
Sister Dies

"WHEN DOES FAITH SAVE?"

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Our Debt to Christ

This is the week, above all others, each year that we like to dwell for awhile on the deep significance of Jesus Christ and the Christian religion which He gave to the world.

Christianity is only one of the many religions the world has known. It is, however, much more than just another religion. Other peoples have worshiped and made sacrifices to the sun, the moon, or to carved idols.

Christ, whose birth we observe this Holy Week, gave a meaning to life and to the brotherhood of man. Through the nearly twenty centuries since Christ was born, many men have sacrificed their life for Him, but not a life has been sacrificed

He lived and taught the dignity and the meaning of life, its purposes and its rewards on Earth as well as after death. Christianity is truly a way of life and of living that has made the world more beautiful and more satisfying.

When we think of Christmas we think of Christmas gifts. In fact, "Christmas gifts" is about the most frequently used expression during this week. How many of us get more pleasure out of giving than receiving? Christ said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." He also said "Give and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over." He said, "There is no one who has given for my sake who shall not receive a hundredfold."

Does that sound practical to you? Or does it sound like a beautiful but impractical theory heard only from the pulpit? Well, let's see how it has worked when applied to our Nation.

Almost a hundred years ago the United States was the first among modern, civilized nations to give up slave labor. What did we receive? We have made America into the most mechanized and productive nation in the world.

Christ taught us that we are our brother's keeper and He said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these, so have you done it unto me." During the past 15 years we have given liberally of our material wealth to the less fortunate people of the world.

We have, I believe, given more than \$30 billion worth of food, clothing, tools and other sustenance to the peoples of more than 40 nations. We have "cast our bread upon the waters" and it has come back to us one hundredfold.

I am 70 years old and I have never seen a Christmas when the great majority of the people of this country had such good homes, as good food, as good clothes, as many of the convemiences that make life more satisfying.

This is a Christmas season when all of us can truly say Jesus was a wise prophet when He said, "It is more blessed to give then to receive." For, in giving we have received many times over what we gave.

We have in our hearts that peace for which He died on the Cross of Calvary.



Safest Roads Control Access

By Jeanne Smith, Dodge Safety Consultant

ALTHOUGH it's commonly elieved that four-lane divided highways are the safest roads on which to travel, a recent study reveals that such roads can be high-

-unless they have controlled ac-

by the Michigan State Highway department es-tablishes

that four-lane divided . Miss Smith highways without access control are among the most dangerous roads to travel.

On the other hand, four-lane divided highways, with control of entrance and exit, are four

times as safe as other high-ways, the study shows.

John C. Mackie, Michigan state highway commissioner, says the study indicates that four-lane divided highways, without access control give without access control, give the motorist a false sense of security.

"Such roads," he points out,
"encourage travel at high speeds
because they separate traffic
and provide additional room for maneuverability. However, they still subject the motorist to friction from vehicles or pedestrians moving in and out of roadside services, business establishments and residences.

"They require stop lights at major intersections which vastly increase rear-end collision potential They also require leftturning in the face of oncoming

high speed traffic.
"In short," Mackie says,
"although they are capable of carrying a greater volume of traffic than a two-lane high-way, they still expose the motorist to the same hazards, at a higher rate of speed, as the obsolete two-lane high-way they were designed to im-prove upon or replace."

Mackie believes that the pres-

ent controlled access highway system in Michigan, along with the 900 miles of proposed similar highways, will save more than 50 lives the first year, and at least 2000 accidents.
