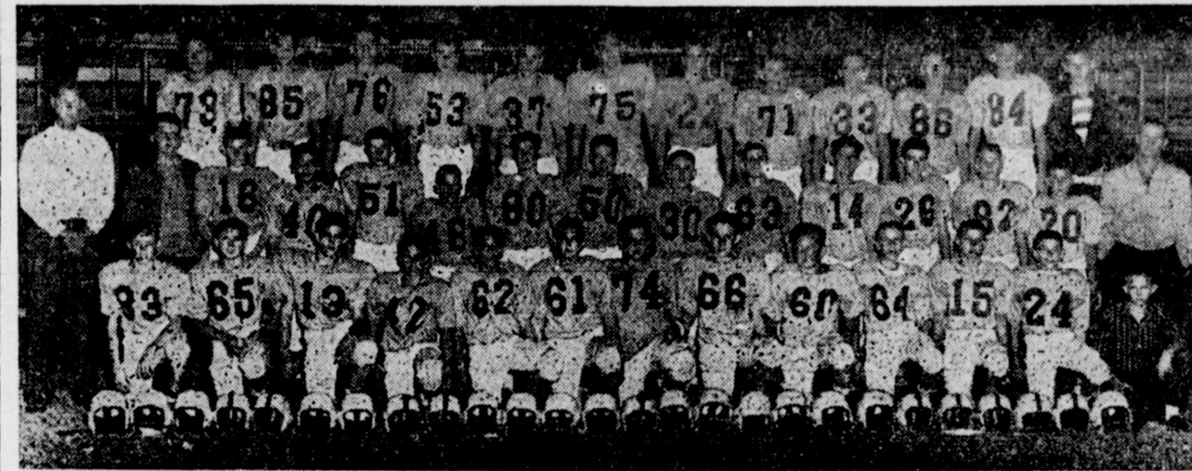

Mr. McDonald was injured in a fall several months ago near Electra and has been a patient in the Wichita General hospital since.

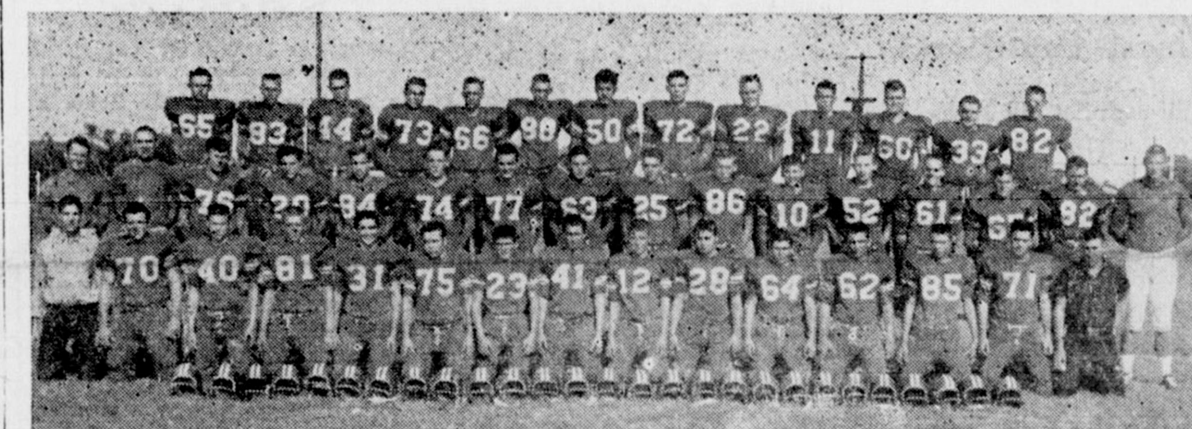

Mac Mills scored the first TD on a 3 yard plunge, Tony Waters the second on a 14 yard run, David Parkey the third on a 15 yard pass, Malcolm Berry the fourth on a 5 yard plunge, and Jim Banks the last one on an 8 yard run.

Outstanding for the Hawks on defense were James Paris, Herman Beavers, Lee Holloway, Roy Boutwell and Paul Parkey.

Hawks end the season this Friday night at Valley View, champs of 11B.

Junior high Hawks won the district championship game with Munday here Tuesday night by a 16-6 score. This is the first time the junior high has won the district play-off game, although they had played for the title the past four years.

Basketball season begins here next Tuesday night with practice games with the Burkburnett Bulldogs.

## THIS WEEK IN THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Daily devotionals are a part of the regular schedule in elementary school here. Each room has a New Testament on the teacher's desk. This testament was presented by the Gideon Society.

Some of the rooms have larger Bibles. A glance into Mrs. Sutton's third grade Tuesday morning found the pupils in a prayer service.

Last year the sixth grade pupils in Mrs. Reaves' room presented a nice Bible to the room as a parting gift.

Phonics is not only taught but stressed in the elementary school. The teachers believe the teaching of the sound of letters and combination of letter sounds is an invaluable aid in the teaching of reading and spelling. Tone deafness is as frequent as color blindness in children. The teachers find many pupils who are tone deaf. This makes it necessary for pupils to memorize spelling words, etc. This is a great hindrance to quick learning.

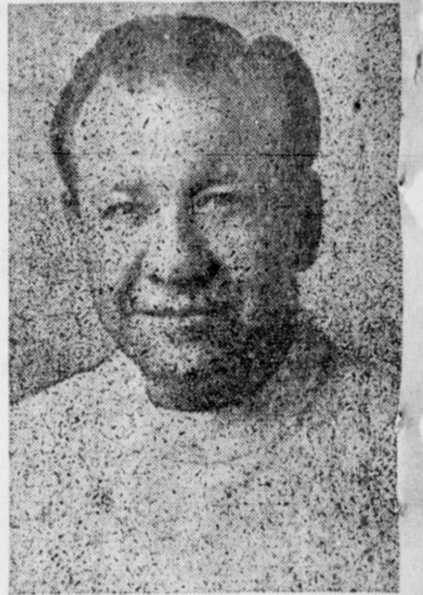
