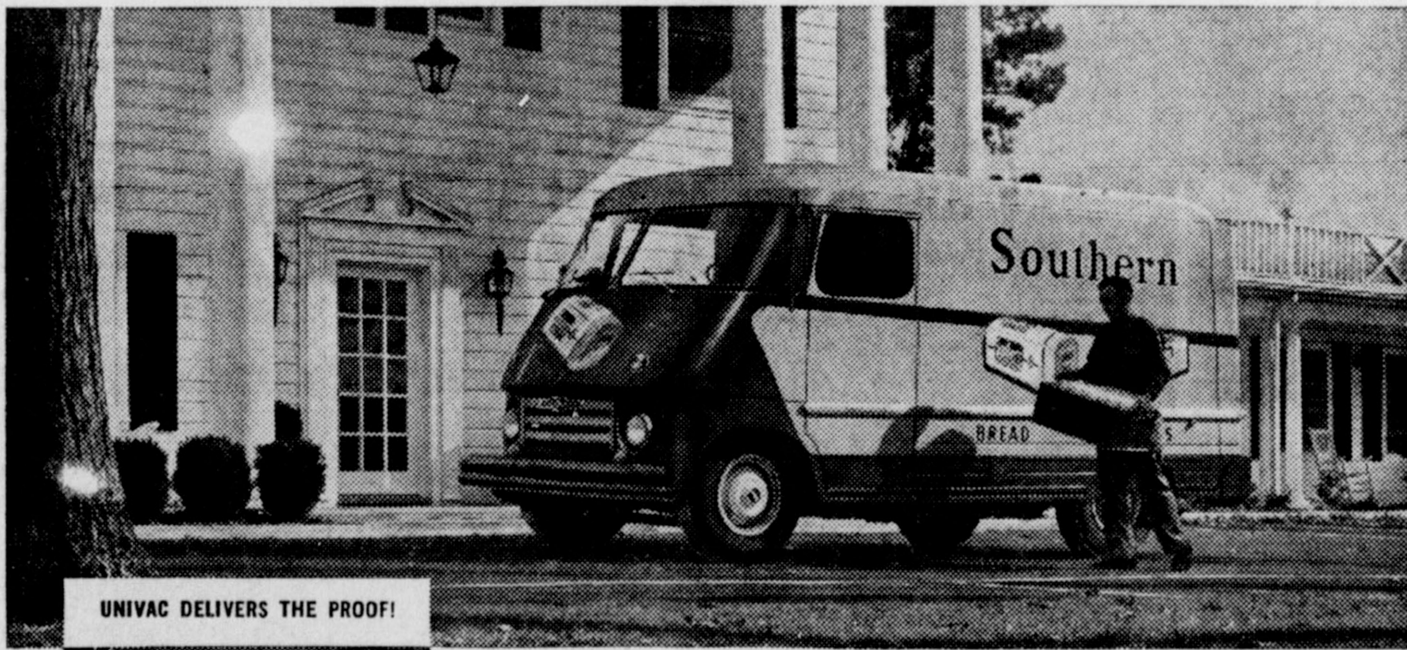

ORDINANCE NO. 284 THE STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF WICHITA, CITY OF IOWA PARK.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas in regular session on this 13th day of April, A.D. 1959, that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas any radio, television, or microwave tower, or other similar tower, the height of which is greater than the distance from the base of such tower to the nearest point on the boundary of the tract of land owned by the person, firm or corporation upon which such tower is constructed.

Be it further ordained that any person, firm, or corporation violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense, and each day on which this ordinance is violated shall be considered a separate offense.

This Ordinance shall be and become effective after its passage and publication, as required by law.

The young couple will be united in marriage Friday, May 22, in the local Church of Christ, with Glenn Owen, minister, officiating.

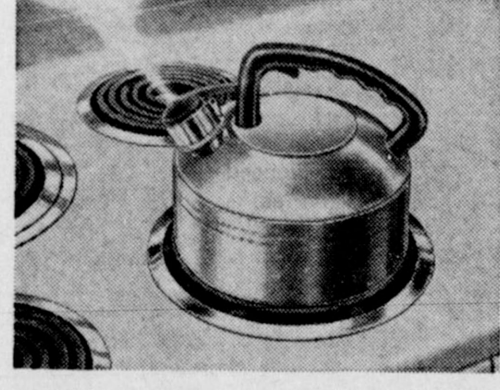

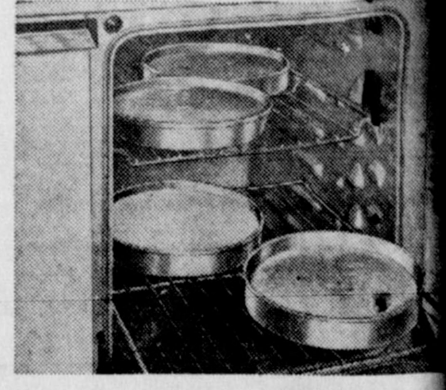
