## Your C of C

Tuesday evening a large group  
of business men, civic leaders and  
farmers of this area, and their  
wives, met in the school cafeteria  
for an Agri-business dinner co-  
sponsored by the Iowa Park Cham-  
ber of Commerce and Lions clubs.

Elvy Sargent served as emcee.  
Rev. Claude McDonald offered the  
invocation.

John Sibley, member of the ag-  
riculture committee of the C of  
C, introduced the guests, which  
included farmers, ranchers and  
their wives, radio, newspaper and  
television representatives, some  
members of the FFA, and some  
local ministers.

Johnny Johnson, 4-H club mem-  
ber from Wichita Falls, presented  
several musical numbers. Miss  
Jane Waters provided the dinner  
music.

Lester E. Brooks introduced the  
guest speaker, John G. McHaney,  
specialist of the A & M extension  
service, whose work deals primar-  
ily with the economics of agricul-  
ture. He spoke on the importance  
of farmer and business man rela-  
tionships.

McHaney said only 11 per cent  
of the state's population are en-  
gaged in agricultural production.  
There are 11 per cent engaged in  
processing agricultural products,  
and 18 per cent in distribution.

The speaker said "Don't sell ag-  
riculture short. It ranks second  
in the state, with oil first. It is  
our duty to let people know agri-  
culture is not declining in our  
state."

Farmers and ranchers are spend-  
ing more and more money to help  
make their work easier and pro-  
duction greater. They have to be  
businessmen to carry on their op-  
eration better.

Most farms have electric lights  
and power today, giving rise to  
the use of more and more appli-  
ances, which the town business-  
men provide.

McHaney explained the rise in  
food costs by pointing out that if  
the housewife of today wants her  
chickens dressed and cut-up, and  
wants her children in ready-made  
clothing, the cost is greater and  
the town folk get the difference.

The ability of the farmer to  
produce twice the yield from the  
same land, and to farm more acres  
with less labor, does not hurt the  
nation's economy, but allows the  
farmer to buy many more luxuries  
that benefit the businessmen of  
the area, and make life on the  
farm more interesting.

McHaney ended his talk by en-  
couraging farmers and business-  
men to get together and talk over  
their problems.

Rev. Harold Dykstra gave the  
benediction.  
Approximately 200 were present  
with 77 of them being farmers and  
ranchers.

