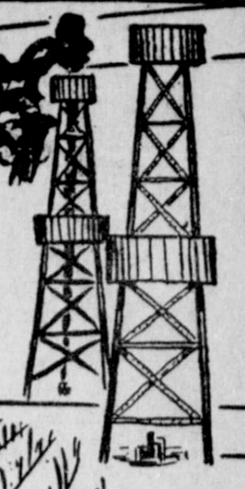

Ed Clark Home Is Medallion House

The keys to their new Live Better Electrically Medallion Home were presented Saturday, April 25, to Mr. and Mrs. Ed Clark by N. E. Guthrie jr., builder.

This home, located at 500 West Texas, has been cited for the electrical industry's top tribute—the Live Better Electrically Medallion—for the excellence of its wiring, lighting and electrical equipment.

This 2200 square foot home has been traffic-planned for maximum livability. Sleeping areas are well separated from living areas to assure quiet and privacy. Ease of passage for indoor-outdoor living has been planned so that the combination living-kitchen-family room opens directly on the carport and covered patio.

The kitchen has been planned almost to "run itself." Major electrical appliances—which Guthrie calls "the basic tools of today's creative housewife"—are built-in automatic electric range, dishwasher and disposal.

In the kitchen, appliances, work counters and cabinets are arranged for maximum efficiency and to reduce unnecessary steps. Scientifically planned kitchen lighting assures shadow-free illumination at sink, range and work surfaces.

Special lighting is included to create a gracious atmosphere even for the most informal family meals. Lighting throughout the house closely follows the electrical industry's "Light for Living" plan to provide maximum overall illumination with accent lighting at work and leisure areas. Special lighting features include valance and cove lighting in the living and family areas.

For freer placement of portable lamps, television sets, radios and phonographs, electrical outlets are unusually numerous and conveniently located.

The home also abounds with "on-off" controls—so that light always can be turned on "ahead" and turned off "behind."

A "hidden" asset of the house is its outstanding wiring system—designed to provide full house-power for present electrical loads, with capacity to spare for additional electrical installations in the years to come.

Midwestern Bill Passed!

Citizens of Iowa Park join with other people of this wide area in rejoicing that Midwestern university in Wichita Falls has achieved its greatest boost in the history of that school.

Senate Bill 6, introduced by George Moffett and pushed through that branch of the legislature, was passed Wednesday in the House by a margin of 109-29. It is believed the governor will sign it into law without delay.

By this move, Midwestern becomes a 4-year state-supported institution of higher learning.

The state will assume operation of Midwestern Sept. 1, 1961.

Much credit is being given to area representatives in the House for the overwhelming vote. Such men as Vernon Stewart and Jack Connell jr. of Wichita County, George Truett, Tony Fenoglio and Bill Heatley of neighboring counties, fought shoulder to shoulder to bring final approval.

HOW TO GET GOD'S ATTENTION

I have to laugh every time I think of an incident in Mark Twain's book, "Tom Sawyer." It was Sunday and visitors had come to the little church. These were a judge and his family. The little church was rustling with excitement. The Sunday school teachers moved here and there, eyeing their students and shaking their fingers coyly at them. The Superintendent went from class to class very importantly. Tom Sawyer pulled a little girl's hair, pinched one of his buddies and made a general nuisance of himself. The older people sat dignified and pious.

Everyone was doing his best to look like something special. They were, as we would call it, "showing off."

The portly judge and his family sat in their pew and smiled with benevolent kindness upon everyone else. You see, he was showing off, too!

This incident is thoroughly and genuinely human. We all like to get attention, to be needed and wanted.

It is possible that not all of us will ever have the attention of the whole world. In fact, we may never stir more than just a ripple of excitement. But there is one thing certain: Everyone of us can get the attention of God.

Lee Shelton attended one of our Crusades. You will enjoy the story of how he got God's attention for his need. This account has been documented and medically checked.

"I was a mere speck in a sea of people that tumbled in and out around the fringes of the huge tent cathedral. This was my first opportunity to attend and this was the closing night.


"I had been wounded in World War II. For 12 years I had struggled through the streets of Danville, Virginia, burdened with a brace and cane, dragging a useless, shrunken leg. My discharge papers read: '... deformity acquired from injury, personal nerve paralysis.'

"I stood there swallowed up among the multitude. The hopelessness of getting to be prayed for swept over me. After all, I thought, 'who am I among so many thousands of needy people!'

"As I sat in my chair watching the sick being prayed for and meditating upon the goodness of God, the minister stopped. He looked out into the vast crowd and said, 'If there is an afflicted person in the audience tonight, who will place his hand upon his affliction and pray with me, God will heal him.'

"I did as he had said and before I finished praying, the power of God rocketed through my leg. It vibrated through every fiber of my flesh with such energy that it snapped the straps that held the brace upon my leg. I threw down my cane, leaped to my feet and ran down the aisle shouting and praising God!

"I attracted everyone's attention around me that night, but better still, I had attracted God's attention—I was instantly healed."

