PAMPERED POULTRY

Poultry raisers are finding it pays to pamper their birds on hot days. It helps keep feed conversion high, eggs rolling and profits up.

Open up their house to provide maximum ventilation, B. T. Haws, county agent, suggests.

Many producers instal sprinklers on the roof of their henhouses for use on the hottest days. Water on a roof reflects the sun's rays and cools the hot surface through evaporation. Water dripping off the house also serves as an evaporative cooler, lowering temperatures inside.

Add several more drinking places so water is handy to the birds at all times, says Haws. If a chicken must walk more than 100 feet to water, it may go thirsty rather than make the trip.

Change the water several times daily to keep it cool. Cool water means cool chickens, and paves the way to increased water and feed consumption and higher feed conversion.

Other poultrymen encourage a high rate of feed intake with early morning or all-night lights. This way birds eat while it's cool, before the sun starts bearing down.

Co-hostesses for the ranch style dinner were Mrs. James Cates and Mrs. Arlan Simms.

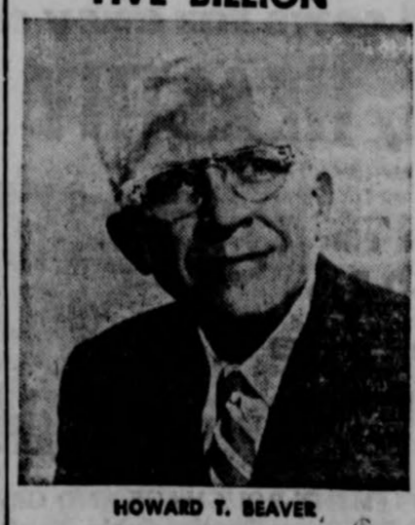

NEW YORK—Americans gave a total of \$5,401,000,000 to philanthropic causes in 1954, F. Emerson Andrews of the Russell Sage Foundation, stated at the annual meeting of the American Association of Fund-Raising Councils here.

Howard T. Beaver of Chicago was elected President of the Association, a non-profit organization of firms engaged in fund-raising counsel to American philanthropic, religious, educational, health, and character-building agencies which are supported by voluntary giving.

The Association in twenty-one years of service to American philanthropy has, through its members, assisted some 8,500 voluntary agencies in raising seven and one-quarter billion of dollars.

