


Citizens of Iowa Park join with other people of this wide area in rejoicing that Midwestern university in Wichita Falls has achieved its greatest boost in the history of that school.

Senate Bill 6, introduced by George Moffett and pushed through that branch of the legislature, was passed Wednesday in the House by a margin of 109-29. It is believed the governor will sign it into law without delay.

By this move, Midwestern becomes a 4-year state-supported institution of higher learning.

The state will assume operation of Midwestern Sept. 1, 1861.