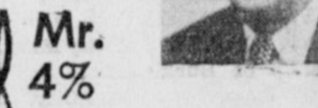

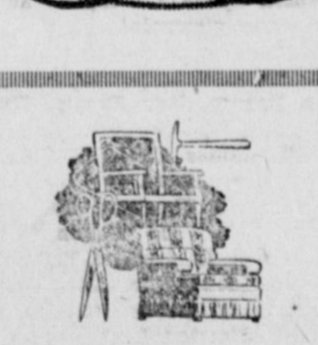

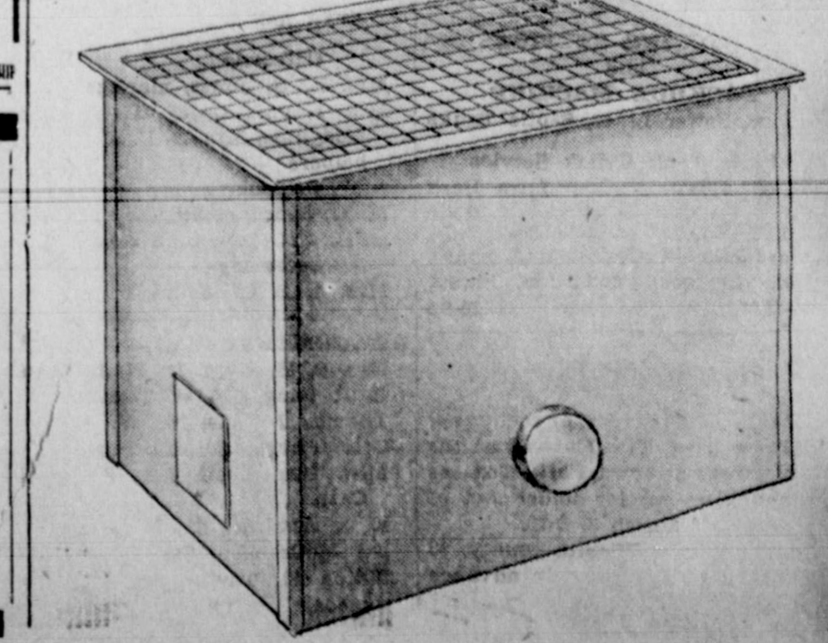

Being trapped in the home is the No. 1 cause of deaths from fire in Texas.

Deaths from this cause can be greatly reduced by observing the following fire safety rules:

a. Provide more than one means of escape in case of fire. Pre-planned escape would save about 85 per cent of lives lost in home fires.

b. Do not leave small children or disabled persons alone in the home.

c. Ventilate home both day and night.

d. Do not return to the inside of the home while fire is in progress.

Clothing ignited by fire is the No. 2 cause of deaths from fire. Deaths from this cause can be greatly reduced by keeping heaters and open fireplaces properly safeguarded by screen guards.

Gasoline and kerosene improperly used and cared for are the No. 3 cause of death from fire in Texas. Deaths from this cause can be greatly reduced by observing the following safety rules:

a. Never use gasoline to clean the body of oil and grease, or to clean clothing, floors and the like. Gasoline is a fuel—not a cleaning fluid.

b. Keep gasoline power mowers properly stored away from children. Keep gasoline in approved safety cans and away from children.

c. Keep kerosene in approved containers and out of reach of children.

children—never in the house.

d. Fill lamps and stoves outside the home and never close to a fire.

e. Use only approved lamps and stoves, and see that they are so placed they cannot be reached and overturned.

f. Never use kerosene or gasoline to start or to quicken a fire.

Improper installation and care of natural gas and liquefied petroleum as heaters, stoves and appliances are the No. 4 cause of deaths from fire. Both gases are household necessities and deaths from this cause can be greatly reduced by observing the following rules:

a. Use only approved gas heaters, stoves and hot water heaters.

b. Make sure all gas appliances are properly installed by a licensed plumber.

c. Provide flues in all gas appliances to replace oxygen consumed by the gas burner.

d. Vent pipes should be installed to extend into the open and not into the attic.

e. Have an annual inspection of gas lines and all stoves and hot water heaters.

