BURN CANCELLED BONDS-Sale of the Burkburnett municipal power plant and system to Texas Electric Service company enabled city officials to purchase and burn bonds that had represented a debt of \$676,000 on the municipal light and water systems. Sale of the plant was approved by a vote of almost 2 to 1 in a special election in April. The city now plans a program to provide city-wide sewer service and a modern sewage disposal plant. The company will remove unnecessary duplicating lines and poles and install modern street lights.

nterstate highway system was It was the program's initiated. original concept that it would provide a system to connect the principal defense centers in the coun try with limited access highways and also provide a system of expressway type roads whereby motorists could drive from the East to the West Coast or from the Canadian Border to Mexico without encountering a traffic light or having to drive through city traffic.

The legislation creating this sys tem provided that these purposes should be accomplished by a system of not more than 40,000 miles of highway. It was estimated that the cost would be approximately \$25 billion.

Currently this program is bogged down because of a shortage of money, and the president has several times this year asked congress to increase the gasoline tax to provide the funds that he thinks necessary.


Committee on ways and means has been holding hearings to deermine the reasons the highway trust fund is inadequate. It developed that after actually locating the highway it was determined by the bureau of public roads that the system could have been built with 1452 miles less than originally estimated, but instead of "saving" this 1452 miles, the bureau proceeded to add that many miles to the system, which increased the cost \$1,500,000,000. As the program was conceived, it was thought of as a highway

system that would connect urban areas; however the bureau has changed this so that now 42 per cent of the funds are spent to provide expressways within cities. These two things along with an acceleration of the program are largely responsible for the current deficit.

It would seem that rather than increase the gasoline tax, it would be better to stretch this program out for a few more years.