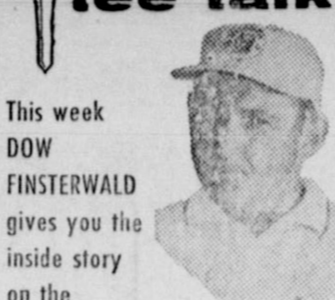

This week DOW FINSTERWALD gives you the inside story on the SNEAD-MAXWELL ABC-TV ALL-STAR GOLF MATCH

Let's get something straight from the start. Billy Maxwell, a craftsman at the game of golf, shot a very commendable 69 on the small, but tough, DeSota Lake Country Club in Sarasota, Florida... but he just couldn't turn the trick against "Slamming" Sam Snead. Billy played great golf, but Sam played almost unbelievable golf, and that was the difference.

At the outset, it looked like Billy was going to do it. He racked up two birdies in a row on the first two par 4's, sinking an 18-footer and a 6-footer to do it. In the meanwhile, Snead bogeyed the first, and came back with a birdie. On the 3rd and 4th holes, unfortunately, Maxwell's putting touch was really off, and he bogeyed both holes to even up the match. On the sixth hole, Billy Maxwell went ahead again, when Sam Snead's 8-iron was trapped and he was forced to take a bogey 5.

Snead started his fireworks on the par 5, 8th hole. It is 495 yards, but Sam made it look easy. A 285 yard tee shot and a 210 yard one-iron placed him 35 feet from the pin, on the green in two. He just missed his approach putt for an eagle, and tapped in a short putt for a birdie 4. On the 9th, he came right back with another birdie, sinking a 35-footer to give him a first round score of 34 against Maxwell's 35.

Then Snead really turned on the heat. Both players parred the 10th hole, they both birdied the 11th, but Sam seemed to like the birdie habit and he proceeded to birdie the 12th, 13th, 14th, and 15th holes. On the 12th, he earned his birdie with a great 4-iron that put him 2 1/2 feet from the pin. On the 13th, he sunk a 23-footer. On the 14th, par 5, he again hit a tee shot 255 yards, put his 6-iron 24 feet from the pin, then just missed his eagle for an easy birdie 4. On the 15th, he again hit a great 4-iron four feet from the pin to sink his putt for a birdie 3... giving him seven birdies out of eight holes.

At this point, Maxwell was 5 strokes down to Snead, but he still was in there fighting. On the 16th, par 4 hole, his second shot went over the green, leaving him 50-feet from the pin. Billy then took his trusty 8-iron for a pitch and run that dropped for a birdie 3. Both men parred the 17th, but Sam took a bogey on the 18th, to give him a round of 66 against Billy Maxwell's 69.

This victory brought Snead's All-Star Golf total earnings to \$19,000... that's not bad pay for walking around and swinging a club in the Florida sunshine. Next week finds Gene Littler pacing Sam Snead. Gene is not a bad money player himself, and again I'll say... perhaps he is the lad who will bounce Snead from his TV throne. They'll be playing at the Miami Country Club in Miami, Florida, and as your Munsingwear Golf Reporter, I will be back with this same column to give you the inside story.