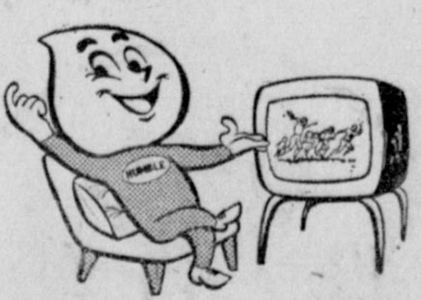

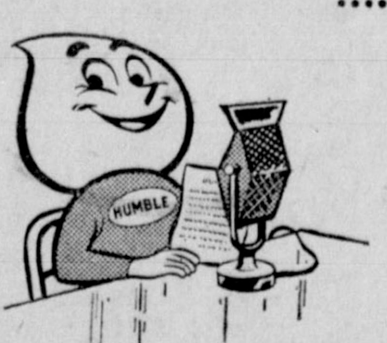

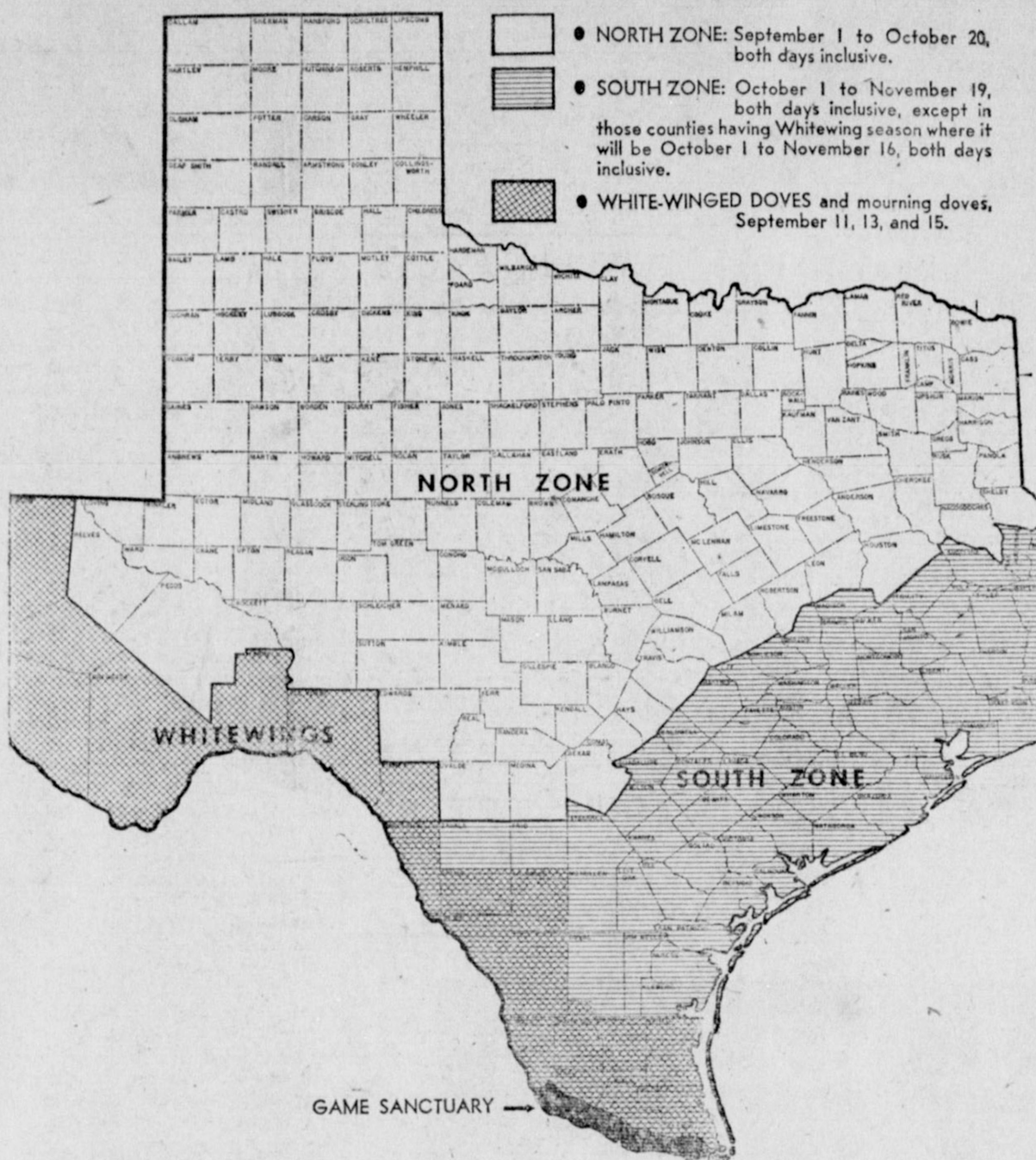
## MOURNING DOVE - WHITE-WINGED DOVE

Open Seasons 1959

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—not to exceed 20.

WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—10.

NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are possessed—Possession limit—20, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be white-winged doves.



SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U.S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary."

SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having whitewing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 11, 13, & 15, only. White-winged doves, in season, 2 p.m. to sunset.