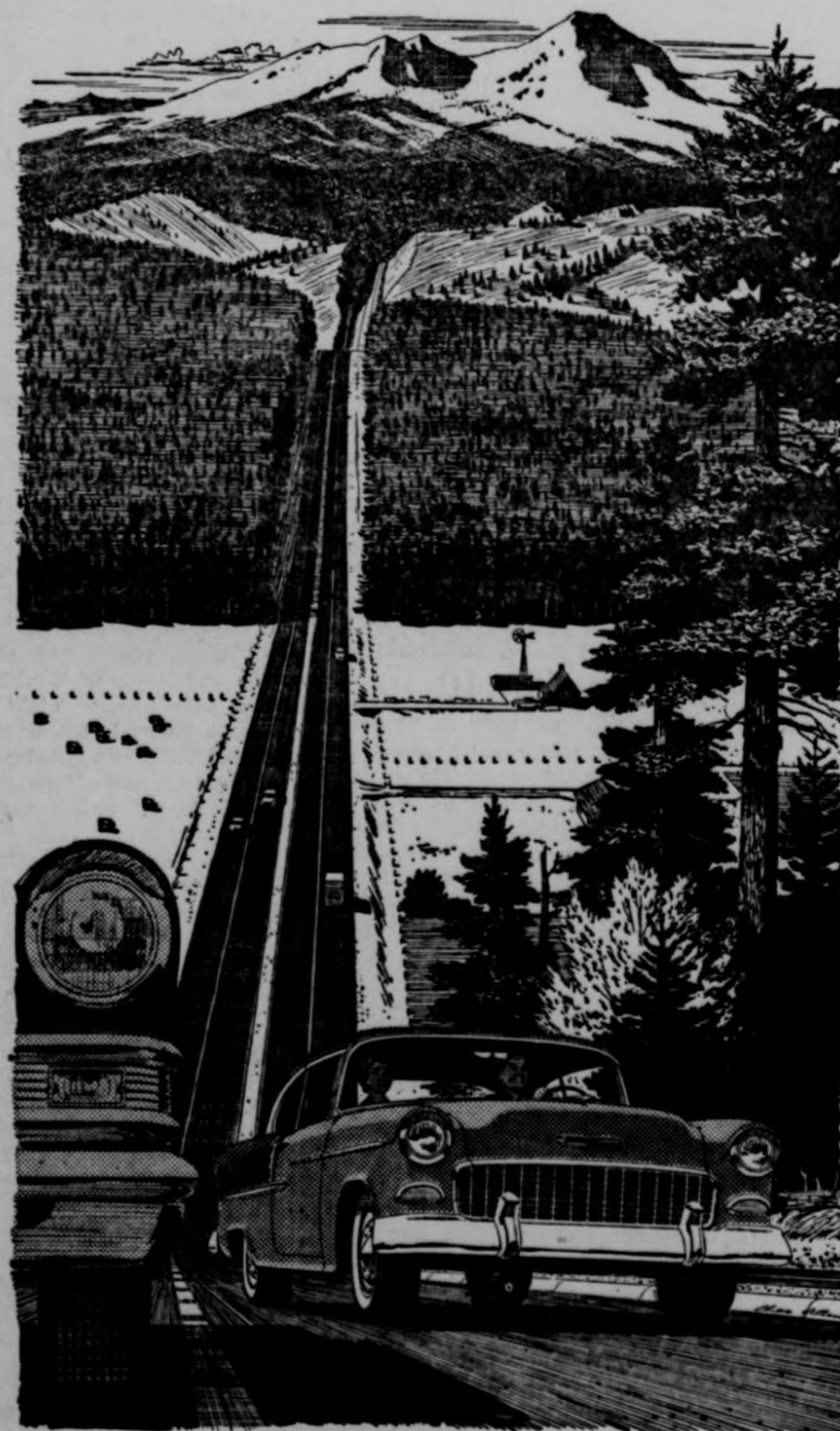

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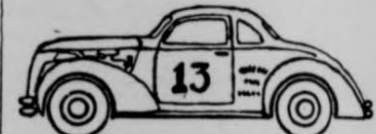

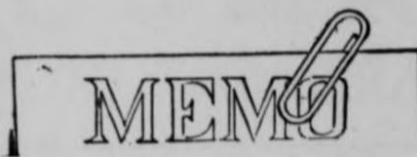

A major objective of Farm Bureau policy is to create conditions which will make it possible for farmers to earn and get a high per family real income.

The problem of maintaining prosperity in agriculture is exceedingly broad and complex and involves many different lines of action not only in agriculture but also in other fields.

Price supports are an absolute necessity, but should be flexible enough to give adequate protection without stimulating production beyond demand. At the same time a support price should be maintained high enough for profitable production, thus avoiding an economic depression.

In recent years, a great deal of political wind has been expounded about the support program. Reams of material have been written on the pros and cons. Little has been said or written concerning acreage allotments. In fact, the laws setting up acreage controls have not been changed since 1937.

Texas Farm Bureau farm program recommendations were for a flexible price support program based on overall cropland production with no acreage allotments for individual commodities. However, the present law includes acreage controls on basic commodities.

The flexible price support was a step in the right direction and the present allotments do not seriously impair the over-all agricultural economy, with the exception of wheat, now in heavy surplus. Under the present farm program, this surplus is expected to reach normal supply within the next two years. This will automatically place the government support price at 90 per cent of parity.

The disadvantage of commodities now in heavy surplus is offset by the many commodities in short supply. A continuation of the present farm program for the next few years will do a great deal to stabilize the income per farm family engaged in the production of all agricultural commodities. In this period, we will see the transition from wartime to peacetime production and still maintain stability in agriculture.
