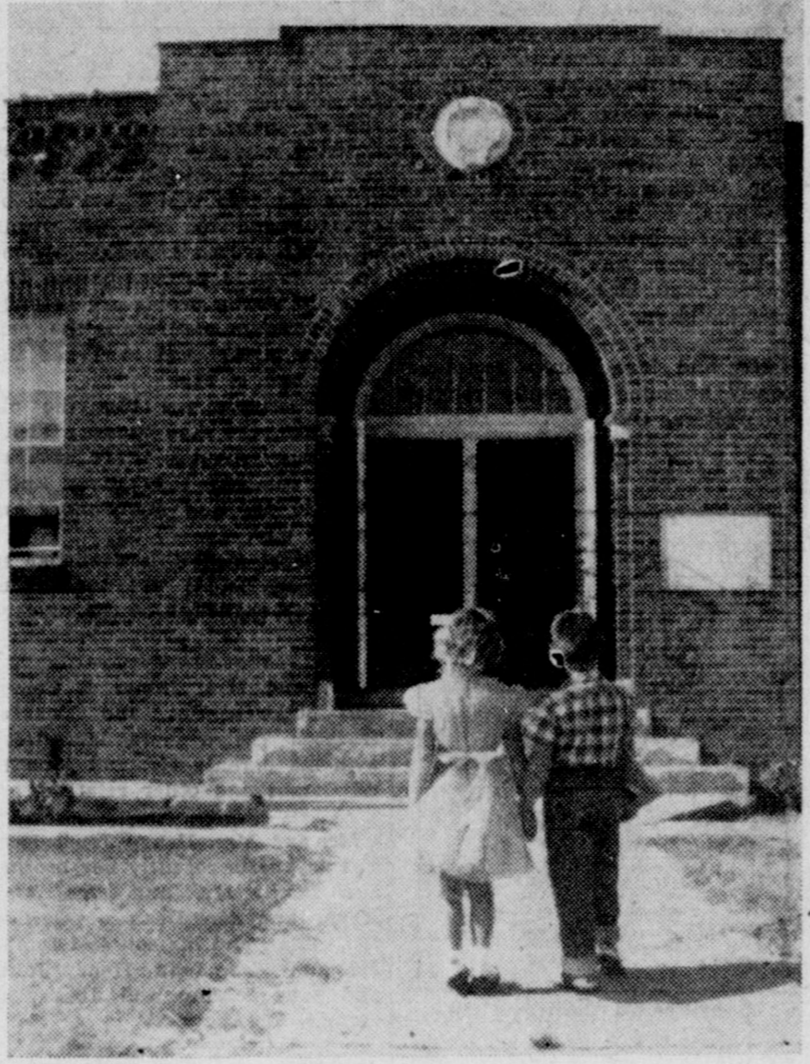

Anyone in grades 5 through 11 is welcome. This will afford an excellent opportunity for your child and you, Mr. and Mrs. Par-

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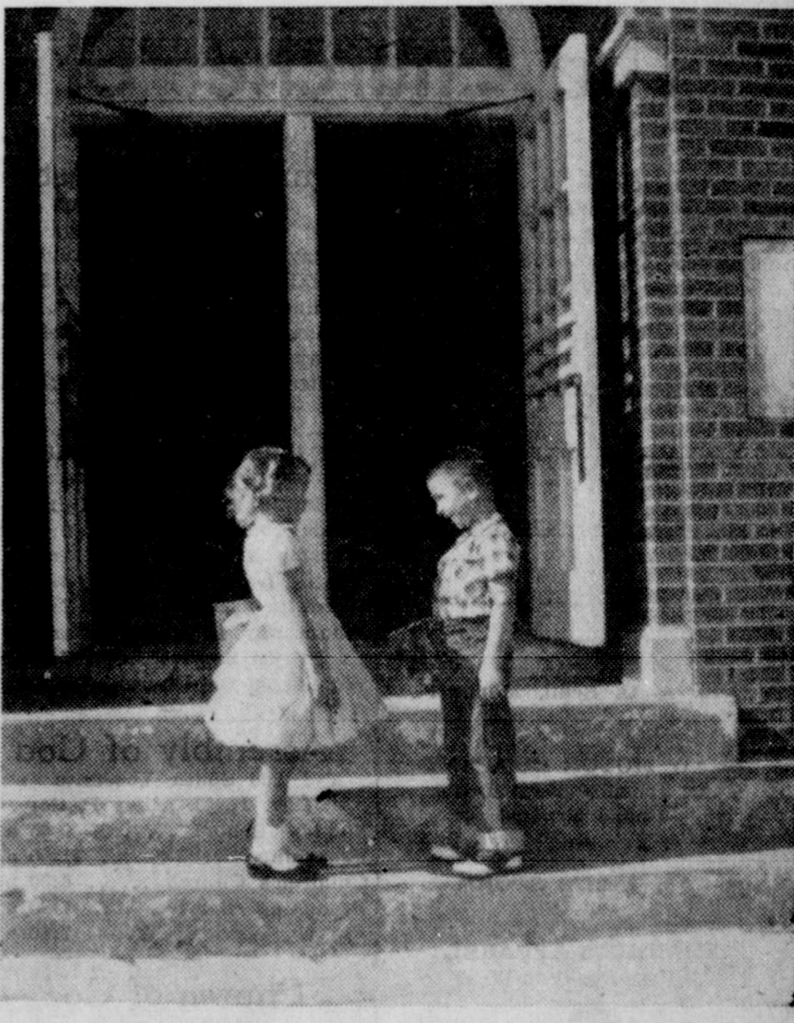

