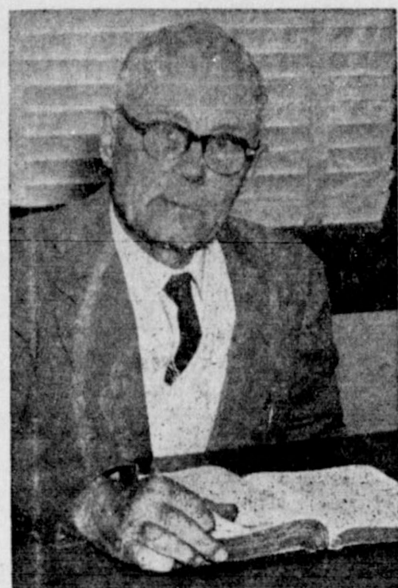

Decorations and program fea-
tured the long period of service
for churches well scattered over
the nation, which the couple has
successfully performed. Dr. Carter
will conduct his final service in
the local church Easter Sunday,
after which he and Mrs. Carter
will move to Springfield Mo.

Maps of states in which Dr. Car-
ter has worked were used to de-
corate the tables. Pennsylvania was
cut out of styrafoam and featured
trains on each side. The Indiana
map was decorated with horses,
representing horse racing, which is
popular there.

The Empire State building was
erected on the map of New York
state. Oil derricks and cows de-
picted Texas' main industries.

Mules looking over a fence on
each side of the roadway at the
speakers table were used to re-
present Missouri, to which Dr. and
Mrs. Carter are retiring.

The program, directed by Rollins
Woodall, featured a state conven-
tion. Members of the church told
of Dr. Carter's work in the various
states. He replied with a talk
about his work in Iowa Park.

The farewell courtesy was at-
tended by approximately 100 per-
sons.

Service Held for Mrs. J. H. Jones

Funeral services were held for
Mrs. Coral Jones, 69, a longtime
resident of this area, at 2:30 p.m.
Thursday at Lamar Baptist church
in Wichita Falls. Burial was in
Highland cemetery.

Mrs. Jones, a resident here for
33 years, died in a Wichita Falls
hospital Tuesday night after a
lengthy illness.

Born in McLennan county June
22, 1889, she was married to J. H.
Jones in Waco, Oct. 5, 1904.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones moved from
Iowa Park to the Seymour road
between Holliday and Wichita
Falls. About 18 months ago they
moved into Wichita Falls, where

School Bonds Approved

Three hundred thirty-one inter-
ested eligible citizens out of ap-
proximately 700 went to the polls
Tuesday and voted approval of a
\$125,000 school issue. The tally was
289 for and 42 against issuance of
the bonds.

The \$125,000 will be added to
\$65,000 already voted and regular
school tax funds and federal aid
of \$17,000 to build a new \$207,000
elementary school at the corner of
Third and West Louisa. Construc-
tion will probably begin within
two months.

Present elementary school will
be continued.

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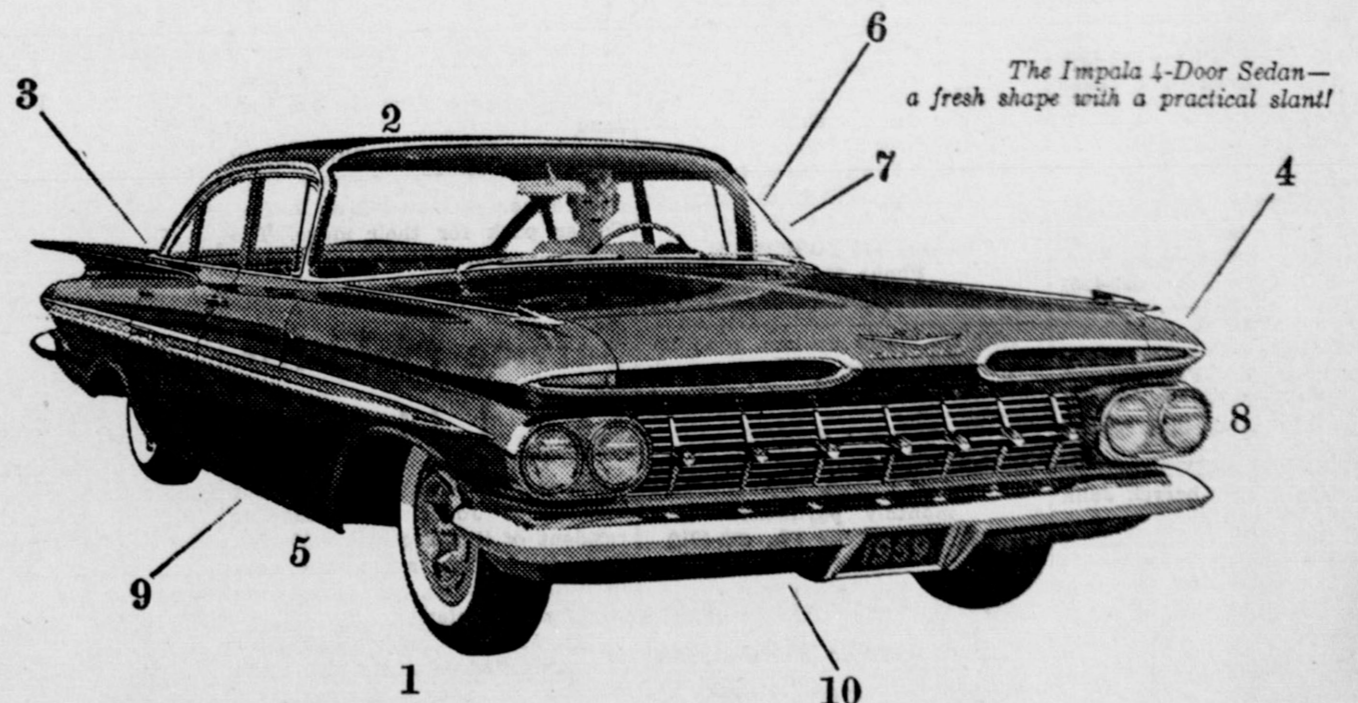

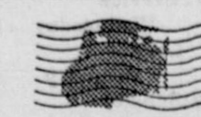

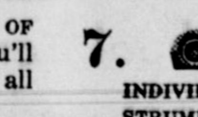
