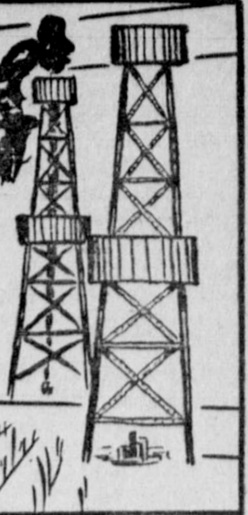

This year the Polio officials are urging everyone to take the 4th polio shot. Records show that polio is definitely on the decline in areas where the shots have been administered.

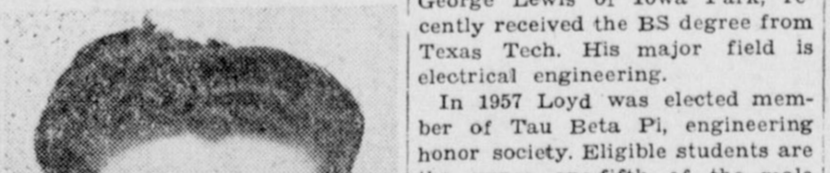
**LAST CALL FOR SCHOOL CENSUS**

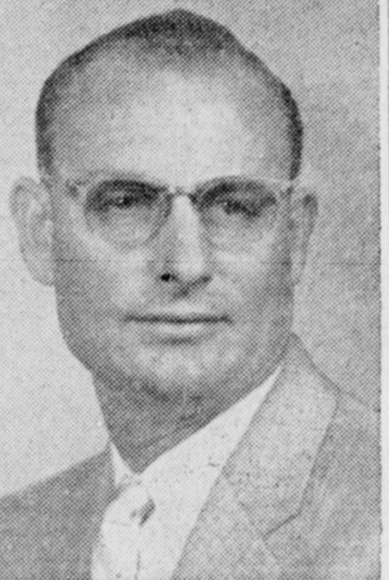
Loyd has accepted a position with Temco of Dallas as a junior engineer designing motors for aircraft.

### Brighter Prospects for Home-Furnishing Field

Few industries felt the impact of last year's recession as much as the home furnishing makers. Tighter pocketbooks and restrained spending by consumers coupled with the retailers' desire to reduce inventories caused a drastic drop in sales and earnings during 1957 and early 1958. Now, after last year's improved second half, manufacturers are looking to the future and forecasting substantially better business. Since mid 1958 consumer spending has turned upwards and with retail inventories depleted, the demand for home furnishings is expected to show sustained improvement.

**Carpet and Rug Manufacturers:** While the demand for carpets has steadily improved since World War II with a pronounced trend towards wall to wall carpeting, it has failed to produce the profits originally anticipated. Stimulating this growth has been the rapid population increase, and adequate home construction pace and rising standards of living. A further incentive to sales has been lower retail costs brought about by lower priced raw materials being used in carpet manufacture, such as tufted cotton and rayon.

It would seem from all this that the industry would have been able to show better operating results. However, this has not been the case. During the post-war period most of the companies reported erratic earnings with many frequently reporting deficit operations. The reasons for this unsatisfactory performance have been the increased competition which has entered the field both through new fabrics and additional companies entering the industry, and by increased labor costs and obsolete plants. A further factor has been competition from abroad caused by lower wage rates and low tariffs. The recent recession in the carpet industry reached its bottom during the third quarter of last year. Since that time a market turnaround has occurred. Orders have surged forward due to the renewed retail purchases and also due to depleted inventories at the retail level. Aiding the manufacturers was the fact that most of the companies were no longer

plagued with the heavy-start-up expenses that were experienced in the past several years brought about by moving their operations to the south. Finally the carpet industry is one with fairly heavy fixed charges. Therefore, as operating rates increase, profit margins rise significantly.

This year and for the near term future it is our opinion that the carpet issues should enjoy significantly better times than they have had in the recent past. We base this premise on our conviction that the home will become more and more the social prestige item that the automobile was during the 1940s and early 1950s. On this basis we have two purchase suggestions in the industry: *Lees*, the only investment quality issue and *Bigelow-Sanford*, an interesting speculation.

**Furniture and Bedding Manufacturers:** Both furniture and bedding manufacturing are highly competitive fields and ones where there are many small companies in the business. *Kroehler*, one of the few large companies in the industry, is our investment choice.

Furniture manufacturers normally sell the bulk of their output to retail furniture stores, department stores and mail order houses. Sales for the industry since the war have shown moderate improvement although results for the first half of 1958 were in a downward trend in line with other consumer products. Over-all, sales last year dropped 7-8% from the year before. This year, encouraged by the sharp sales gain in the fourth quarter of last year, a substantial rise is anticipated. Depleted retail inventories are being restocked and restocked to a level higher than that carried throughout 1958. On top of this furniture retailers increased their prices about 5% in the last quarter of last year. Due to this price rise profit margins should improve at an even faster rate than sales.

He was married to Miss Evie Vandergriff in 1893 at Emblem, near Sulphur Springs. Mrs. Glosup died in 1935. Mr. Glosup later came here to make his home with his daughter.

## MOTOR MAIDS



### How To Avoid Skidding

By Martha Johnson

**MOST WINTER DRIVING** skills occur at turns and curves and when starting or stopping. To avoid skidding, many drivers virtually stop at every slippery curve or turn.

They use short, repeated brakings — rather than one hard plunge on the brake pedal — to slow the car. As the curve is reached, a little acceleration will keep the car moving around the danger.

With increased power going into the wheels from the motor, more control is gained over the automobile itself. Instead of negative action only, positive control is acquired.

**BUT BE CAREFUL** and use only a little gas to negotiate the curve. Too much gas and too fast a pickup can start the wheels spinning and cause the car to skid.

If the car does go into a skid, turn the front wheels in the direction the car is skidding. This permits the wheels to roll and stops the slide.

A common sense rule is to test the road surface in bad weather. If it is icy, try a practice stop and find out—before an emergency arises—just how much and what kind of braking is required to stop safely.

These same techniques apply to wet, muddy, or loose gravel roads.
