Mr. Frazier died Wednesday, April 22, at 11:00 a.m. in Wichita General hospital after a long illness.

Mr. Frazier was born Oct. 12, 1889 in Tipper county, Miss. He came with his parents to Texas while a lad of 12 years, settling in Van Zant county.

In 1927 he came to Valley View and Kamay communities where he was engaged in farming. He was married to Miss Nora Belle Shelton, Feb. 18, 1928.

In 1945 Mr. and Mrs. Frazier moved into Iowa Park. She is now living here.

Before his death Mr. Frazier was employed with Wichita County Precinct 3 for two years and with Wichita Sand and Gravel Co. for three years.

Surviving besides the widow are 16 children; 35 grandchildren; 37 great-grandchildren; 5 great-great-grandchildren.

Park Cited for Visual Aids

James Park of Iowa Park was one of two area Soil Conservation Service technicians receiving recently letters of commendation for work done in demonstrating importance of proper grazing v. side-outs grama grass.

Mr. and Mrs. Park moved to Iowa Park in December 1949 from Throckmorton, and he has been with the Iowa Park work unit since.

The letter sent by H. N. Smith of Temple said:

"I am pleased to recognize with this letter and foresight in developing locally adapted visual aids. "Recognizing the need for visually demonstrating proper range utilization, you have developed a very effective aid. You are to be commended for preparing the visual aid depicting the proper use of sideouts grama and making plans for continuing the study on other grasses."

"These aids should prove to be of great assistance in encouraging ranchers to properly utilize their rangeland by demonstrating to them the effect close grazing has on the root system. "This letter will be made a permanent part of your personal record in the state and national offices. We sincerely appreciate your interest in developing these visual aids and hope you will continue to seek other means to assist you in the application of soil, water and plant conservation practices."
