(Start timing when mixture starts to "bubble" around edges of pan.) Remove from heat. Stir in marshmallows, chocolate, vanilla and walnuts. Stir vigorously for minute (or until marshmallows are completely blended). Pour into 9-inch square buttered pan and allow to cool. Cut in squares.

Pecan Log (Makes 2 dozen slices)

2 cups firmly packed light brown sugar 3/4 cup (small can) undiluted evaporated milk

1/2 teaspoon maple extract ½ cup peanut butter 1 cup chopped pecans 1/2 cup ground or finely chopped pecans

1/2 teaspoon vanilla Mix sugar and evaporated milk thoroughly in a 2-quart saucepan. Bring to a rolling boil over high heat. Reduce heat to medium Boil for 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add vanilla, maple extract, peanut butter and 1 cup chopped pecans. Beat until well mixed. Pour into 9-inch square buttered pan and allow to cool. Shape into 12-inch roll. Roll in ½ cup ground or finely chopped pecans. Cut into 1/2-inch slices.
