

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: After alleging jurisdiction, plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant were married on or about July 4th, 1955 and continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about December 27th, 1955, when by reason of cruel and harsh treatment and improper conduct on the part of the defendant toward this plaintiff, was of such nature as to render their further living together as husband and wife insupportable; that there were no children born of sald marriage and that there is no community property.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that the defendant be cited to appear and answer herein, and that upon trial hereof, she have Judgment for Divorce and for such other and further relief, special and general, in law and in equity, that she may be justly entitled to, as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

One basic factor can be pin-pointed for increased driving dif-

ficulties in wet weather: Less Friction.
Friction between tires and pavement produces traction.
Without traction we couldn't

turn a corner, stop or start a car.
So, safe winter driving requires
extra friction.
HERE, THEN, are a few suggestions for deep-winter driving:
When roads are slippery from

snow or ice, many good drivers start in high gear with cars equipped with standard trans-missions. This eliminates wheel spinning. With automatic transmissions it generally is best to feed the gas slowly for the same.

Stopping is even more of a problem in wet or icy weather. However, a few simple rules eliminate most danger.

FIRST, begin to stop some distance from your destination. Release the accelerator pedal slowly. Press the brake lightly at first, and release it almost at


