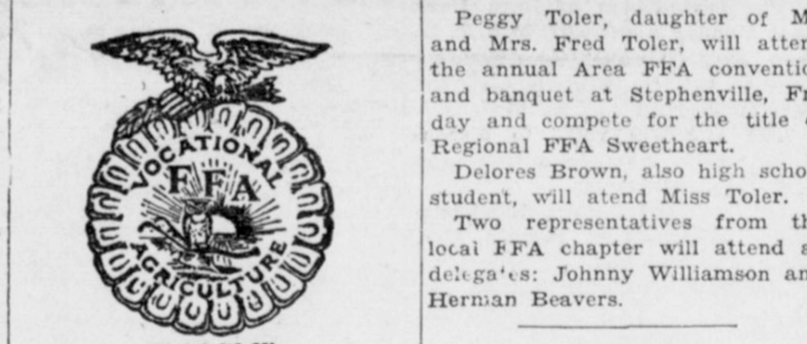
Mr. Shook died Monday in a Wichita Falls hospital after being admitted Sunday.

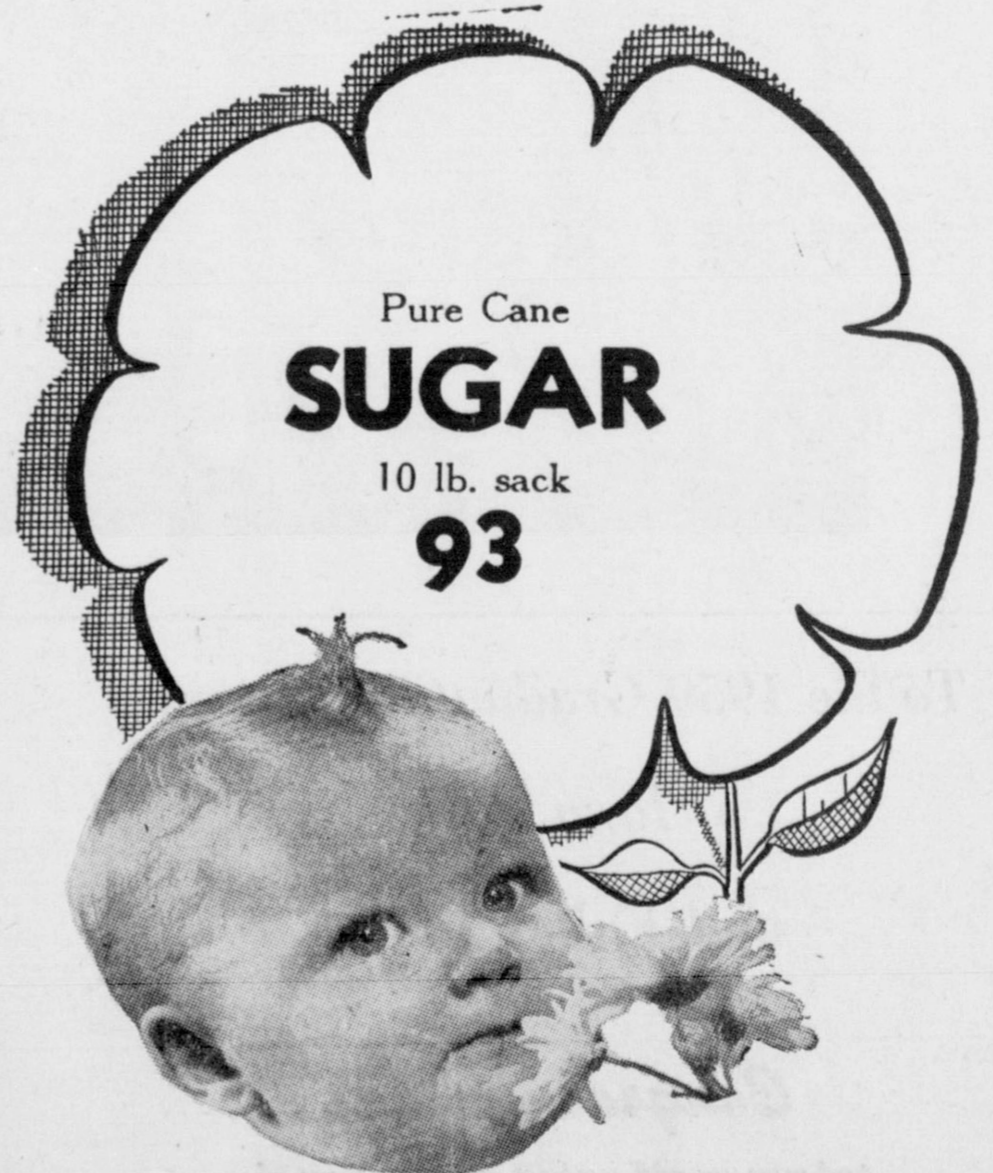

School News

A committee representing the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges made an official visit to the Iowa Park school Monday. It was composed of C. D. Allen, superintendent of schools at Bowie; Dr. Allen Kavanaugh, superintendent of Vernon; Lewis A. Moore, superintendent of Jacksboro; G. B. Rush, superintendent of Ranger; O. T. Freeman, principal of Wichita Falls high.

These men visited classrooms and observed teachers and students and the type of teaching, lecture or demonstration, that was being carried on; if the teachers had lesson plans before them. They also observed the relationship between teachers and students and the clothing and grooming of both.

In making a report, Freeman said, "Iowa Park school ranks high in school spirit. We did not see any objectionable fads in dress or haircuts. Teachers and students are so friendly, and it is with pride the committee will recommend Iowa Park school for membership in the association at the meeting next November at Louisville, Ky."

These representatives met with the Student Council to hear the complaints and compliments of the school and teachers. Mr. Freeman reported there were only a few gripes and the council praised faculty members for giving extra time to students who need help.

The team recommended that more visual aids be used in classrooms. They stressed the importance of insisting that students take more interest in English, foreign languages, mathematics and science because entrance requirements are being raised at most institutions of higher learning.

When the group met with the School Board, they suggested more visual aid equipment, larger library and playground spaces. They complimented the school on the pay scale of \$100 above state aid; the sick leave program; the lighting of classrooms; cleanliness of the buildings and rest rooms.

They also remarked at the number of last year's graduates attending colleges or special training schools—80 per cent.