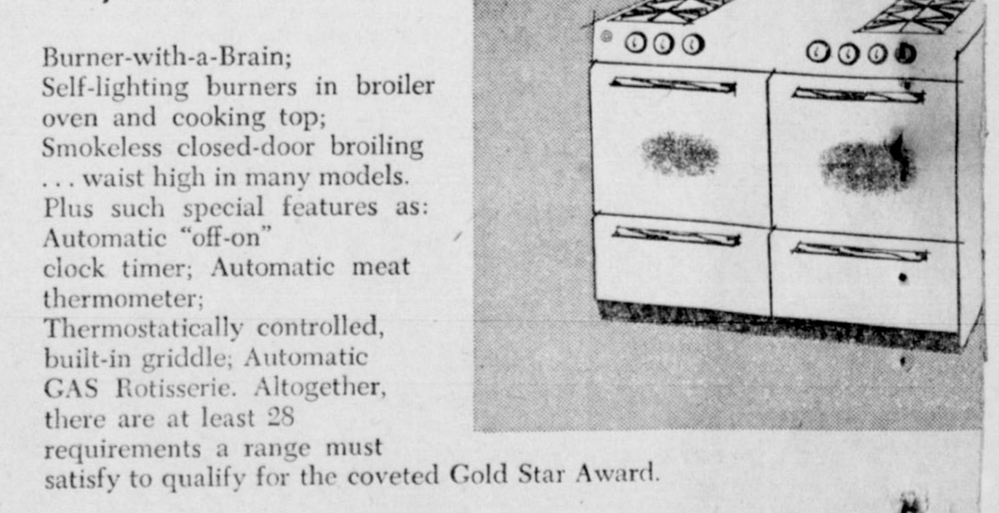

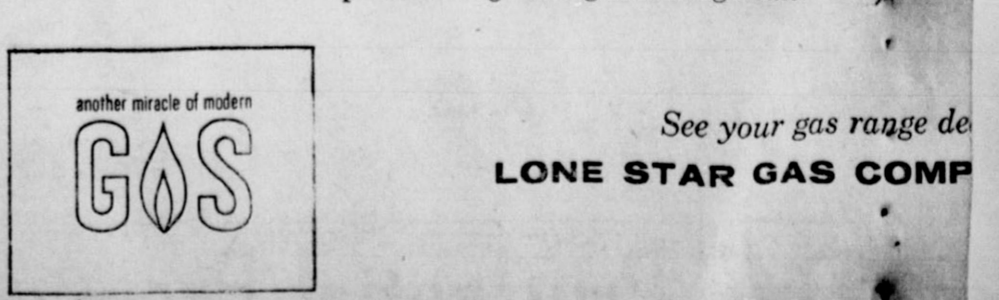

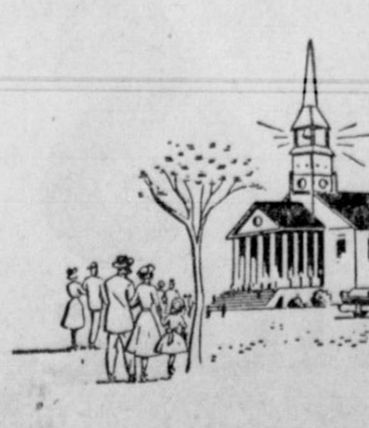

She moved to Iowa Park with her family in 1919 from Oklahoma and has worked in church and civic affairs, school and PTA.

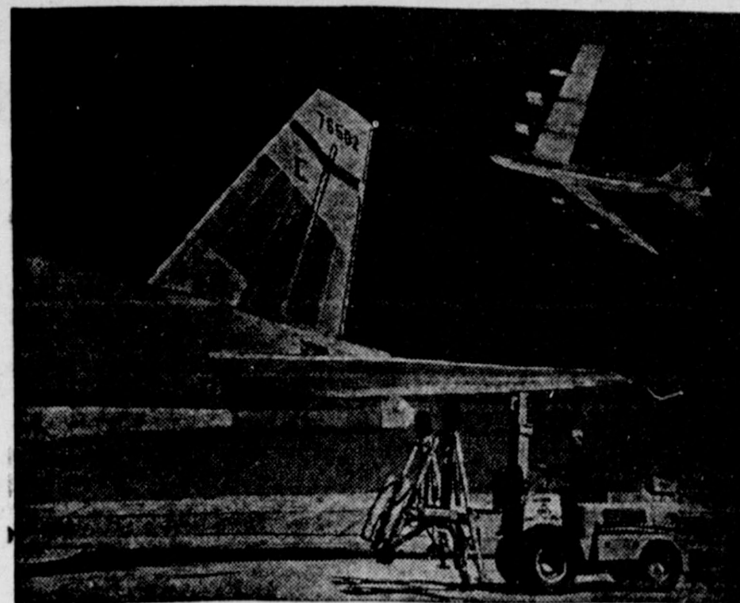
Mrs. Estes is mother of six of whom five are living; she has 10 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren.

Theme of the program will be "How Much Is Enough?"

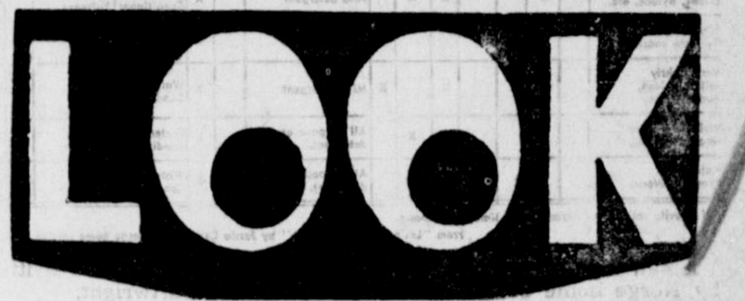

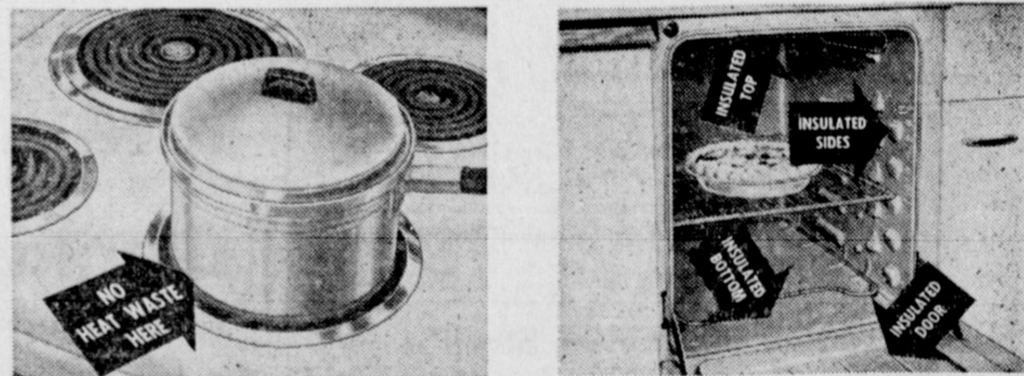