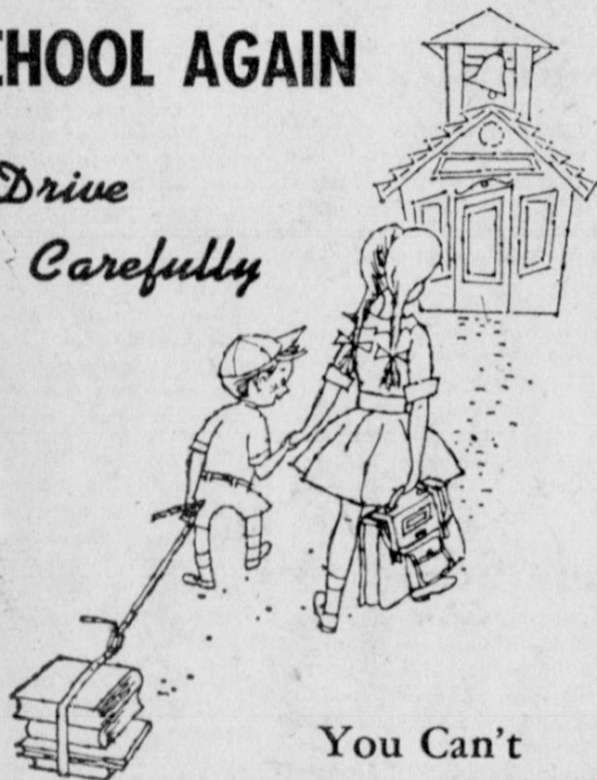

The service was conducted in the Pleasant Grove Baptist church of Anson. Graveside service was conducted in the Burkburnett cemetery.

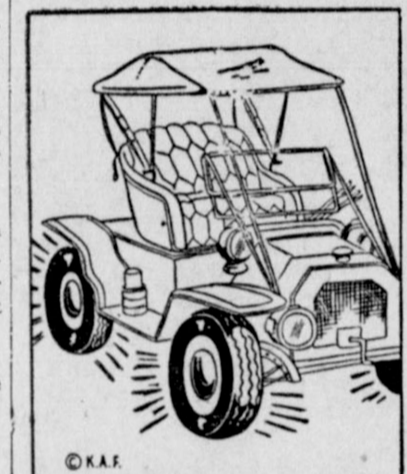

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Housing Act

One of the most hotly contested provisions of the new Housing Act being considered by the Congress is the proposal to lend money to colleges to help build college classrooms.

Following the policy of "no new starts," the administration has opposed the move. This proposal will only provide funds on a loan basis to be repaid with interest.

The proposal to help build more college classrooms is a vital one. We are learning a lesson in the school of hard knocks about education. The rise of Sputnik in 1957 gave warning of the rise in education and technical know-how which put the Russian satellite into orbit. We are coming to realize that to help our people stay abreast of the advances of the time, we must provide more and better education for our young people.

More of our people are realizing that what they don't know WILL hurt them. And the clamor for entrance into colleges is overflowing many schools. Next year 3,500,000 students will be enrolled in American colleges and universities. By 1965 that figure will be 4,600,000 and by 1970 the enrollment will exceed 6,000,000. In some states only 18 percent of the college age young people are actually in school. In California the percentage is 60. And in Texas the percentage is 31½.

Our schools are like the old woman in the shoe we sang about in nursery rhymes. They have so many students they don't know what to do. And many more are on the way.

We must meet this challenge so our young people will be able to meet the challenge of the modern world.

Bicycle Safety

Each year 360 bicycle-riding youngsters under 15 are killed by motor vehicles, and about 25,000 are injured.

Almost every motorist has had the heart-stopping experience of missing narrowly a collision with a bicycle rider who darts suddenly from a driveway or cross street, or from between parked cars.

Police and traffic safety authorities are doing all they can to reduce such accidents, but they point out that, as long as kids are kids, prime responsibility for protecting youngsters will rest with adult motorists.

They suggest that motorists be constantly alert for bicycle riders, especially in residential areas and near parks, playgrounds or public schools.

Besides being extra careful when behind the wheel, adults are urged to set good examples for children in everyday safety habits. Parents should insist on such basic safety precautions as riding only in safe places, crossing streets or roads only at intersections, knowing and obeying traffic rules that apply to bicycles, and respecting policemen.

Here are some specific rules for bicyclists:

1. Ride with traffic and keep to the far right.
2. Ride in a straight line; no weaving or "stunting" in or out of traffic.
3. When with other bicyclists, ride single file.
4. Never carry a "passenger."
5. Obey all signs, signal lights and traffic laws, just like grown-up motorists.
6. Never hitch a ride by holding to a truck, automobile or moving vehicle.
7. Don't ride at night unless it is absolutely necessary. If you do, be sure you have a good light and a bright reflector or reflective tape to make your bicycle visible from the rear.

Youngsters who follow these rules will be able to enjoy their bikes without risking death or injury. When they grow up and begin to drive a car, their bicycle training will make them safer and more courteous motorists.

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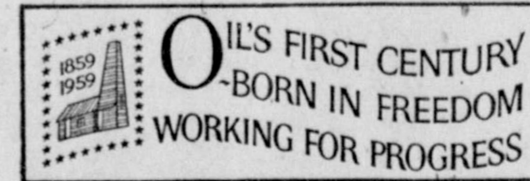
