"People give their blood, donate their eyes, and are always ready when emergencies arise.

"Teen-agers also build a record of good citizenship which denies much that is said about juvenile delinquency."

America is strong and good, said the speaker, but we must be for-

ever on guard against encroaching materialism and nationalism.

He closed with a quotation from Carl Sandburg to the effect that "There is not a man in the world but all men; there is not a woman in the world, but all women; there is not a child in the world, but all children."

The club will distribute Christmas toys next week.

Fire Marshal

Our new fire marshal, John Mixon, wishes to remind all people of this area to keep Christmas merry, but to put fire safety first. He suggests the following:

Keep your Christmas tree green by placing the bottom of the trunk in water to retard drying.

Decorate the tree with non-flammable materials and be careful in hanging the lights not to get them close to something that will burn.

Don't leave Christmas tree lights burning when nobody is at home.

If a fire should start, get everyone out of the house first, then call the fire department.

If you have guests, show them two ways to get out of the house in case of fire.

Be sure to have fire department phone number posted at your telephone.

Be sure the toys you give the children are safe. Those requiring alcohol, kerosene, gasoline and the like can be dangerous.

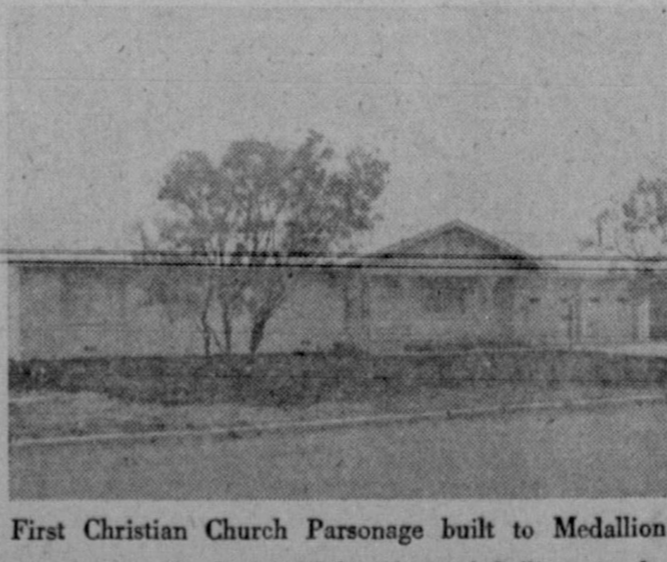

4-H Boys' Agricultural Awards Winner

Roy Dee Gregg, 17, of Route 3, Plainview, Hale County, Tex., was one of six young 4-H Club members singled out for special honors during the 38th National 4-H Club Congress just held in Chicago.

Roy, as did five other national winners, received an all-expense trip to the congress and also was awarded a \$400 International Harvester scholarship as a result of his outstanding record in agricultural projects.

The objectives of the program, known as the National Boys' 4-H Agricultural Awards, are to develop leadership and gain a better knowledge of those agricultural projects and activities which contribute to better farming and a more satisfying rural life.

Arranged and announced by the National Committee on Boys' and Girls Club Work, the program is sponsored by International Harvester Company and conducted by extension services of state agricultural colleges and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Roy, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Gregg, is a senior at Plainview High School. He has spent eight years in 4-H club work and is a member of the County Wide Club.

Working on 4-H projects came naturally to Roy since his older brothers were active members and his father an adult leader. This year he carried out six major projects, including steers, lambs, calves, grain, garden and cotton.

In addition to earning a profit of nearly \$7,000 from his 4-H projects, Roy has won numerous awards and ribbons for a variety of activities. In 1959, he was a judge on the first place team at the El Paso Fat Stock Show and took high individual honors in that event.

Roy likewise has been a member of the first place livestock judging team at the Texas State Fair and has been winning prizes for his cotton since 1953.

A past president of both his local and county clubs, Roy is a member of the American Junior Rodeo Association and is active in church and community work. He lives on his parents' 500-acre farm.

Because of public demand the State Board of Insurance has promulgated the TEXAS SAFE DRIVER INSURANCE PLAN effective January 1, 1960. The Plan provides for reduction in automobile insurance premiums for careful drivers who have had no accident or moving traffic violations for a period of three years, this period being the three years ending 90 days prior to date of insurance policy. Drivers with a record of accidents and traffic violations will be penalized by paying higher premiums and in some cases the penalty can be as much as 100% increase in their premiums.

This PLAN is mandatory and all Insurance Companies and their Agents doing business in Texas must adhere to the rules and rates as promulgated by the State Board of Insurance including the securing of the signed application.

All policies dated after January 1, 1960 will be issued only upon a written application completely filled out and signed by the applicant for insurance. 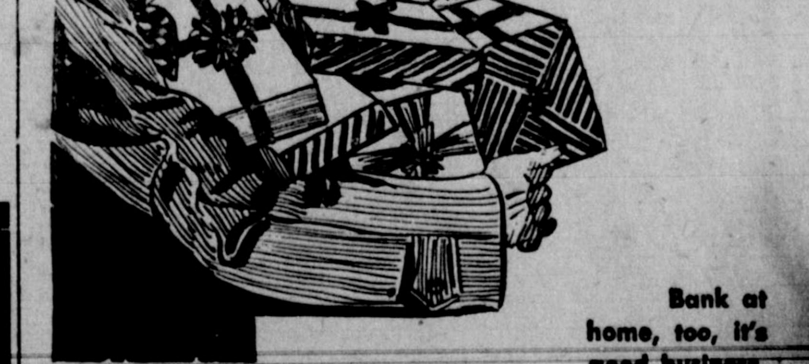
